Module Content:

On this module, we study literatures produced in the context of settler nations, focusing in particular on writing and visual art from Canada, Latin/South America, Australia, and New Zealand. We will look at writers and artists of settler descent as well as indigenous and immigrant narratives and how each of them negotiate issues of place, race, and belonging. Texts include poetry, novels, and short fiction, as well as theoretical engagements with settler colonialism, landscape painting, and histories of migration.

Learning Outcomes:

- identify central themes in the literatures of settler colonies
- recognize and analyse themes and theories central to the study of the literatures of settler cultures
- examine the connection between history, politics, and the arts in the context of settler nations
- reflect and write critically on any topic in the areas studied

Learning Aims:

Central questions include:

- How do the writers and artists on the module engage with landscape and place?
- How does this engagement impact on the poetics and aesthetics of their work?
- To what extent does relationship to place affect indigenous and non-indigenous belonging and/or unbelonging?
- How is belonging (indigenous and non-indigenous) entangled with the history of colonialism?

Assessment Details:

- 1 close reading exercise, 1000-15000 words, counting 30% of the overall mark
- 1 essay, 4000-4500 words, counting 70% of the overall mark
