

About the School of Education

- The School of Education was established in 1905 (and had the first professorial chair in education in Ireland)
- Long tradition in offering research degrees at masters and doctoral level
- First University in Ireland to introduce a professional doctorate in education (2005)
- Highest ranked School of Education in Ireland (73rd in QS world rankings; 95th THES world rankings 2020 data)
- Very active research culture 2 university research centres and 4 research groups
- Regularly host research conferences, seminars, podcasts and related events
- 15 full-time academic staff; 8 administrators
- 500 students: 80 doctoral, 200 MEd, 160 PME, 40 BMusEd
- Seen 30 DEd completions
- 10-15 PhD graduations per year
- Cohort of experienced doctoral supervisors all of whom are research active

Overview of the DEd Programme

Four-year part-time postgraduate course leading to an NFQ Level 10 qualification

Opportunity to engage in substantial and sustained high-quality research

Programme structure conducive to practitioners needs

Focus on developing deeper critical understanding of own professional practice

Consists of 5 modules and a 60/70K word research-based thesis

Small Cohort Based (10-12 in a the group)

Enable

Enable students to question, challenge and to transform personal and professional knowledge in a deep and meaningful way that has direct impact on thought and practice.

Develop

Develop a strong sense of belonging to a cohort of mutually supportive professional inquirers and critical thinkers that will provide a social, professional and academic bond that assists each student in their persistence.

Engage

Engage in innovative and creative pedagogical practice within the programme and in particular to explore different and imaginative ways of assessing learning and progress through the programme.


What is the structure of the DEd?

Supervision

Students work with a supervisor from 'day one' who in a relationship based on collegiality guides and supports the development of the research thesis.

The Modules

The five modules offered over three years have been designed to both intellectually challenge and support students over their DEd 'Journey'.



Your Research

Students produce a thesis based on an identified issue which is both a contribution to knowledge and professional practice.

What are the DEd entry requirements?

An appropriate masters level qualification or equivalent

A minimum of three years experience in an educational or related context

In addition to holding an appropriate masters level qualification, the entry process will also involve:

- The submission and approval of a research proposal that demonstrates the *potential* to work at doctoral level.
- Interview with the course director and (potential) supervisor to discuss and evaluate the above proposal and student's suitability and potential for study at a doctoral level.
- Review of the application by the DEd Applications Committee.

What to consider when applying

As the DEd is primarily a research-based programme. We strongly recommend that you think about what the focus of your research will be.

Successful applicants onto the programme are usually matched to a supervisor in relation to their subject area and methodology.

. . .so please do look at our academic staff web pages to see what areas or fields we currently work in.

We also strongly recommend that potential applicants contact a (listed) member of staff or the programme director to discuss their research prior to putting in a formal application.

...this can help develop the application or perhaps reconsider whether the DEd is the right programme for you.

- DEd students are allocated a supervisor(s) who supports, guides and helps facilitate the research & thesis
- They are usually experts and active researchers in the student's chosen field of study
- Essential for 'getting through' the doctoral process
- Students begin their research from 'day one' of the programme
- We have a lot of experienced supervisors in the School of Education
- They have usually gone through the doctoral process themselves!
- Students are expected to meet on a regular basis their supervisor to progress the research
