The LIFELANGS project is seeking to recruit **four highly motivated and outstanding post-doctoral research fellows for a period of four years (48 months)** The project is one of four new cross-border large-scale research projects supported by the North-South Research Programme (NSRP), administered by Ireland's Higher Education Authority. This research programme is a key pillar of the Government of Ireland's Shared Island strategy, advancing an all-island research agenda that strengthens cross-border ties and delivers real, lasting impact for communities across Ireland and Northern Ireland. Funded under the Emerging Hubs of Excellence Strand, the LIFELANGS observatory aims to secure a more inclusive and resilient future for all and create a critical mass of interdisciplinary expertise and evidence-based resources in languages, education, and social sciences.

- Two of the Post-Doctoral Research Fellows will be based, respectively, at Queen's University Belfast, and at Trinity College Dublin.
- Close intra-institutional collaboration and cross-border mobility is a key feature of the project.
- LIFELANGS employs a mixed method approach to study everyday phenomenon of language learning, language use, and the construction and (re)presentation of identities.
- In addition to four new Post-Doctoral Research Fellows, the project consortium comprises two Co-PIs (Prof. Lorna Carson, TCD, and Dr Aisling O'Boyle, QUB), a team of eight academic Co-Leads drawn from TCD and QUB, and four PhD student researchers.

 collaborate with the full project consortium as well as external partners. The LIFELANGS
 Observatory Post-Doctoral Research Fellows will each work on an identified research stream. Each research
 stream will have an assigned PhD student researcher, co-supervised by the stream's Post-Doctoral
 Research Fellow.
- Successful candidates will have a strong interest and background in the subject area of the LIFELANGS project and be intrinsically motivated to work on an identified research stream.

Research Stream 1 - Language Riches


To evidence the rich linguistic and cultural diversities of communities on the shared island of Ireland.

Research Stream 2 - Lived Identities

To examine how cultural and linguistic identities intersect with dimensions such as age, gender, class, health, disability, sexuality, race, religion, and ethnicity.

Research Stream 3 - People, Places, Purposes

To better understand how speakers and communities learn, use, and teach their languages (spoken and signed) in formal, non-formal, informal contexts throughout the lifespan.



Research Stream 4 - Shared Resources

To develop evidence-based language and intercultural awareness education tools essential for a shared island.





LANGUAGE RICHES (lead institution TCD)

- Contributing to the creation of a multilingual and multimodal corpus representing the linguistic diversity on island, through collecting naturally occurring examples of 'language in use' balanced across spoken, written, and signed data representing the languages spoken by more than 500 speakers and users on the island of Ireland.
- Contributing to the collection, encoding, and analysis of audio and visual data to evidence cultural diversities across the island of Ireland collect soundscapes and linguistic landscapes of cultural representations in different rural and urban settings across the island.
- Contributing to the production of project outputs across the research streams including a web-based archival and interactive platform, academic publications, practice-based outputs, public engagement artefacts, annual reports, roadshows, exhibitions, policy and research briefs.

Typical research activities within Language Riches include:

- Corpus development; Collecting and curating examples of language in use, ensuring balanced coverage across spoken, written, and signed data. Undertaking fieldwork to gather high-quality, ethically sourced linguistic data. Annotating, encoding, and documenting corpus materials in line with best practice standards in corpus linguistics.
- Collecting environmental and social audio recordings, photographs and other visual documentation of signage and public texts.

 Cataloging and managing datasets to ensure consistency, accessibility, and usability for research analysis.
- Applying qualitative and quantitative methods to examine multilingual language practices and cultural representations across modalities. Using digital tools for transcription, multimodal analysis, and metadata management. Identifying and interpreting patterns linking language, culture, and place across the island of Ireland.

LIVED IDENTITIES (lead institution TCD)

- Contributing to the design, piloting, administration and analysis of a large cross-border online survey entitled "Focus on Being" which will examine relationships between identities and languages, targeting each province on the island of Ireland.
- Contributing to the production of project outputs across the research streams including a web-based archival and interactive platform, academic publications, practice-based outputs, public engagement artefacts, annual reports, roadshows, exhibitions, policy and research briefs.

