


Whose vote counts? Race, class, and gender in the 2016 US Presidential Election

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Whose vote counts?

Voter Eligibility

- US Citizen
- Age 18+
- Registered to vote
- No felony disenfranchisement
- State voter ID laws



Distribution of votes: race, class, and gender

Three key policy issues in 2016 Presidential Election

- 1. The economy, jobs, and income inequality
- 2. Racial healing vs. Law and Order
- 3. LGBTQ and gender issues

Who supports Trump?

5 Categories of Trump Supporters

- 1. Men
 - a. 45% of men voters would vote for Trump over Clinton, compared with 33% of women (Pew Research, August 2016)
- 2. Poor, rural and/or uneducated whites
- 3. "Alt-right" and "dyed in the wool" Republicans
- 4. Evangelicals and conservative Christians
- 5. Top 1% of earners



Who supports Clinton?

5 Categories of Clinton Supporters

- 1. Women
 - a. 59% of women voters say they would vote for Clinton over Trump, compared with 43% of men (Pew Research June 2016)
- 2. African-Americans, Hispanics, and minorities
- 3. College educated
- 4. Working class and middle class
- 5. Democrats and progressives



Predictions and conclusion

- 1. Clinton will win, but it will be close.
- 2. Trump will claim: "The election was rigged!"
- 3. The turnout will be lower in this election than 2008 or 2012.
- 4. No one will move to Canada because their candidate didn't win.
- 5. Life will go on.
