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Scope of the Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research (TCMCR)

The Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research was officially launched in 2019 and this is the first annual report, covering the period September 2019 to December 2020.

The Centre is based in the School of Nursing and Midwifery and is the first academic centre to focus solely on the key issues facing pregnant and postpartum women, and their families.

Vision

The Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research is dedicated to achieving excellence in original maternity care research to help drive improvements in pregnancy, childbirth, early parenthood and early childhood care. The Centre prioritises research collaboration with women and families, clinicians in our partner maternity hospitals, national and international colleagues, and industry, to identify and respond to research questions of local, national and global significance to childbearing women.

Aim

To achieve enhanced quality of life and improved outcomes for women, their babies, partners and families through all stages of the reproductive cycle, in diverse social settings.

This aim is achieved through research and practice development, research education and research dissemination.

TCMCR Strategic Objectives

The main objectives of this Centre are to:

- conduct high-quality research, with and for women and families, that will have high impact and lead to improved care outcomes for parents, babies and families.
- generate and present research evidence on best practice for maternity care, in a userfriendly, publicly accessible format to address society-wide concerns about issues in relation to pregnancy, birth, early parenting and early childhood.
- assist in the development of evidence-based guidelines for maternity health service providers that are respectful of women's autonomy, needs and experiences and will inform practice.
- support clinicians to implement these guidelines to change and improve their practice.
- identify and form teams and collaborative links between clinical and academic staff in our
 partner maternity and children's hospitals, for the purpose of conducting practice-based
 research that will enhance the impact of research outcomes on maternal and family health
 and services.
- support and develop doctoral students' and early career researchers' knowledge and research experience.
- mentor clinical colleagues to conduct research projects as needed at local level.
- strengthen existing national and international interdisciplinary research links, and develop new international collaborations designed to increase and enhance research capacity in maternity care research.
- continue to lead the field in the involvement of women and their families, as service-users, in all aspects of research planning, design, development and implementation, as full collaborative research partners.

Research Activities

The five Flagship projects of the TCMCR are the MAMMI Study, REDUCE, COST Action 18211, TechChild, and the Evidence Synthesis in Maternity Care initiative.



The MAMMI Study

The Maternal health And Maternal Morbidity in Ireland (MAMMI) study is a longitudinal cohort study exploring the health and health problems experienced by first-time mothers in Ireland. Over 3,000 women were recruited from three maternity hospitals in Ireland between 2012 and 2017, and the second baby and five-year follow-up studies are in progress.

The REDUCE study

Maternal mortality and severe morbidity are doubled following CS compared with vaginal birth, and neonatal respiratory distress requiring oxygen is 2-7 times more common. CS costs €739 (elective) or €1180 (emergency) more than vaginal birth. This research team tested an intervention in Ireland, Germany and Italy ("OptiBIRTH", https://nursing-midwifery.tcd.ie/OptiBIRTH/) designed to increase vaginal birth after caesarean section (VBAC), thus reducing repeat CS in women who had CS before. The REDUCE study applies this knowledge to develop a similar intervention designed to reduce the number of unnecessary CSs in Ireland, which would have health benefits for mothers and babies. The REDUCE intervention has been developed using information from a review of 101 systematic reviews of trials, and evidence-based national guidelines, aimed at reducing CS rates, and 8 focus group interviews (FGIs) with women, their partners and clinicians. Testing for feasibility and acceptability is now in progress.

Health and Birth Related Trauma: Maximising Best Practice and optimal Outcomes

The DEVoTiON (DEliVery-related Trauma Outcomes Network) is a COST Action designed to bring together researchers and clinicians from diverse fields, that have an interest in birth-related trauma and the emotional and psychological outcomes for women, infants and families, meeting the COST excellence and inclusiveness policy regarding spreading excellence and widening participation.

COST Vision and Strategic Goals outline three priorities for its positioning in the remaining part of Horizon 2020 and FP9, the next Framework Programme for Research and Innovation: 1) Promoting and spreading excellence, 2) Fostering interdisciplinary research for breakthrough science, 3) Empowering and retaining young researchers and innovators. DEVoTiON responds to these priorities. This network is made up of experts from a wide variety of disciplines at various stages in their careers, including, midwifery, obstetrics, psychology (various branches i.e. health, medical, prenatal, family studies, neuro, clinical, behavioural), psychiatry, paediatrics, neurology, neurobiology, social work, analytical chemistry, biochemistry, epidemiology, epigenetics, health economists, media and informatics.

