MEMORANDUM TO STUDENTS

JAMES Haire Memorial Prizes

2024-25

In 2002, the Irish School of Ecumenics Trust established the James Haire Memorial Prizes, in memory of the late Revd. Professor James Haire, former Principal of Union Theological College, Belfast.

Seven prizes are awarded annually, two in each of the Contextual Theologies and Interfaith Relations, International Peace Studies and Conflict Resolution and Reconciliation courses. Each prize will be worth €100. In each MPhil programme one prize will be offered for the highest mark in a dissertation, and one for the highest essay marks. In each case the prize for the dissertation will be awarded first, and the winner of that prize may not be considered for award of the essay prize.

Awards will be made by the appropriate Court of Examiners, whose decision will be final.

Registering with a doctor (GP)

A UK student visa entitles you to use of the health service while you are in the UK. We recommend you register with a GP practice at the start of your studies in case you need healthcare during your stay.

Telephone the doctor's surgery in your area (see list below) to make an appointment to register and to find out which documents you need to bring. You may like to bring a list of your medications with you.

Once registered, to get an appointment, phone first thing in the morning, from 8.30am, and you will be put on a list to receive a call from the doctor. If the doctor decides you need to be seen, you will be offered an in-person appointment. More information on services.

Students with a UK student visa

1. Before you arrive

We are required to ask for confirmation of your date of arrival. Please send a copy of your flight ticket to sradmblfst@tcd.ie. NB: if you travel before the start date on your student visa and enter as a tourist, your student visa won't be activated. You will need to leave and re-enter after the valid from date on your visa.

Please also forward confirmation of your visa - this may be a vignette in your passport, or if you received a digital visa, a share code for online verification.

2. After arrival

If you are getting a BRP card this will be available for collection from the main Post Office branch in High Street. Please bring it into the CRR office for copying, or alternatively, email an image of both sides.

Please bring along your passport at the start of term so we can take a copy of your entry stamp if applicable. (If you entered through e-passport gates you won't have gotten a stamp.)

Let us know your term time address and contact telephone number

Please forward your address in Belfast and a contact telephone number to the CRR office at sradmblfst@tcd.ie and keep us updated if your contact details change during your studies.

Accessing healthcare

A UK student visa entitles you to access the health service. It is a good idea to register with your local GP (doctor's) practice at the start of term. More information, including a list of GP practices, is available on the Healthcare factsheet at this link.

Opening a bank account

Once you are fully registered and have your term time address, we can provide a letter confirming your student status and address to help you open a bank account. Or you might prefer to try digital banks like Monzo, Revolut, The Chase, or Wise. Trinity accepts Revolut for student finance payments.

Attendance register

As we are required to keep attendance records for students on a UK student visa, there is an attendance register in the CRR office. Please quickly visit and sign in once a week during term time.

Bring your ID if you are travelling south of the border

Very rarely there can be ID checks on public transport travelling south of the border. It's a good idea to carry your Trinity ID, and BRP if you have one. If you are going to Dublin at the start of term you can order and collect your student ID card. Alternatively, we will request it to be sent to the CRR office for collection.

Short Irish Visitor Visas

Some students will need a short Irish visitor visa to travel between Belfast and Dublin during the year (in addition to the UK visa). You can apply for this online after arrival. Find out more in the Guide for International Students. However, you can take the whole CRR course without needing to go to Dublin!

- Extra steps to scan a book on the flatbed feeder where you want all the pages to scan into one document:
 - Hit Settings Source Flatbed Scanner Multiple pages
 - Scan your first page, then load page 2, Scan and hit OK and so on
 - After the last page select Done
- The scanner creates a folder named HPSCANS on your USB drive, and it saves the file in .PDF or.JPG format using an automatically generated file name.

FIRE EMERGENCY PROCEDURE

Upon Discovering a Fire:

- 1. Raise the alarm by breaking the glass at a fire alarm call point
 - 2. Dial **999** and ask for the fire brigade
- 3. If you have been trained and only if you deem it safe to do so, use the fire extinguishing equipment to fight the fire.

WARNING! do not put yourself at risk!

If you don't feel safe fighting the fire, always evacuate the building.

The fire alarm is a loud, continuous siren.

when you hear the fire alarm sounding:

- 1. Leave the building through the nearest available signed exit
- 2. Walk, don't run
- 3. Do not return to collect personal items
- 4. Go to the fire assembly point in the car park in front of the main entrance
- 5. Do not leave the assembly point until instructed you can do so by the fire safety officer/attending fire and rescue officer in charge.

Be prepared! find out where your nearest fire exit is before you may need to use it.
