#### **Post Summary**

Doctoral Researcher in Sociology (PhD programme)

The **Department of Sociology at Trinity College Dublin** is seeking to appoint a doctoral researcher for a period of 48 months.

The doctoral candidate will conduct an innovative PhD project in the field of health behaviour among adolescents as specified by the project brief below.

## 'Social Disadvantage and health behaviours in adolescence: Testing sociological, sociobiological, and psychological explanations'

Across different societies we frequently observe that members of socio-economically disadvantaged groups and non-dominant minority groups (sometimes ethnic and/or racial minorities) exhibit higher rates of involvement in different high-risk behaviours, compared to the country's majority or dominant group. Nondominant minority groups tend to engage at higher rates in smoking, excessive alcohol consumption, non-prescription drug use as well as risky sexual behaviours. These patterns become established in adolescence and temporally coincide with an increased risk of academic demotivation or conduct disorder, frequently linked to disadvantageous educational outcomes. Theoretical explanations can found in the literatures from sociology, public health research, biology, and psychology. Sociology and public health often attribute adverse health behaviours to the development of a "resistance" culture among young people driven by a stance of opposition to the symbols, groups or positions of authority. Biologists propose "social acceleration" theory to explain why socially



disadvantaged groups adopt worse health behaviours in addition to specific physiological changes which have been observed among these groups such as acceleration of menarche among females and biological age acceleration in telomeres and the epigenome. In psychology, attachment theory argues that early childhood experiences may lead to poor attachment among adolescents which raise the likelihood of low perceived control, self-esteem and social competence, resulting in poor social relationships and adverse health behaviours as a coping mechanism. This inter-disciplinary project sets out to test these different theoretical frameworks in terms of their ability to predict patterns of health and social behaviours in adolescence. The project will draw on comparative data from longitudinal child cohort studies from Ireland, the United Kingdom, Australia and the United States. As some of those studies include physical samples, the project aspires to incorporate biological analysis using epigenetic data to examine the model of social acceleration. Additionally, the project may collect a small sample of primary data from adolescents in Ireland.

Applicants with a background in any social or natural science field are welcome but applicants must have advanced training in quantitative-statistical methodology and be able to show that they have experience in the analysis of social survey micro-data, preferably longitudinal data, and be competent in using a statistical package such as Stata or R. The successful candidate will work closely with Prof. Richard Layte and will join the prestigious PhD programme at the Department of Sociology of Trinity College Dublin. The Department will provide all logistic, academic and intellectual support and the PhD candidate will join the vibrant doctoral programme in the Department of Sociology at TCD. The Dept provides a structured PhD training programme which combines obligatory training modules with bespoke training for the specific skills the student will require. PhD students are expected to present their research to colleagues nationally and internationally and additional training expenses such as conference travel are covered by the Dept in addition to academic fees and basic expenses related to the PhD programme itself.

We are looking for an enthusiastic PhD candidate with an enquiring mind, excellent statistical knowledge and first-rate analytic skills to undertake an exciting scientific project which has the potential to impact many fields of scientific study and which may contribute substantially to policy development.

## Standard duties of the post

- Critical, systematic and analytical review of relevant literature for the project.
- Writing academic pieces (working papers, chapters, journal articles) in excellent English.
- Conducting empirical research using statistical methods with longitudinal data.
- Actively writing and submitting research papers for publication and contributing to joint projects or related submissions with the PhD supervisor.
- Attending meetings, workshops, and conferences.
- Disseminating academic work to specialised and general audiences.
- 4 hours of teaching a week during the statutory term (facilitating undergraduate tutorials).

 MA, MSc or MPhil in any social (e.g. Sociology, Economics, Politics, Population Studies/Demography, Psychology, Social Policy, Epidemiology) or natural science (e.g. Genetics, Neuroscience, Biology, Zoology). Any thesis should be either defended or submitted by the date of interview.

#### Essential research skills

- excellent analytical skills;
- the ability to understand theories about the processes that shape child development and behaviours and to create innovative methods to test them;
- solid statistical training or knowledge in advanced multivariate statistical methods, and preferably high competence in longitudinal research design;
- experience in the management and analysis of micro-level quantitative data (preferably longitudinal data);
- advanced technical skills in *Stata* or comparable statistical packages (like R) or willingness and competence to acquire such skills in a short amount of time

## Other essential knowledge and skills

- excellent written and verbal communication skills in English;
- ability to structure and pursue an independent research project;
- strong motivation to publish in academic journals;
- good organisational skills;
- ability to work effectively in a team;
- interpersonal and relational skills

#### Desirable skills

- an openness to interdisciplinary approaches;
- knowledge of the literatures on child development and social inequality;
- interest in pursuing an academic or teaching career