TechChild - Just because we can, should we? An anthropological perspective on the initiation of technology dependence to sustain a child's life

TechChild is a five and half year programme of research, funded by the European Research Council. The aim of TechChild is to explore influences on the initiation of technological support which will be required long-term to sustain a child's life and to develop a theory to explain the initiation of technology dependence in the context of contrasting health, legal, and socio-political systems. The objectives are:

- 1. To conceptualise influences on the initiation of technology dependence in PICU.
- 2. To explore the formal and informal processes internationally that (REALLY) influences the initiation of technology dependence, from the perspective of those with the authority and ultimate power to make that decision.
- 3. To identify the greatest influences on the initiation of technology dependence.
- 4. To elicit consensus and understand influences on the initiation of technology dependence in the context of the contrasting health, legal, and socio-political systems.
- 5. To develop a theory of technology initiation in healthcare, explaining the interactions and context of the initiation of technology dependence.







Future Opportunities

- The MAMMI Study 5-year follow up is currently ongoing and will continue until 2022. This study will help to provide information on the long-term health and prevalence of morbidities that women are experiencing 5 years after the birth of their first baby.
- Exploring the impact of COVID-19 on pregnant women's clinical and experiential outcomes.

Key Challenges

- The impact of COVID-19 on research activities and our ability to conduct on-site studies involving participants. We will continue to conduct remote working and adapt to these ongoing challenges.
- The need to establish the position of TCMRC within Trinity and on a national level, as an emerging centre of maternal health research.
- Translating research activities into frameworks for policy development to improve maternal and child health services and outcomes.

Research Centre Highlights

Minding Mothers with Morbidities II conference

The 2nd MAMMI-SIM conference, *Minding Mothers with Morbidities*, funded by the HRB, was held on the 29th of October 2020. Following public health guidelines, the conference took place online, with 210 attendees from 14 countries taking part. Plenary speakers included Angela Dunne and Dr Peter McKenna, Directors of the National Women and Infants Health Programme, Petra ten Hoope-Bender, Technical Adviser Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights at the UNFPA, and Professor Richard Greene, Director of the National Perinatal Epidemiology Centre (NPEC) and Professor of Clinical Obstetrics. The half-day, international conference was followed by a workshop with key stakeholders, including maternal health researchers, women and policymakers, to discuss future action on improving maternal health outcomes and service provision.

Trinity Health and Education International Research Conference 2022; Maternity Care strand

The annual School THE conference was held on the 4th and 5th of March 2021, with the plenary address on 'Maternity Care Research' given by Her Excellency Marie-Louise Coleiro Preca, the President Emeritus of Malta.





Prof Valerie Smith also ran two half-day preconference workshops, for 26 people on an Introduction to Meta-analysis and, for 25 people, on an Introduction to Meta-synthesis.

Journey to Birth

Funded by the HRB, through a KEDS award, and developed by maternal health researchers, in partnership with midwives and women's organisations, the Journey to Birth course provides vital information to support women, and their partners, as they learn how to labour and birth their child. This free antenatal course was launched during June of 2020, when face-to-face antenatal classes were cancelled in Ireland and abroad, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, providing women with much needed information and resources.




The content covers a range of issues, including creating a birth-plan, how to detect early labour, and coping strategies to help during labour and birth to lower stress levels and anxiety, and includes 20 videos and 44 articles. The course has over 4,600 learners to date (May 2021), with an overall 4.8/5 ranking. (https://www.futurelearn.com/courses/journey-to-birth-tcd)

Women's Health After Motherhood (WHAM) online course

The Women's Health After Motherhood (WHAM), a Massive Online Open Course (MOOC), was launched in October 2019. Co-designed and developed with mothers and maternal health experts, WHAM aims at bridging women's knowledge gaps, breaking the silence around embarrassing or sensitive health issues, and enabling women to self-assess and feel empowered to take action for their health. Funded by the European Institute for Innovation & Technology (EIT), the course is on its 3rd run with over 8,000 enrolled. Access to the course was changed in 2020 to ensure that the programme would be free and accessible to everyone, at any time. WHAM was recognised by the 2020 Health Service Excellence Awards as an exemplary project contributing to health and social care services.

WHAM includes resources from the following projects:

- MESSAGES (Motherhood, empowerment, sustainable self-help: addressing gaps in education with science)
- ON-TRACK (Towards Recovery After Childbirth through Knowledge)



The Women's Health After Motherhood course was launched in October 2019 and has over 8,000 enrolled learners as of May 2021.

MESSAGES

Funded by Science Foundation Ireland (SFI), MESSAGES aimed at increasing women's engagement with scientific knowledge by using self-help educational resources that share scientific knowledge. The resources received positive feedback in evaluation groups held with women and women's representative groups across Ireland in October 2019. The project was launched at the MESSAGES FOR MOTHERS seminar on the 15th of October 2019.

ON-TRACK

Funded by HRB KEDS (Knowledge Exchange and Dissemination Scheme), ON-TRACK provides guidance, information and support through nine on-line self-help educational videos addressing definitions of anxiety, sexual health issues and pelvic girdle pain. A seminar was held on February 21st 2020 to launch the resources formally. The videos have been viewed, through the WHAM course, a total of 745 to 978 times each. Six of them are also available on YouTube and have been viewed up to 1,500 times.
