## God and Politics in the New Millennium

In December 2024, the Loyola Institute hosted a lunchtime discussion on the theme of 'Awaiting the presidency of Donald Trump: theological, ethical, and legal reflections', involving professors James Keenan (Boston College), and Linda Hogan and Neville Cox (TCD). After the US election, two paths seemed to be open to us: either we respect the democratic will of the people and try to carry on 'as normal', or we acknowledge that the election poses a clear and present danger to democratic norms and to the rule of law.

Professor Keenan put the case for sounding the alarm. He identified a number of key themes, for example the different kinds of populism in play, and the need to refocus on values instead of interests. Vital to any recovery is educational reform: much of the resentment which fuels the support

for President Trump derives from the sedimented inequalities of the US educational system. Here is one example of the widespread erosion of 'social trust' in precisely those institutions- politicians, the media, the judiciary, universities- which are there to conserve and protect our well-being. Restoring 'social trust', so as to overcome polarisation, is essential.

Whatever else can be said about the new presidency, three months in, it is not 'business as usual'. The shock has left many people floundering to even describe the new reality. Is the Trump regime 'fascist', or 'neo-fascist'? Or is it better described as 'authoritarian'? And what should be the response of the churches, given the attractiveness of parts of the Trump agenda to many Christian believers? Such believers enthusiastically welcome Donald Trump as God's 'messianic' agent, just as King Cyrus of Persia was acclaimed by the prophet Isaiah for restoring the Israelites to their promised land. The Loyola Institute will host another event to try and make theological sense of all of this. We will do so by taking a wider-lens approach than simply looking at the current US administration. 'God and Politics in the New Millennium' will take stock of the last twenty-five years, in the light of a two thousand year tradition of reflection of what, precisely, 'belongs' to Caesar rather than God. The conversation between Jesus and Pontius Pilate (John, chapters 18-19), is the iconic confrontation of sacred and secular power. It touches upon matters of truth,

of political legitimacy and exceptionalism, of populist and institutional violence, of the mysterious connection between silence and prophecy.

Our reflection upon this gospel text will empower us to think, seriously and well, about our perplexing and challenging situation, when not only Bible passages but also classic thinkers from the Christian tradition are being claimed by each side of the divide.

In August 2025, the Loyola Institute, Trinity College, Dublin will host the congress of the European Society for Catholic Theology.

The congress will address the relevance of theology for contemporary Europe, with its many challenges. Theology must allow itself to be addressed by questions of culture and the contemporary world, while at the same time seeking to bring its insights to contemporary discussion in politics, society, and church. Serious questions arise: climate change, the movement of peoples, the dignity of human life in an era of technological advances, the reemergence of war in Europe, the persistence of sexual abuse and its mishandling, the crisis of theological institutions. These will be addressed in the keynotes as well as in almost 100 parallel paper sessions.

The congress reflects on the formative influence of

Christianity on European culture, considering whether, and how, it might be influential today. Throughout, the Congress seeks to better understand the vocation of the Church to articulate the mystery that is God to the contemporary world.

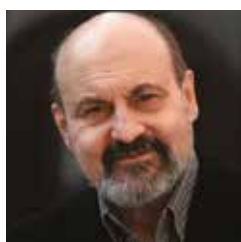

It took place in 325, so there are a lot of commemorative events this year. The Loyola Institute hopes to co-host our own event on this theme in the autumn.

