Module Content	In this course we'll investigate the rich and varied afterlives of Virgil's poetry, exploring themes of creativity and artistic (re-)imagination, as well as the politics which lie behind humanistic claims for the universality of 'the classics'. We'll examine questions of patriarchy, environment, and empire, but also some radical and democratic aspects of popular traditions in Irish, European, and world contexts. And we will re-read Virgil's own poetry, in an effort to critique its continuing ability to inspire, provoke, and challenge.				
Teaching and Learning Methods	22 lectures and 11 language labs. Lectures will vary in format and include traditional lectures, 'flipped' lectures, translation workshops, and student-led discursive seminars; language labs will involve close reading and translation of selected Virgilian passages in the original Latin.
