





Blooms Taxonomy of Reflection via Pappas

 $Six\ little\ steps\ {\tt http://peterpappas.com/2010/01/taxonomy-reflection-critical-thinking-students-teachers-principals.html}$

- Remember
 - What did I do/learn?
- Understand
 - What was important about that?
- Apply
 - Can I use this again? Where?
- Analyse
 - Is there a pattern? Can I link this to other learning or experiences?
- Evaluate
 - Did I do this task well? What did I do well?
 What can I improve?
- Create
 - What next?



Types of Volunteering and Styles of Reflection

Once off/regular/long-term?

Weekly/Summer?

Journal for weekly and summer

Blog for long-term, summer

Newspaper article, newsletter, video, website post

How do you know that you have reflected well?

Peer review through comments on online information.

Feedback from others for website pieces.
