

## Exploring Heritage Collections



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ECTS Weighting: 5

## **Overview**

Exploring Heritage Collections is a module organised in partnership with ten national institutions, exploring how archives and collections can be used as creative resources. The module focuses on a set of digitised materials from each institution, explored thematically through virtual lectures, remote creative exercises, and on-site workshops (at TCD and partner institutions), during which you will learn about the institutions, archives, and collections where Ireland's cultural heritage is maintained.

This module is taught through a mixture of online learning and practical workshops, providing hands-on experience of items from some of Ireland's most important heritage collections, and exploring some key intersections between literature, collections, objects, and memory.

Over the course of this module, you will gain practical experience working with archives, catalogues, and heritage collections. The module assessment is closely linked with the 10 heritage partners institutions, and will involve collaborative projects with industry professionals to create and curate online materials for public audiences. Together, we will reflect on the processes and theories that help to inform and organise these collections, drawing on a range of critical approaches to heritage, collection, curation and display.

- Demonstrate your knowledge and understanding of the material on the module and your confident engagement with relevant critical methodologies and theoretical frameworks in an essay
- Identify items for your digital project in collaboration with the other member(s) of your group, organize and present these items in a clear and logical fashion, tailored to a public audience
- Apply the skills and knowledge acquired through the module during your internship

## **ASSESSMENT**

Assessment for this module is in three parts:

- Reflective week-to-week journal on module materials (1500 words – 40%)
- Digital project to be created in small groups. For these projects you are asked to generate creative responses to the individual artefacts assembled from the heritage institutions. The digital project can take a variety of forms, including online exhibitions, digital publications, and podcasts, and should be suitable for a public audience (30%)
- Short reflective essay on digital project (1000 words – 30%)

Projects can be created using any software, but your material for assessment should be uploaded to Turnitin on Blackboard in **PDF format** only. Links to online (audio and/or visual) materials can be included within this PDF.

## **INTERNSHIPS**

Every student who takes this module will be offered a paid short-term internship at one of the partner organisations to develop and practice new, transferable skills for the workplace, addressing the need for future skilled workers in the heritage sector.

Internships will take place over six days in Summer 2023. Particular dates and schedules will be arranged with the institutions and may be spread over several weeks.

Weekly coursework must be completed before internships are assigned.
