Module Content  Teaching and Learning Methods	This module introduces the Greek poetry of the third century BCE, notably that of the Ptolemaic court in Alexandria, in its literary and social contexts. Key concepts are poetics and aesthetics, intertextuality and genre, tradition and innovation, continuity and change, philosophy and ideology. You will study selections from the poetry of Callimachus, Theocritus and Aratus. You will also read a substantial part of Apollonius' epic <i>Argonautica</i> , whose novel hero and heroine, 'Hellenistic' world view, bold narrative experiments, and pervasive intertextuality and aetiology inspired Virgil's <i>Aeneid</i> .  This module is taught through 11 two-hour small-group seminars, supported by online learning (Blackboard). Attendance, preparation and presentations are compulsory.
