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
The Irish Language in Ireland

- Ireland has 2 official languages:
 Gaeilge (Irish) and English.
- English is the first language of the majority of Irish people.
- Irish is Ireland's first official language, and you will often see and hear Irish on signs, publications, TV and radio.
- An area where Irish is the main language of the community is called a gaeltacht. Most gaeltacht areas are on the west coast.





A Few Facts about Irish



- Irish is a Celtic language that has been influenced by Latin, Norse, French and English.
- The Irish language's spelling system is very different to English.
 - Aoife, Caoimhe, Ciara, Niamh, Aisling
 - Eoin, Oisín, Pádraig, Seán, Ciarán
- Most placenames in Ireland come from an old Irish-language name, e.g. Bally < Baile