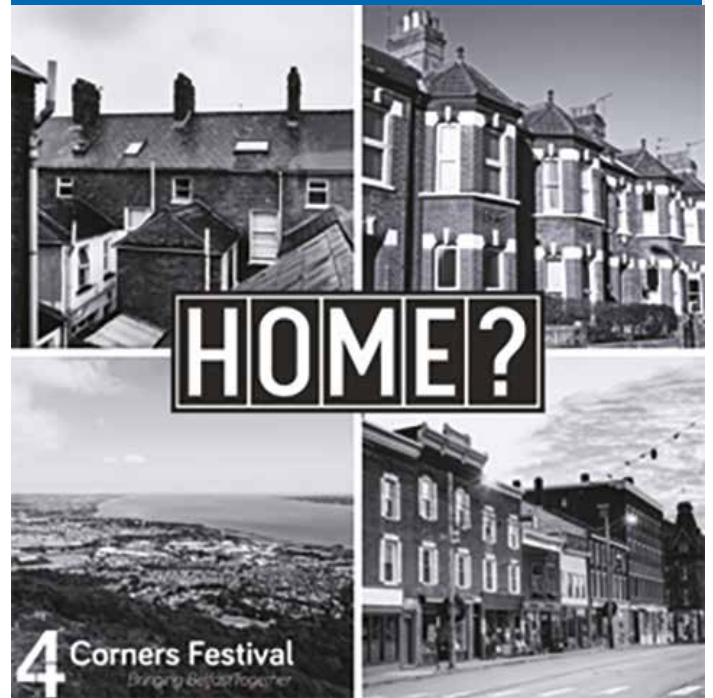

## Professor Garrigan – Public Theology Speaker at Belfast’s Four Corners Festival



Belfast’s Four Corners Festival was founded to encourage people to travel to and engage with the residents of parts of the city they might otherwise not visit. Each February, a ten-day programme of music, exhibitions, talk and schools events entices people out of and into every corner of the city. This year, the festival’s theme was ‘Home’ and the theology talk was given by Siobhán Garrigan and followed by over an hour’s conversation with a lively and diverse audience that packed out the venue on the Falls Road.

# The Annual Loyola St Brigit's Lecture

Dr Catherine Swift delivered the latest in the Loyola Institute annual series of St Brigit's lectures in February 2025. Her fascinating lecture was entitled *Young girls and independent women: the early followers of St Brigit*.

Here is how Catherine describes her lecture:

When Cardinal Paparo came to Ireland in the mid twelfth century, he was horrified to discover that the bishops of Ireland included the Abbess of Kildare in their deliberations when meeting in synodal conclave and insisted that such a practice should cease. John of Salisbury's tale graphically illustrates the immense prestige of St Brigit's community in pre-Norman Ireland and the reason she is remembered as one of the three patron saints of Ireland. It is argued in this paper that one of the reasons for such prestige was that the community fitted seamlessly into the secular structures of Irish life, with the abbess fostering and educating young girls and acting as aristocratic patron or *flaith* to their mothers once they were married.

prevailing model of an enclosed lifestyle for female ascetics practiced in the western Mediterranean world of the fourth and fifth centuries but instead appears to have been inspired by the community-orientated and charitable foundations of the Greek-speaking world associated with the Cappadocian Fathers and, in particular, the family of St Basil, St Makrina and St Gregory of Nyssa.

St Brigit is also remembered, astonishingly, for providing independent women who wished to live as radical Christians far from Kildare itself, with the means to earn a livelihood. The Kildare community did not share the

## A Theology of Home in a Time of Homelessness

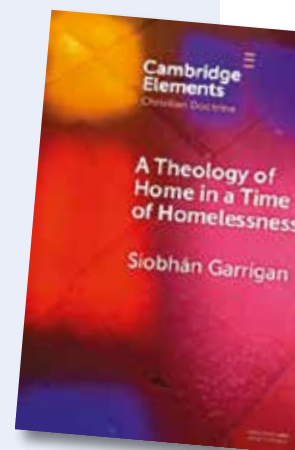


Professor Garrigan's latest book, published this Spring, argues that for theology to play its part in ending homelessness, it must better understand its own concept of 'home'.

Drawing on her own experiences of living and working with people experiencing homelessness, it proposes a vision of home capable of resisting the tacit, mistaken theology of home that undergirds the various iterations of modern homelessness.

