Module Content	
Module Description	Idealism encompasses a range of metaphysical views which treat the mental as somehow prior to, or more fundamental than, the physical. It is common these days to hear idealism spoken of as a movement that happened in the 18th and 19th centuries, suggesting that this tradition is now over. Yet, while idealism is certainly no longer the dominant view in Western philosophy, it is by no means dead. In this course, we will look at recent contemporary arguments both in support of and against various versions of idealism. We will also consider some genuinely novel idealist positions, that have been developed in the 21st century.
Module Learning Aims	This module will provide an overview of contemporary work on idealism.
Learning Outcomes	Students will become familiar with some key contemporary developments in idealism, including the recent idealist positions defended by Thomas Hofweber and Richard Gaskin. Some of the arguments we look at will be quite complicated, drawing on nuanced concepts in the philosophy of language. This will offer a great opportunity for students to develop the
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	intellectual patience required to unpack and engage with intricate material.
