### Why take this New Minor Subject?

This pathway presents an exciting opportunity to learn about the rich diversity of English literature from the Middle Ages to the present day, in a variety of literary cultures, including not only Britain, Ireland and the United States, but many other countries around the globe. Ours is one of the oldest Schools of English in the world, and we have maintained an exceptional international reputation for teaching and research. ### What will I do?

If you choose to take up English as a New Minor Subject, you will take 60 ECTS in English across Years 2 to 4 of your degree. This pathway has been carefully designed to ensure that students get a solid grounding in the field while also preserving an exceptional degree of choice and variety.

In the Senior Fresh year, you will take 20 ECTS in English. In the first semester, you will take the 10 ECTS module *Genres: Introduction to Literary Studies*, which covers a diverse range of poetry, drama and fiction, and provides essential skills for the study of English Literature. In the second semester, you will take either the 10 ECTS module *Irish Writing*, or two 5 ECTS modules from the following list: *Early Modern Literature: Themes, Texts and Context; Cultures of Retelling; Pulp: Introduction to Popular Literature*.

In the Junior Sophister year, you will again take 20 ECTS in English. In the first semester, you will choose at least one period-based module: either *Writing the Body, 1690 - 1800: Race, Gender and Power* or *British Romantic Literature, 1789 -1830*; for your second module you may choose the other period-based module, or *US American Identities: Harlem Renaissance to the Present*, or *Literary Theories*. In the second semester, you will choose at least one period-based module: either *Victorian Writing* or *Modernisms: Making it New*; for your second module you may choose either the other period-based module, or *Postcolonial Literature: Introduction to Key Debates and Texts*, or *Imagining the Contemporary: No Future?*

In the Senior Sophister Year, you will again take 20 ECTS in English, choosing from the School's diverse list of Sophister options, which cover the entire range of English literature from the Middle Ages to the contemporary. Having gained a solid grounding in the development of English literature in the previous years, you will now have the opportunity to deepen your expertise in areas of particular interest to you.

## Contact Hours and Indicative Workload

### SF

10 ECTS modules are taught via 2 hours of lectures per week for 11 weeks and 7 accompanying hour-long small group tutorials. 5 ECTS modules are taught via 1 hour-long lecture per week for 11 weeks and 7 hour-long small group tutorials.

### JS and SS

10 ECTS modules are taught via 2 hours of seminar teaching per week. 5 ECTS modules via 1 hour of teaching per week.

Module descriptors provide more specific information on required reading and modes of assessment. However, prospective students should note more generally that in addition to any contact hours, English is a subject that requires a considerable amount of preparatory reading alongside attendance of lectures, tutorials and seminars. Combined with contact hours, it would be expected that this reading load would make up about a third of a student's forty-hour working week.