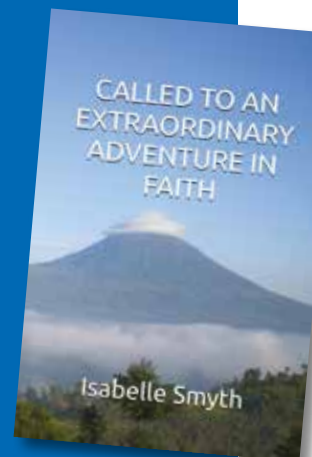
Weaving biblical and ritual sources, the argument constructs theological responses to the twin forces of consumerism and nationalism which, alloyed with sexism and racism, constitute the time of homelessness in which we live. It asks the reader to imagine home as 'participating instead of possessing' in every sphere of life, in pursuit of a theology of home capable of preventing homelessness and not merely ministering to people experiencing it.

## Theology and Social Justice – New Postgraduate Course

Applications are now being accepted for study on an exciting new course at Trinity College Dublin -- a Masters in Theology and Social Justice, with PG Certificate and PG Diploma exit routes. Students will be offered unique insight into how religious ideas shape and are shaped by the concrete social realities of today's world. The course aims to further efforts to combat poverty, the climate crisis, racism, homelessness, sexism, misogyny, homophobia, ableism, ageism, and religious discrimination.

The course will be taught interactively and immersively by two Loyola professors – Siobhán Garrigan and Jacob Erickson – and the Director of the Jesuit Centre for Faith and Justice, Kevin Hargaden. Core modules address theologies of the climate crisis, homelessness, racism, and economic justice. Optional modules explore the intersection of theology and social justice as it relates to public policy in Ireland and the EU, as well as issues of gender and sexuality, poverty and wealth disparity, and how mysticism and politics inform one another.

Most of the classes for this new course will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday between 4 and 7pm, and it is anticipated that graduates will go to careers in a broad range of areas, including government, journalism, law, education, NGOs and the creative arts, as well as to ministries in parishes and other faith-based organisations. 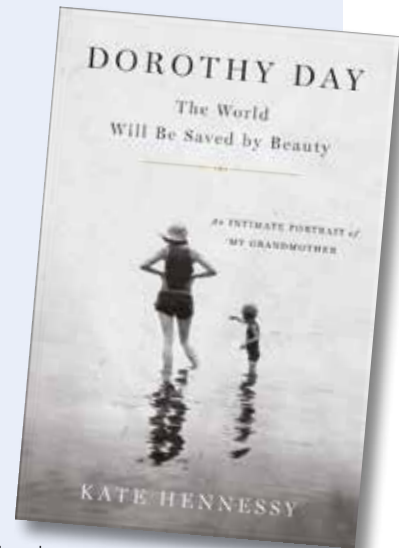
## American Academy of Religion Leadership

Prof. Jacob Erickson continues to serve as the chair of the Martin Luther and Global Lutheran Traditions Unit of the American Academy of Religion and also helps to oversee the AAR International Collaboration Committee's important International Grants Competition. At the last Annual Meeting, November 2024 in San Diego, California, Prof. Erickson organized and presented in a multidisciplinary panel for the Religion and Ecology Unit that responded to English Literature scholars Jeffrey Jerome Cohen and Julian Yates' new book, *Noah's Arkive* (University of Minnesota Press). The book explores the ecological implications of the story of Noah's Ark, climate justice, and displacement.



## Dorothy Day for Today's Times

During the last week of the Spring semester, Professor Siobhán Garrigan welcomed to Trinity the youngest of Dorothy Day's four grandchildren, Kate Hennessy, to give a public talk entitled "Dorothy Day – A Prophetic Voice for our Times". Kate offered anecdotes and insights from her Granny's life and legacy, and talked about the difficult but creative process of writing her acclaimed biography, *Dorothy Day: The World Will Be Saved by Beauty – An Intimate Portrait of My Grandmother*. Prof. Garrigan responded with reflections on Dorothy Day's ongoing influence in both the church and academia, and the large audience, invited by the Irish School of Ecumenics, discussed issues ranging from Day's canonisation to her family life to her appeal to young people today.



