European Studies at Trinity is a broad-ranging, integrated, multi-disciplinary programme, which encompasses the history, culture, languages and politics of European nations. You will study the European past in order to understand the present, and examine contemporary Europe in all its complexity on a Continent-wide basis.

All European Studies students are required to study abroad in their third year.

Entry Requirements:

Students should have a high level of competence in at least one European language other than English. No student may take more than one language from beginner level.