- Designing, piloting, and administration of a large national online survey examining the relationship between identities and languages across Ireland.
- Participant recruitment, survey testing, and troubleshooting to ensure data quality and accessibility.
- Supporting data management, cleaning, and preparation for statistical analysis using appropriate software.
- Applying a range of quantitative methods of analysis to survey data
- Contributing to reporting, dissemination of findings, and maintaining ethical research standards.

- Developing appropriate measures to pilot, test, and evaluate teaching and learning resources for language learning and intercultural awareness

- Collecting feedback on pilot resources from external partners and public fora. Ensuring feedback loops from external partners and public engagement are part of resource development.
- Contributing to the design of evaluation criteria for the sustainability of shared resources.
- Supporting quantitative and qualitative data management and analysis using appropriate methods of analysis and software.
- Contributing to reporting, dissemination of findings, and maintaining ethical research standards.

Post Summary

This position will contribute to the HEA North South Research Programme project LIFELANGS: Living Observatory of Shared Languages and Identities, reporting to co-PI Professor Lorna Carson and based in Trinity College Dublin. LIFELANGS is a joint project, with co-PI Dr Aisling O'Boyle based in Queen's University Belfast. We are seeking to recruit four Post-Doctoral Research Fellows.

Two of the Post-Doctoral Research Fellows will be based, respectively, at Queen's University Belfast, and at Trinity College Dublin. Close intra-institutional collaboration and cross-border mobility is a key feature of the project. This Post Specification refers to the two positions based at Trinity College Dublin (Language Riches and Lived Identities research streams).

LIFELANGS employs a mixed method approach to study everyday phenomenon of language learning, language use, and the construction and (re)presentation of identities. In addition to four new Post-Doctoral Research Fellows, the project consortium comprises two Co-PIs (Prof. Lorna Carson, TCD, and Dr Aisling O'Boyle, QUB), a team of eight academic Co-Leads drawn from TCD and QUB, and four PhD student researchers. GARDA CLEARANCE

Police vetting will be sought in respect of individuals who come under consideration for a post.

PLEASE NOTE: Applicants will be required to complete and return a Garda vetting form should they come under consideration for appointment. In some cases they may be requested to complete the form on the day of interview. This form will be forwarded to An Garda Síochána (Irish Police) for security checks on all



Irish addresses at which they have resided. An Garda Síochána will make enquiries with the Police Service of Northern Ireland with respect to addresses in Northern Ireland. If an applicant is not successful in obtaining the post for whatever reason, this information will be destroyed. If an applicant, therefore, subsequently comes under consideration for another position, they will be required to supply this information again.

While applicants must complete information in relation to all addresses at which they have resided, the vetting is only done on addresses on the island of Ireland.

If an applicant has resided / studied in countries outside of Ireland for a period of 6 months or more, it is mandatory for them to furnish a Police Criminal Records Check/ Police Certificate from those countries stating that they have no convictions recorded against them while residing there. Applicants will need to provide a separate Police Criminal Records Check/ Police Certificate for each country in which they have resided. The Police Criminal Records Check/ Police Certificate must be dated after the date the applicant left the relevant country. Applicants should provide documentation in the English and/or Irish language. Translations must be provided by a registered translation company/institute in the Republic of Ireland; all costs will be borne by the applicant. Only original version documents will be accepted.

Applicants should be aware that any information obtained in the Garda Vetting process can be made available to the employing area.

It is the responsibility of the applicant to seek security clearances in a timely fashion as they can take some time. No applicant will be appointed without this information being provided and being in order.

The Selection Process in Trinity

Information supplied by candidates in their application (Cover Letter and CV) will be used to shortlist for interview. Applications will be acknowledged by email. Given the degree of co-ordination and planning to have a Selection Committee available on the specified date, the University regrets that it may not be in a position to offer alternate selection dates. Where candidates are unavailable, reserves may be drawn from a shortlist. Outcomes of interviews are notified in writing to candidates.

In some instances the Selection Committee may avail of telephone or video conferencing. The University's selection methods may consist of any or all of the following: Interviews, Presentations, Psychometric Testing, References and Situational Exercises.

It is the policy of the University to conduct pre-employment medical screening/full pre-employment medicals.

Applications from non-EEA citizens are welcomed.
