

Top tips when attending a Careers Fair

- Register in advance on MyCareer so you can view digital employer stands and updates.
- Do some research so you can prepare questions and find out if there working culture is a good fit for you,
- Keep an open mind. It might surprise you that tech firms need language graduates, pharma companies need computer science graduates, and some employers will hire you no matter what discipline you are in!

TYPES OF WORK AND OPPORTUNITIES

Summer Internships

Internships are valuable opportunities to gain handson experience in your field of interest. The key is to start your search early and tailor your applications to each opportunity.

- Most internships offer training to help you get up and running. You are generally given responsibility for a specific project, and may even present the results
- Positions are generally advertised between
 October and March. Closing dates are often early in the academic year, some as early as December.
- Most internships are targeted at Junior Sophisters
 but occasionally applications may be accepted from
 students of other years. Students from ALL
 disciplines are invited to apply to most internships.

Graduate Programmes

Graduate programmes are **structured training schemes**– usually with big employers – that help you **build skills and experience over 1-3 years.** You may get to rotate
between departments, get mentorship and even work
towards a qualification. They are most common in
sectors such as **finance**, **consulting**, **engineering**, **technology**, and the **public service**.

Most companies will advertise on **My Career** and will have a presence at one of our **Career Fairs** as well as at the **GradIreland careers fairs** that take place in Michaelmas Term.

Graduate Roles/Entry-level Jobs

Not every graduate job is part of a formal programme.

Many graduates start their working life in smaller companies or startups where you can get broader exposure and more hands-on experience. These opportunities are advertised at all times of year, according to when a company needs new staff.





Traineeships are more structured entry routes into careers like law, EU institutions, legal firms and chambers, NGOs and international organisations.

These roles often have clear learning goals and offer pathways into **full-time work.**

Spring Weeks

If you are a **Senior Freshman** student and interested in a career in **Finance** or **Consultancy**, look out for **Spring Weeks** – **short** internships, usually in the UK, that give early exposure to big firms. Spring Weeks often lead to internships which lead to graduate jobs so it's worth applying if you are curious about the sector.



Academic/Research Jobs

If you are interested in a **career in Higher Education**, there are many ways to get involved. Apply for **Summer Research Assistant** roles – often available through individual university departments. Check listings for **PhDs**, **PostDocs** and **academic jobs** on specialist websites. Reach out to **Academics in Trinity** or elsewhere, many research roles are **informal** or not advertised. Many undergrad research roles are supported by organisations like: **The Health Research Board** (Ireland), **The Genetics Society** (UK), or **The Society for General Microbiology** (UK).




>WORKING ABROAD

Resources

Working abroad isn't just exciting, it can give you valuable **international experience,** fresh perspectives and **skills that really stand out on a CV.** There are several organisations and tools to help your search:

- BUNAC offers programmes such as Summer Camp USA, KAMP USA and Work Canada.
- Erasmus+
- Trinity supports placements and internships abroad through this EU programme
- Euractiv, Graduateland, and GoinGlobal are great for job listings and help with visa advice



Planning Tips For Working Abroad



Trinity Global Room and the **Careers Service** can help guide your preparation. But here are some considerations:

- Research visa rules, work permits and application deadlines for your destination.
 Embassy websites are a good place to start
- Check the Department of Foreign Affairs for advice on passports, destination advice, visas, insurance, vaccinations and embassy contact details
- Arrange your own travel insurance for the entire duration of your stay abroad. You may need specific workplace insurance as not all policies cover internships or jobs.

Internships In Europe

Undertaking an internship in Europe may require some legal documentation to be completed in advance, e.g. Convention de Stage (France) or Convenio de Colaboración (Spain). These agreements should be signed by:

- The Internship Provider
- Trinity
- You

IMPORTANT! The Careers Service can only sign Convention De Stage Agreements for current registered students and only until the end of September in your final year.

Erasmus+ Traineeship Programme

Erasmus+ traineeship programme supports internships or work placements for students currently enrolled in Trinity and for recent graduates. Students can source their own traineeship abroad in an Erasmus+ Programme country.

A Learning Agreement must be signed in advance by the relevant Departmental Erasmus Co-ordinator and the Trinity Erasmus Officer. Contact **erasmus@tcd.ie** for further information.

