MPhil in Christian Theology

This Masters in Christian Theology gives students a rigorous knowledge of core themes and issues in historical and contemporary Christian theological scholarship. They engage with the main figures and debates of the tradition, and reflect upon their continued relevance to contemporary discussion. A high point of their study is the

written dissertation, which enables students to engage in the advanced study of their chosen topic of interest. The research proficiency which the student acquires can make the MPhil an ideal stepping-stone to more advanced theological study.

Course Structure and Assessment

The course incorporates both taught and research components. Students must take six taught modules (10 ECTS each) comprising three core and three elective modules, and write a 15,000 word dissertation (30 ECTS). Students are assessed via written contributions for each module.

Modules on offer include the following:

Nature, Grace and the Triune God**

Modules shared with the MPhil in Intercultural Theology and Interreligious Studies Note: not all elective modules are offered each year

Who is this course for?

For graduates in theology (or other related disciplines), the MPhil offers a structured programme of study at an advanced level.

- For those who have an interest in theological questions, this degree will help them become better informed and more articulate in Christian theology;
- For chaplains, pastoral workers, and others engaged in Church ministry, the MPhil will serve as an ideal opportunity for further in-depth reading, writing and study of the core disciplines of theology, in a way that furthers professional development;
- For teachers of religious education, this degree provides an excellent opportunity to explore theological issues at a deeper level, so benefitting you and your students
- For students looking to do advanced research, the MPhil can provide a suitable route into higher study in theology.

Postgraduate Diploma and Postgraduate Certificate in Christian Theology

The MPhil programme requires the completion of six modules and a dissertation within one year (full-time), or two years (part-time). For those unable to take on this commitment because of time or other constraints, the two alternatives, Diploma and Certificate, may be more attractive. The modules are the same in all three programmes, and have the same assessment patterns. The Diploma requires completion of six modules (four core, two elective), but not a dissertation. The Certificate involves three modules (two core, one elective).

It is possible to complete the Certificate by attending lectures one evening a week. On successful completion of the Certificate, a student may wish to continue onto the Diploma, and from Diploma to MPhil.

Admission Requirements

Admission to these courses is at graduate level. Applicants will normally hold a good honours degree in theology from a recognized university. Applicants who have a primary degree in other disciplines will be considered.

Exceptional cases, where applicants do not fully meet the above criteria, but make a reasonable case for admissions otherwise, will be considered by the Dean of Graduate Studies.

Course Times

The MPhil is delivered full-time over one year (12 months) or part-time over two years. The Postgraduate Diploma and Certificate are delivered over 8 months (September – April). Lectures are normally held on Monday and Thursday evenings. Some elective modules may be held during the day.
