

What does it mean to go 'behind the headlines'? A decade ago, the Trinity Long Room Hub, Trinity's research institute for the university's Arts and Humanities disciplines, tried out a new format for addressing the pressing issues of our time. Prompted by the 2015 terrorist attack on the *Charlie Hebdo* offices in Paris, we convened a diverse panel of academics and practitioners with a public audience to pool expertise, share insights, and reflect on the wider historical and cultural implications of what had happened. Trinity's 'Behind the Headlines' series was born.



Over the decade that followed, the series evolved to become a key forum for interrogating the headlines, a way – in the words of former Trinity Long Room Hub Director Juergen Barkhoff – 'to go beyond entrenched arguments and under the skin'. It took on major world issues such as climate catastrophe, racism, the rise of populism and a global pandemic, but also turned to domestic concerns, such as the redrafting of Ireland's constitution or the quality of Dublin's civic plan. Each time, the format has been simple: 10-minute talks by experts and researchers, and then a wide-ranging and respectful public discussion of the topic.

Most important – Behind the Headlines took full advantage of leading research in the Arts and Humanities, drawing on contributions from historians, linguists, ethicists, dramatists, film-makers, artists and literary scholars in order to better understand our world. The Behind the Headlines series has shown us, consistently, the need for imaginative, sometimes abstract thinking, and for nuanced historicised approaches that re-integrate the 'human factor' into an increasingly complicated global landscape.

The Trinity Long Room Hub team has been immensely proud to run this series, and could not have done so without huge support from Terry and Marjorie Neill; the John Pollard Foundation; the 150+ individuals who spoke on our panels; and from the many thousands who have attended – both in person and online – across the decade. Our thanks to all involved. And for the next ten years? If the headlines keep coming, we'll keep talking.






