Module Content	
Module Description	Many of today's most pressing social problems are not the result of what any one person has done but rather the product of many people acting together. In this course, we will study philosophical questions raised by the interconnectedness of contemporary life. These will be split into three themes. First, we will consider questions about the nature of group action, e.g., What it takes for several people to act together, rather than merely side-by-side? Can groups constitute agents in their own right? Second, we will examine the ethical questions posed by group action, e.g., What does it take for an individual to be complicit in a group wrong? Do I have a moral reason not to contribute to collectively caused harms, if the difference my action makes is negligible? Finally, we will consider questions surrounding the concept of solidarity, e.g., What does being in solidarity with others require of us? What, if anything, is morally good about solidarity? What role can the concept play in the analysis and delivery of social justice?
Learning Outcomes	At the end of this module students will: Have detailed knowledge of key contemporary texts in the philosophy of group agency, moral complicity, and solidarity.
