Highly at risk from: generative artificial intelligence (AI) paraphrasing software contract cheating/essay mills and other outsourcing scenarios 	 Require stepped submission to demonstrate writing 'process' and evidence thought ownership. E.g. Week 3: Essay outline Week 5: Lit review Week 6: Draft Week 7: Peer review Week 9: Final copy Supplement with oral exams/ presentations to test thought ownership. Consider requiring students to submit their evidence of process development as a pdf file: this enables TurnItIn to track document metadata easily and discourages students from last-minute assignment panic. When faced with a potential academic integrity breach, you may find this 'Contract cheating detection for markers checklist' useful (developed by UK academics, 2021).
Oral assessment	Low.	Less potential for cheating. Also a strong option for assuring assessment integrity of other assessment types. For example use to test thought ownership of capstone projects, essays, theses etc.	 Ensure students have opportunities to practise mock-style oral exams in advance with peers.
