2 Scope of the Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research (TCMCR)

The Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research (TCMCR) was established in 2019 and officially launched in September 2022. This is the fourth annual report, covering the period January to December 2023. The Centre is based in the School of Nursing and Midwifery and is the first academic centre to focus solely on the key issues facing pregnant and postpartum women, and their families.

Vision

The Trinity Centre for Maternity Care Research is dedicated to achieving excellence in original maternity care research to help drive improvements in pregnancy, childbirth, early parenthood and early childhood care. The Centre prioritises research collaboration with women and families, clinicians in our partner maternity hospitals, national and international colleagues, and industry, to identify and respond to research questions of local, national and global significance to childbearing women.

To achieve enhanced quality of life and improved outcomes for women, their babies, partners and families through all stages of the reproductive cycle, in diverse social settings.

This aim is achieved through research and practice development, research education and research dissemination.

- generate and present research evidence on best practice for maternity care, in a user-friendly, publicly accessible format to address society-wide concerns about issues in relation to pregnancy, birth, early parenting and early childhood.
- assist in the development of evidence-based guidelines for maternity health service providers that are respectful of women's autonomy, needs and experiences and will inform practice.
- support clinicians to implement these guidelines to change and improve their practice.
- identify and form teams and collaborative links between clinical and academic staff in our
 partner maternity and children's hospitals, for the purpose of conducting practice-based
 research that will enhance the impact of research outcomes on maternal and family health and
 services.
- support and develop doctoral students' and early career researchers' knowledge and research experience.
- mentor clinical colleagues to conduct research projects as needed at local level.
- strengthen existing national and international interdisciplinary research links, and develop new international collaborations designed to increase and enhance research capacity in maternity care research.

 aspects of research planning, design, development and implementation, as full collaborative
 research partners.

5 Research Activities

The three flagship projects of the TCMCR are the MAMMI Study, COST Action 18211 and the Evidence Synthesis in Maternity Care initiative.

The Maternal health And Maternal Morbidity in Ireland (MAMMI) study is a longitudinal cohort study exploring the health and health problems experienced by first-time mothers in Ireland. The study began in 2012, with 3000 nulliparous mothers recruited across three maternity hospitals. Data collection for the five-year follow up study was completed in 2022, while the development of the ten-year follow-up study survey is currently in progress.

The MAMMI SIM (Second baby survey, Intervention to improve urinary incontinence outcomes and Measuring costs) follow up was completed in 2021. This strand explored the health and health issues of women after the birth of their second baby. The five-year follow-up study continued to explore women's health five years after their first baby's birth and data collection was completed in 2023.

Evidence Synthesis in Maternity Care Initiative

The TCMCR, through Professor Valerie Smith, as a member of the Executive Board of Evidence Synthesis Ireland (ESI) and as TCD's ESI Lead Partner, is actively supporting evidence synthesis in maternity care.

The primary aim of ESI is to build evidence synthesis knowledge, awareness, and capacity among the public, healthcare institutions, policymakers, clinicians, and researchers on the Island of Ireland. The secondary aim is to generate knowledge on methodological efficiencies in evidence synthesis, as well as make evidence syntheses more useable within health care policy and for clinical practice decision-making. ESI also includes Cochrane Ireland whose mission is to promote evidence-informed health decision-making by producing high-quality, relevant, accessible reviews and other research-synthesized evidence. ESI offers training workshops and webinars (https://evidencesynthesisireland.ie/training/), provides funding for studies within a review (SWAR) projects (https://evidencesynthesisireland.ie/swar/), hosts a Communicating with the Public mentorship scheme (https://evidencesynthesisireland.ie/swar/), and hosts an ESI Fellowship scheme (https://evidencesynthesisireland.ie/fellowships/).

Through ESI-sponsored Fellowships awarded in 2021-2022, Valerie mentored two ESI Fellows to completion and is currently mentoring one further Fellow on maternity care evidence syntheses projects. The aim of the Fellowship Scheme is to provide Fellows the opportunity to learn about evidence synthesis in general, as well as develop the practical skills of how to plan, design, conduct, and report evidence synthesis, in addition to building capacity for evidence synthesis activity. During the Fellowships, successful Fellows receive structured theoretical training from ESI as we all one-one mentorship.

Prof. Smith, during 2023, alongside ESI Fellowship mentoring, has further supported evidence synthesis activity through education and training workshop facilitation, research supervision (MSc and PhD), and wider international Expert Advisory Group engagement and collaboration.

Devotion Cost Action CA18211

The main goal of DEVOTION CA18211 is to establish a multidisciplinary pan-European Research Network dedicated to minimising birth trauma and optimising birth experiences. Part of this objective is to focus on the prevalence of birth trauma and work towards universal standards of measuring, assessing and preventing birth trauma.

Unlike other sources of trauma, perinatal or birth-related trauma is relatively unrecognised. Evidence suggests up to 30% of women describe their birth experience as traumatic and experience some symptoms of intrusion, avoidance or hyper-arousal.

In 2016, 5.11 million babies were born in Europe. This means that up to 1.5 million mothers may have had sub-optimal birth experiences. Further, this suggests that over 200,000 mothers and up to 200,000 fathers may have developed PTSD as a result of a traumatic birth.

Developmental research has firmly established that the quality of infant-parent relationships is a critical factor in early and later childhood development, consequently, a family-centred approach to any investigation of birth-related trauma is critical, as trauma can be transmitted within the family system. Given the enormous economic burden it places on women, health systems, and particularly children, relatively small improvements in services to prevent, detect and treat this problem can benefit society significantly.

This COST Action will establish an international multidisciplinary network of researchers, clinicians, NGOs and SMEs to consolidate and disseminate current evidence and coordinate a joint effort to seek ways to prevent, minimise and resolve birth-related trauma, and to optimise emotional and psychological outcomes for parents and families and CA18211 will work to accelerate the translation of that knowledge into best practices that can be shared across Europe to reduce the societal and economic burden arising from birth-related negative/traumatic experiences.

Birth Story Dramatic Performance


The performance was a production created as part of European Researchers' Night 2023 and inspired by the research carried out at the Trinity Centre for Maternal Care Research (TCMCR).

The performance was a 15-minute piece of theatre involving movement, dance and song. It was developed from the birth stories of two of the performers, Berlinda Mapa and Helen McGrath. The script was developed by Gráinne Curistan who also directed the piece. A panel discussion with the cast, Dr Vivienne Brady and Dr Margaret Dunlea followed the performance.

The piece explores how childbirth is an instinctive and ancient experience. It questions how the role of women giving birth has changed through the medicalisation of childbirth. Are women encouraged to trust their own instincts when it comes to an incredible and transformative process happening within their own bodies? Or are they treated like a patient with an illness where the expertise on that illness lie outside of them?
