Question:

How can political processes affect redistribution of income or wealth?

Rent: personal benefit that a person receives beyond that necessary to provide incentives to perform particular tasks

Use of resources

■ The use of resources in rent-seeking is socially wasteful

Resources that could be productively used are directed toward trying to influence distribution rather than to produce goods/services

 Rent-seeking is the consequence of the presence of government

 Rent-seeking is a response to the perceived inclination of political decision makers to respond positively to requests for favours

Two types of competition

- Socially beneficial competition
 - Competition in markets to provide goods
- Socially wasteful competition
 - Competition to determine winners of a rent-seeking contest
- Rent seeking is competition for privilege
