Module Content	<p>This module examines constructions of gender and sexuality in either the Greek or the Roman world. You will study contrastive portrayals of women and men, ideals of masculinity and femininity, sexual norms and codes, theories about the male and female body, views on marriage, rape, adultery and prostitution, and the relation between art and 'real life': what we may deduce from texts and visual sources about the gender roles men and women were expected to play within family and state.</p>
Teaching and Learning Methods	<p>This module is taught through 11 weekly lectures and 5 small-group seminars, supported by online learning (Blackboard). Attendance and preparation are compulsory.</p>
