EC4041 Development Economics – Module A

Lecturer: Dr Gaia Narciso

Course Description

This course builds on the JS Economics of Less Developed Countries. It provides an opportunity for students to pursue more in-depth study of particular topics in development economics. The course will be taught in two modules.

The first part of this module will analyze, both theoretically and empirically, the functioning of informal markets in developing countries, with a particular focus on the land, credit and insurance sectors. By means of a microeconomic approach, we will explore the impact of social norms on economic outcomes. The second part of this module will adopt a more macroeconomic approach and it will focus on the economic causes of civil war.

The report will account for 15% of the overall grade.