Teaching English

Teaching English is a great way to live and work in another country. There are **2 main ways of going about this:**

- **1. TESOL** (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages)
 - Usually requires a teaching certificate
 - The Cambridge CELTA is the most recognised qualification
 - Check the **GradIreland TEFL page** for training options

2. Language Assistant Programmes

- Typically don't require a qualification, just a degree and native english speaker
- Popular options are JET Programme and British
 Council English Language Assistant Programme

The Hidden Jobs Market

Many jobs are **never advertised**. Some of the reasons for this include:

- Companies already have a bank of suitable candidates who have speculatively applied to the company
- Many companies use existing employee referrals to fill roles
- Potential employees are targeted using LinkedIn or other social media.

This can impact how you plan and job search so you are putting yourself in a position to **be considered** for these unadvertised jobs.





You can send job applications directly to a company even when they haven't advertised a role.

Here are some tips around speculative applications:



- Research the company and identify the person within that organisation who would be the best point of contact.
- Think about how you could add value to the organisation
- In your cover letter outline why you are interested in working (for them) and why you feel that you would be a good fit for that organisation.
- Highlight your skills and experience and what you feel you could contribute to the company.
- Follow up your correspondence with a phone call in approx. 2 weeks
- If there are no vacancies, ask the company to keep you application on file for future opportunities.

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Part-Time Work and Campus Jobs

Part-time work is a great way to **earn income, gain experience,** and **build transferable skills.** Trinity students can find part-time roles both on and off campus. You can look at **Trinity's internal job boards** and departmental notices as well as;

International students should check visa regulations regarding working hours. Always balance work with academic commitments.

Taking Time Out

Taking time out from work or study can be a **valuable opportunity for personal growth**. Students may take time out to **travel**, **volunteer**, **or upskill**.

Some options to consider include:

- Volunteering with NGOs
- Learning new skills through online courses



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQS)

How do I know which job is right for me?

Start by identifying your **interests**, **skills**, **and values**. Use career assessment tools available through the Trinity Careers Service like **'Map My Future'** or book a **one-on-one guidance appointment** via **MyCareer** to explore your options.

What does a strong CV or cover letter look like?

A strong CV is clear, concise, and tailored to the role. Include relevant experience, skills, and achievements. Cover letters should explain why you're a good fit. Check out our **short video** or book a **CV review session** with our team.



How do I prepare for interviews?

Watch our short video, check out our 'Guide to Interviewing' or do an online practice interview via Shortlist.me. Once you've taken these steps, you can book a interview prep session with our team and go through a mock interview scenario.



What are the most common mistakes students make when applying for jobs?

Common mistakes include using a generic CV, missing deadlines, and not researching the employer. Always tailor your application and **proofread** carefully.



How do I follow up after a job interview or networking event?

Send a polite thank-you email shortly afterwards. Mention something specific you discussed and express your continued interest in the role or connection. Feel free to check in with the prospective employer after two weeks if you haven't received any response.



What are the steps to apply for a poststudy work visa (Stamp 1G)?

Check the Irish Immigration website for the latest requirements. Typically, you'll need proof of graduation, a valid passport, and health insurance. Apply before your Stamp 2 expires.



How do I manage job hunting while balancing coursework?

Create a weekly schedule that includes dedicated job search time. Use tools like MyCareer alerts to streamline your search and avoid last-minute applications.



What if I don't get a job right after graduation?

It's common to take time to find the right role. Consider internships, volunteering, or short-term work to build experience. Stay connected with the **Careers Service for ongoing support.**



I'm not getting any responses from recruiters, what can I do?

The job search can be challenging and everyone is faced with job rejections at some point in their life. It's key not to focus on the set-back, but to learn from the experience. Check out our resource on 'Managing Setbacks'. Or book your 1-1 appointment with your Career consultant for direct support.



How do I build experience if I don't have any yet?

Look for volunteering, part-time work, or student society roles. Apply for the Trinity Career Skills Award if you are a current Trinity student. These all develop transferable skills. Check out our page on 'Build Your Skills' for further resources.



How do I use LinkedIn effectively if I don't have many connections?

You can attend a LinkedIn session by booking this on MyCareer. Then it's time to, start connecting with classmates, lecturers, and Trinity alumni. Share your interests and achievements. Join relevant groups and follow companies you admire.



What are the best ways to find hidden job opportunities?

Networking is key. Attend career events, connect with alumni, and reach out to employers directly. Many roles are filled through referrals before being advertised.



How do I negotiate salary or benefits if I get a job offer?

Research typical salaries for your role and location.

Be polite and professional when discussing terms. The

Careers Service can help you prepare for these
