



Students of European Studies (ES) study a broad range of humanities disciplines together with two out of six European languages (French, German, Italian, Polish, Russian and Spanish). One of the two languages chosen is studied as a major language, the other as a minor. In the second (Senior Freshman) year, students select one of their languages as their major language; the third (Junior Sophister) year is spent abroad, studying at a

third-level institution in the country of their major language.

## JUNIOR FRESHMAN (JF)

The first-year course is designed primarily to establish and consolidate your competence in understanding and using the Spanish language.

### **SPANISH LANGUAGE**

**Non-beginners** attend **five** language classes each week, including **one** in Spoken Spanish and **one** in Listening Comprehension.

**Beginners** attend **seven** language classes each week, including **one** in Spoken Spanish and **one** in Listening Comprehension.

### **HISTORY, CULTURE, AND SOCIETY**

#### **Introduction to Modern Spain**

All ES Junior Freshmen attend **one** lecture each week on the course *Introduction to Modern Spain*.

## SENIOR FRESHMAN (SF)

All students attend **three** classes a week in Spanish Language throughout the year.

#### **España Contemporánea I and II**

All students attend two hours throughout the year. The courses prepare students for their Year Abroad (topics covered range from culture to society).

## **JUNIOR SOPHISTER (JS)**

Students spend the year in Spain.

## **SENIOR SOPHISTER (SS)**

### **Spanish Language (Minor)**

All students attend **two** classes a week in Spanish Language throughout the year.

### **Spanish Language (Major)**

In the final year students are expected to attend **two** classes a week in **Written Spanish** and **one** in **Spoken Spanish**.
