Module Content	What is Roman Republicanism? Is it a set of values (liberty and the rule of law), a package of institutions (magistrates, senate, and assemblies), a canon of virtues (honour and service to the state), or a narrative (how political freedom is created and breaks down)? Since antiquity, interpreters have been using the Roman Republic to debate what it means to be truly free, the role of the people in decision-making, what ethical and responsible leadership looks like, the limits of free speech, and whether humans can reach their full potential only in political societies.
	In this module we will grapple with these Roman Republican debates by reading the key texts of Cicero and Livy, and tracing the reception of this body of thought
