





IRELAND



Unique collaboration between The RESTORE project and the "Partnership for Health System Sustainability and Resilience"

Unlike other countries, no funding from private sector sources

Aim: To evaluate health system resilience and sustainability – with special focus on the COVID-19 era

Seven domains – governance, financing HR, service delivery, medicines and IT, population health and environmental sustainability

Data – huge variety of secondary sources and primary interviews with key informants

PRESTO Process

- 2. 1st Expert Group Meeting Technical discussion of key issues and focus for report
- 3. Report Development
- 2nd Expert group Meeting –
 Technical discussion of analysis and findings
- 5. First Draft
- 6. International Peer review



Very long waiting lists, burnout, innovation, funding


What's next?
