What is the Laidlaw Programme?







- Laidlaw Scholarship founded by Lord Laidlaw of Rothiemay in 2014
- Philanthropist and entrepreneur, gifts up to 25 Scholarships each to 15+ international universities per year
- Established in Trinity in 2018, now entering 7th intake of Laidlaw Scholars

Purpose of Scholarship is to "invest in talented and motivated undergraduate students, giving them the knowledge, skills and experience to become active global citizens and future leaders"

Eligibility to apply



- 1. You are a registered undergraduate student
- 2. You are currently in:
 - 2nd year of a 4-year undergraduate degree programme
 OR
 - 2nd or 3rd year of a 5-year undergraduate degree programme

OR

- 2nd or 3rd year of a 5-year integrated masters degree programme (e.g. MAI, Pharmacy)
- 3. You are available to take part in all the requirements over the duration of the Programme





What is the Laidlaw Programme?

Research project

- 6 weeks funded selfdirected research in Summer 2024
- Supported by an academic supervisor
- Opportunities to apply for additional funding for research travel, conferences, project expenses
- Share your research in the Laidlaw Network

Leadership development programme

- 18-month personal development and skills training
- 7 full days of workshops
- 6 weeks funded "Leadership in Action experience" in Summer 2025
- Ethical leadership module
- 1-to-1 coaching, feedback, and reflective exercises
- Peer learning groups
- Outputs: reports, presentations, posters



Research Project

Define a research question which...

- Is feasible as a project over one 6 week research period in Summer 1
- Is not part of your core, assessed curriculum
- Has the potential to integrate with your leadership training to enhance the impact of your project

Identify a Research Supervisor who will...

- Write a supporting statement confirming your project is feasible within the period and is of academic value
- Whose research interests are aligned with your project
- Be available to support you in refining and progressing your project throughout the period
- Will support you in any necessary ethics/lab safety requirements



What is 'Leadership-in-Action'?

The Leadership-in-Action (LiA) component is a ca. **6-week immersive project** that usually takes place in the second summer of your programme.

Learning through service, you will be testing your leadership skills, expanding your understanding of what it means to be a global citizen, and challenging yourself to grow.









What is 'Leadership-in-Action'?

- 1. A 6-week immersive, international leadership project
- 2. An experience in a new and personally challenging environment
- 3. Working with communities in need
- Doing something which makes the world a (sustainably) better place
- 5. Developing and demonstrating your leadership skills, attributes and Laidlaw values
- 6. Learning through service overseas





1) Central Laidlaw Foundation Project

Participate in a 6 week international expedition with a team of Laidlaw Scholars from other participating universities to work on community-based leadership projects.

2) Leadership Placement

A leadership placement for 6 weeks in a not-for-profit/community-based organisation to give the scholar the opportunity to develop and apply their leadership skills in a practical setting, which will involve leading others.

3) Implementing your research findings in a community of need

A 6 week project evolved from your Summer 1 research project which must be a practical application of your research in a setting outside of the university. This is a leadership focused continuation and not a second research project.

Funding

Funding Step-by-Step

- Financial support to the value of €7,000+ including a stipend of €3,500 for the Summer 1 project
- Funding available to your supervisor for any project related expenses e.g. lab materials, subscriptions, equipment
- Additional support throughout the programme through workshops, coaching, and funding for the Leadership in Action experience in Summer 2
- Separate travel grant on a case-by-case basis for research related trips e.g. research visits to other universities, conference attendance, field work
