




If there were a *General Election* tomorrow which party or independent candidate do you think you would give your first preference vote?






If there were a *General Election* tomorrow which party or independent candidate do you think you would give your first preference vote?



If there were a *general election* tomorrow, to which party or independent candidate would give your first preference vote? (Base: All adults 18+)






Treaty Vote By Demographic Groups




Impact of Satisfaction with performance of the government on vote behaviour



















Financial situation in household compared to 12 months ago








