Trinity College Dublin is recognised internationally as Ireland's leading university and as one of the top universities in the world. Trinity was founded in 1592, and today the university is a lively and cosmopolitan community of students from around the globe. Its bustling 47-acre campus is the ideal environment for studying, learning, relaxing and living.

Political science has been an important part of the curriculum since 1855 and Trinity College has developed an international reputation for its research work on the European Union, comparative politics, comparative public opinion, international relations as well as democracy and development. It is a vibrant, outward-looking department that combines intensive research activity with the strongest commitment to high-quality undergraduate and postgraduate teaching.

MSc in International Politics

This programme is designed to develop students' knowledge of international politics. We offer a comprehensive empirical approach to understanding prominent problems in contemporary world politics, especially where domestic and international politics cannot be understood in isolation from each other.

Our one-year full-time (two-year part-time) postgraduate programme provides graduates with a range of analytical and research skills which have proven to be highly desirable to prospective employers in both the public and private sector.

Trinity graduates are exceptionally well regarded worldwide and the course attracts a diverse international student body with students regularly attending from across Europe, North America and Asia. Generally there are fewer than 20 students in M.Sc. seminars and our students learn in close contact with lecturers and professors who are at the forefront of research in their subject areas.

Course Structure and Assessment

All course modules are taught around a weekly seminar and assessed mainly on the basis of assignments, with some exams. The course is structured around the following components:

- In the first semester, students take a number of core modules designed for their relevant degree, as well as a Research module.

— In the second semester, students may choose from a wide range of optional modules which vary from year to year. Previous options have included: Global Justice; The Political Economy of Globalisation; International Dispute Settlement; Environmental Politics; International Development; International Negotiations; Chinese Politics; and Politics in Authoritarian Regimes. Students also take a core module in Quantitative Methods.

 $-\,$ The course concludes with students writing a 10,000 word dissertation under the supervision of a member of staff.

Admission Requirements

Candidates should normally have achieved an upper second class honours degree, or higher from an established university. GPAs of at least 3.3 out of 4, or equivalent, will be expected from international applicants. A background in a social science will be an advantage but not a necessity.

Applicants must, in addition to the College requirements, provide academic transcripts, two letters of recommendation, a motivation letter, and one piece of written work (for example, an undergraduate dissertation or essay).

All applicants whose first language is not English or who have not been educated through the medium of English will need to present evidence of English language competency.
