Module Content	
Module Description	The law touches on almost every area of our daily lives, and our entanglement with law raises numerous philosophical questions. What is law? Are laws equivalent to commands? Do we have a moral duty to obey the law? Should we punish people who don't? In this course, we will examine these questions, and others like them. The course is split into two parts. In the first part, we will look at different answers to the question 'What is law?'. In the second part, we will focus on normative questions surrounding the use of law, and our relation to it as private citizens.
