<b>Module Content</b>	<p>This module aims to consolidate your understanding of Greek grammar and pragmatics, further refine your translation, philological and critical skills, and broaden your familiarity with Greek idiom and style. Close analysis of texts from a range of periods and genres, including examples drawn from outside the traditional canon, will enable you by the end of the module to read Greek prose and verse with confidence and precision.</p> <p>The 10-ECTS version of this module includes a substantial element of independent research on a text/topic to be agreed with the module coordinator.</p>
<b>Teaching and Learning Methods</b>	<p>2 one-hour classes per week.</p> <p>Integrated, hybrid seminar activity, group-discussion, group-project, guided and independent face-to-face and online activities using interactive and non-interactive print and digital resources.</p>
