

- Where the output of GenAI is used to inform a student's document or work output, this usage should be acknowledged and appropriately cited, as per <u>Library guidelines on acknowledging and</u> <u>reference GenAI</u>;
- From an academic integrity perspective, if a student generates content from a GenAI tool and submits it as his/her/their own work, it is considered plagiarism, which is defined as academic misconduct in accordance with College Academic Integrity Policy.

Acknowledging & Referencing Gen AI

For an overview of Generative AI – what it is, how it works, its limitations and risks, please see Trinity's Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) Hub.

Please note, the use of Generative AI is permitted unless otherwise stated in course handbooks. However, you must (at a minimum) acknowledge its use, using the guidance given in this LibGuide.

This guidance presents the Library of Trinity College Dublin's general approach to acknowledging the use of generative AI and referencing generative AI. GenAI is evolving rapidly and there is not yet general consensus on how to acknowledge and reference it. This guidance will therefore continue to be reviewed and updated.



Generative Artificial Intelligence

- The use of GenAI is permitted, in line with <u>Trinity Statement on</u>
 <u>Artificial Intelligence</u>, the TCD <u>GenAI hub</u>, and the M.Ed. Policy on AI
 (<u>Handbook</u>, Appendix 3);
- Students using GenAI in a way that is in line with College Policy must acknowledge its use through the form provided in the M.Ed. <u>Handbook</u>, Appendix 4;
- Al tools are treated similarly to peers within a peer assessment context students can discuss their ideas and work with the Al tool, but they must ensure that all of the work you submit is their own.

Generative Artificial Intelligence



- M.Ed. students do not have permission to use AI tools in a way which
 means that the substantive work of conceptualising and/or writing the
 assignment is not their own and as a result, that assessors cannot
 ascertain whether the M.Ed. learning outcomes have been met;
- It is not permitted to copy an entire conversation or any part thereof
 that a student has had with an AI tool into their assignment.


Support for PG Students with Disabilities
