MEMORANDUM TO STUDENTS

JAMES Haire Memorial Prizes

2026-27

In 2002, the Irish School of Ecumenics Trust established the James Haire Memorial Prizes, in memory of the late Revd. Professor James Haire, former Principal of Union Theological College, Belfast.

Seven prizes are awarded annually, two in each of the Contextual Theologies and Interfaith Relations, International Peace Studies and Conflict Resolution and Reconciliation courses. Each prize will be worth €100. In each MPhil programme one prize will be offered for the highest mark in a dissertation, and one for the highest essay marks. In each case the prize for the dissertation will be awarded first, and the winner of that prize may not be considered for award of the essay prize.

Awards will be made by the appropriate Court of Examiners, whose decision will be final.

Please note that the Reading Room is a '**QUIET SPACE**' for reading and studying. There are no pre-booked tables and use of same is on a 'first come, first served' basis. Only students from the RTPS programmes can use this room (Postgraduate Taught/Research Students and BA Religion, Single / Joint Hons). **School Classrooms:** These must only be used for classes and pre-booked events. FIRE / BUILDING EVACUATION PROCEDURE

SCHOOL OF RELIGION, THEOLOGY, AND PEACE STUDIES DUBLIN – TRINITY CENTRAL & SRTPS BUILDING

The School Safety Officer is responsible for ensuring that the fire risk assessment is undertaken and implemented.

If an individual should discover a fire, they should:

- **RAISE THE ALARM** – by breaking the nearest break glass unit or call point.
- **LEAVE the building** using the nearest exit route, closing doors behind you.
- **NOTIFY SECURITY CENTRE on Ext. 1999.**
- **REPORT to the Assembly Point D – At the small triangular lawn east end of rugby ground** and remain with the group. Those assembled may be advised of the need to move to an alternative Assembly Point location.

ON HEARING THE ALARM:

- **LEAVE the building** using the nearest exit route, closing doors behind you.
- **Do not use the lift.**
- **REPORT to the Assembly Point D – At the triangular lawn east end of rugby ground** and remain with the group. Those assembled may be advised of the need to move to an alternative Assembly Point location.
- The staff member in charge of each area will check the building to ensure that everyone has left.
- **Individuals should not return to the building for any reason until they are authorized to do so.**
- **Individuals should stay clear of Emergency Services – Ambulances, Fire brigade etc.**

PLEASE REMEMBER:

- All staff and students are requested to familiarize themselves with the location of the main Exit Doors, the fire alarm break glass units located throughout the building; the Assembly Point D - At the small triangular lawn east end of rugby ground.
- Individuals should make sure that the area they are vacating is safe i.e., close doors behind you. However, they should not, under any circumstance, take any personal risks.
- Individuals should not rush or panic, as this can result in injury to oneself or others.
- **Individuals should not return to the building for any reason until they are authorized to do so.**
- Keep Exit routes clear, at all times.
- Each area should be kept in good order; tidy and clutter free. Any electrical faults should be reported to the School Administrator, who in turn will contact Ext. 1828.
- Individuals should stay clear of Emergency Services – Ambulances, Fire brigade etc.,

FIRE ALARMS

The ISE-LI building is provided with an automatic fire-alarm system, which is regularly tested by the College Estates and Facilities Office. The fire alarm can be manually triggered from any of the several break-glass alarm boxes (BGAB), which are placed in strategic areas within all buildings. In the event of a fire, the fire-alarm system should be activated immediately and the building evacuated. Persons in charge of lecture theatres should assist with the evacuation of their areas. The fire alarm is a continuous ringing bell.

The School Safety Officer is responsible for ensuring that the fire risk assessment is undertaken and implemented.

ON DISCOVERING A FIRE, HE / SHE SHOULD

- **RAISE THE ALARM** – by breaking the nearest break glass unit or call point.
- **LEAVE THE BUILDING** via the nearest exit route while closing doors behind you. (SEE SITE MAP WITH EXITS)
- **REPORT to the Assembly Point D – FLAT IRON** (flat wood sculpture on small triangular lawn east end of rugby ground) and remain with the group. Those assembled may be advised of the need to move to an alternative Assembly Point location.
- **NOTIFY SECURITY CENTRE** on Ext. 1999. (01-896-1999)

ON HEARING THE ALARM:

- **LEAVE** the Building
- **CLOSE** doors behind you as you leave
- **DO NOT** use the lift.
- **MOVE AWAY** from the building and **REPORT** to the Assembly Point

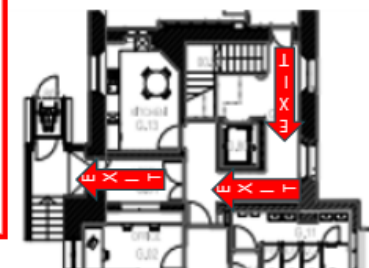
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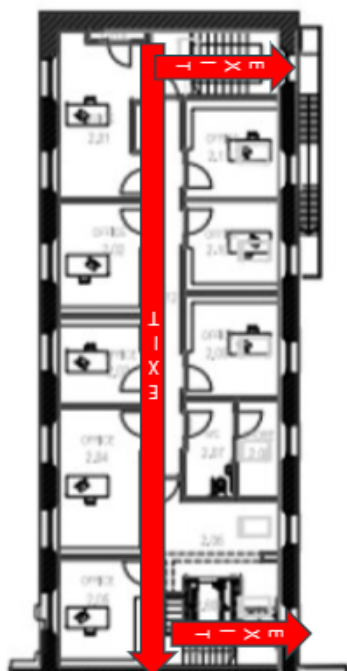
