Module Content:

Shakespeare in Ireland begins by considering the Irish context of Shakespeare's *The Tempest*. We then move to Ireland itself and examine the many different ways in which Shakespeare's work has been appreciated and appropriated in the country over the centuries. Topics to be considered include the history of Shakespeare productions in Ireland; the publication of his plays in the country; appropriations across a broad political spectrum; the influence of Shakespeare's work on Irish writers. The module includes a number of out-of-classroom sessions.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the module students will:

- 1. have an understanding of the Irish context of Shakespeare's work;
- 2. have an understanding of the role that Shakespeare has played in the development of Irish culture over the course of several centuries;
- 3. have engaged with a broad range of texts relevant to a consideration of the topic;
- 4. have learned to conduct original research on project topics of their own devising.

Learning Aims:

- 1. Students will engage with a variety of texts from week to week, from Shakespeare's own work to texts relating to or drawing inspiration from Shakespeare.
- 2. Students will be taken off campus to engage with materials at various venues, including Smock Alley and the Pearse Museum.
- 3. Students will be required to draw up a research proposal for a substantial original project and will be given guidance in completing that project.
