#### POP88071 International Politics B

## Description

International Politics B is a graduate seminar that offers an overview of major theories and analytical approaches in the field of international relations. The course begins with understanding that International Relations is an evolving discipline that has both undergone drastic changes in its development, both in its substance and composition. The course will explore traditional theories such as realism, liberalism, institutionalism and constructivism while exploring the foundations of newer developments such as political psychology, and network theory. Students will examine constitutive elements of the political system in order to evaluate the importance and impact on various theoritical sub-sections of the mechanisms of international politics

### Learning aims

The seminar aims to create the fundamental base of theoretical perspectives or lens which can be used to analyze various phenomena in international relations. Understanding the use and importance of theories will allow students to construct models in which to analyze and explain interactions. The course also seeks to show that these theories are not all encompassing, but provide an overview in which to successfully explain and categorize information to understand and possibly predict further events.