## College Theological Society's 194th Session

Prof. Jacob Erickson served this past year as President of the College Theological Society for its 194th Session. Prof. Erickson offered the Presidential Address for the society 10th February, 2025, on the topic of "Theological Reflections for a Moment of Crisis." 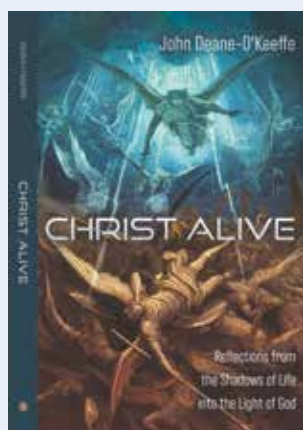
## PAUL CORCORAN

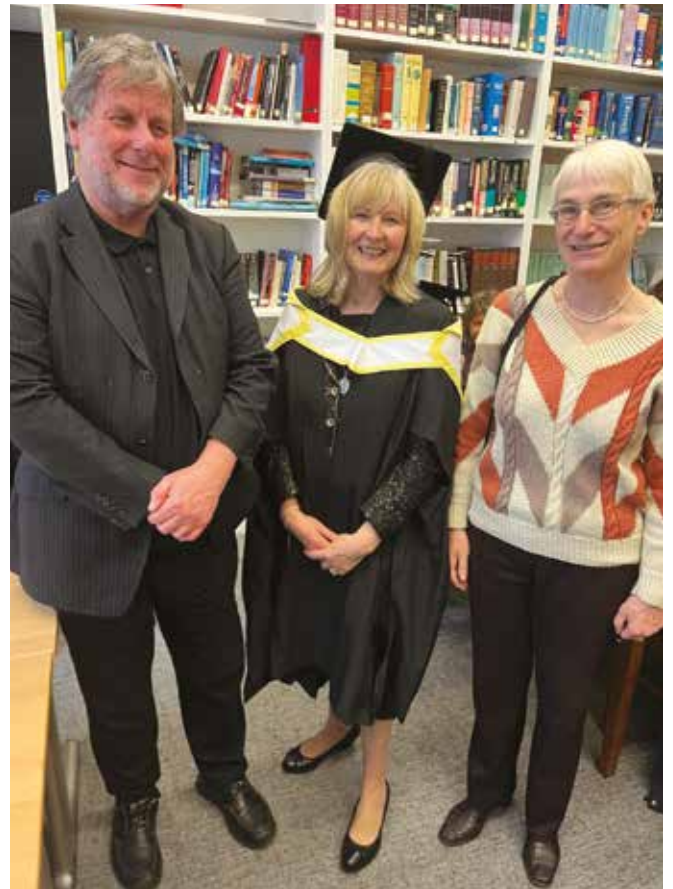

# The Good Person and the Beloved Planet

On April 28, the Loyola Institute co-hosted, with the Irish School of Ecumenics, a seminar given by Dr

Nancy Rourke, from St John Fisher University, Rochester, New York. She presented on the connection between Catholic moral theology and 'integral ecology', that is, the description of the ecological crisis promoted by Pope Francis in *Laudato Si'*. This encyclical invited us to see the earth as 'our common home', and consider how all the crises we face- political, social, spiritual, as well as ecological- are interrelated.

Catholic virtue ethics helps us to address these crises. Just as an individual person becomes virtuous by means of internal dynamics and patterns of desire, passions, and

reasoning, so he or she is subject to swirling flows of influence in our society and our environment. 'Integral ecology' is an invitation to 're-imagine ourselves ecologically, cultivating our environments within and without'. Prior to her arrival in Ireland, Dr Rourke was a speaker at an international conference hosted by the *Laudato Si'* Research Institute at Campion Hall, Oxford. Theologians and scientists reflected together on the encyclical, on its tenth anniversary. Dr Michael Kirwan SJ was one of the panellists. The event had an especial poignancy, given the passing of Pope Francis a few days earlier.
