



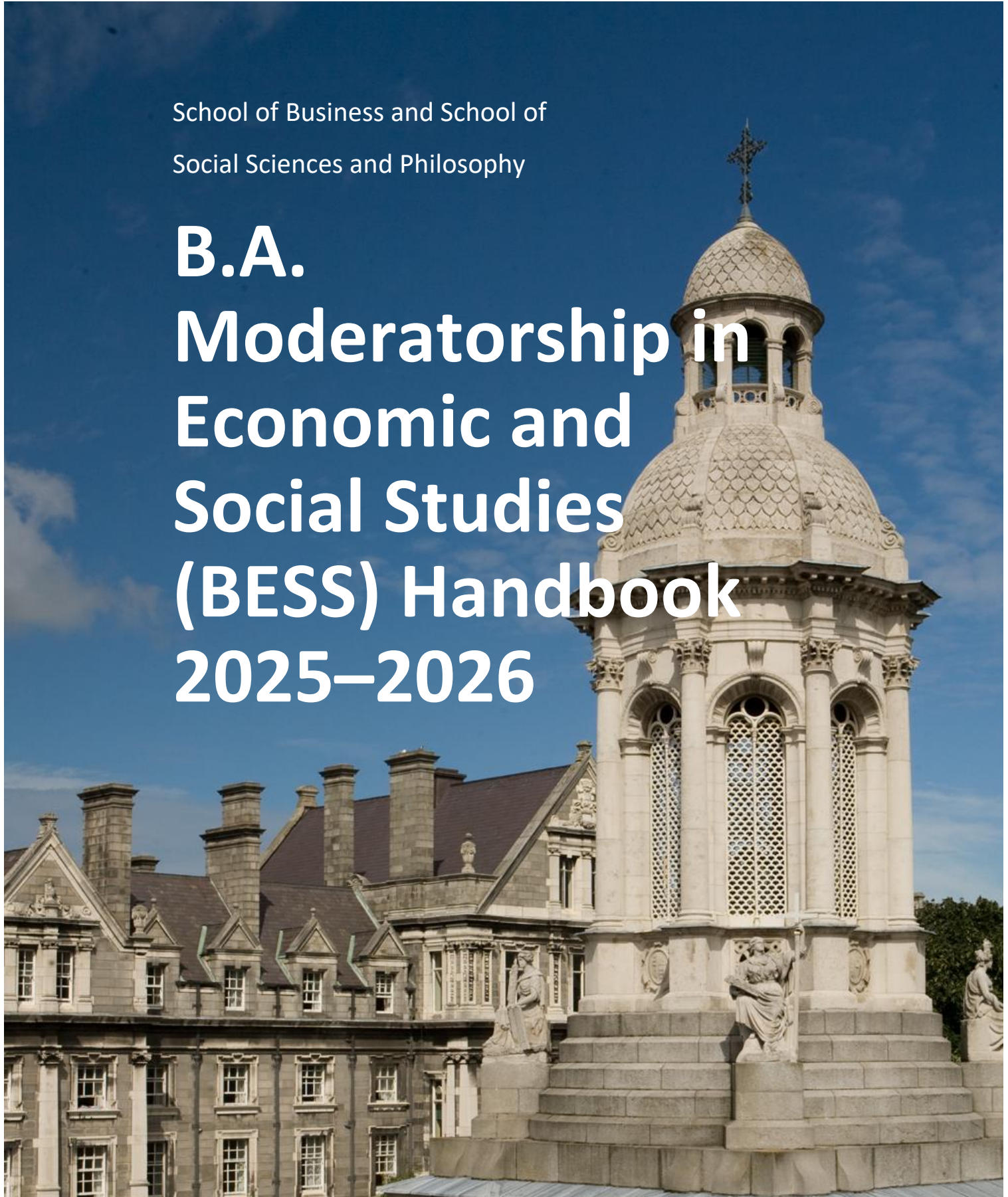

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A Note on this Handbook

This BESS Handbook is a guide to students taking the Business Economic and Social Studies (BESS) programme. It provides a guide to what is expected of you on this programme and the academic and personal support available to you.

Please note that, in the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the General Regulations published in the University Calendar and the information contained in the Course Handbook, the provisions notified in the General Regulations will prevail.

Support Provision for Students with Disabilities

Trinity has adopted a Reasonable Accommodation Policy that outlines how supports are implemented in Trinity. Student seeking reasonable accommodation whilst studying in Trinity must applying for reasonable accommodations with the Disability Service in their student portal my.tcd.ie. Based on appropriate evidence of a disability and information obtained from the student on the impact of their disability and their academic course requirements, the Disability Staff member will identify supports designed to meet the student's disability support needs. Following the Needs Assessment, the student's Disability Officer prepares an Individual Learning Educational Needs Summary (**LENS**) detailing the Reasonable Accommodations to be implemented. The information outlined in the LENS is communicated to the relevant School via the student record in SITS.

Examination accommodation and deadlines

Students should make requests as early as possible in the academic year. To ensure the Assessment, Progression and Graduation Team can set your accommodations for examination purposes the following deadlines are applied:

- Semester 1 assessments and Foundation Scholarship assessment: the last Friday in September
- Semester 2 assessments: the last Friday in January
- Reassessments: the last Friday in May

Student responsibilities for departmental assessments/course tests

- Students are required to initiate contact with the School/Department and request reasonable accommodations as **per their LENS report, or email received following**

their needs assessment for particular assessments for School/ Department administered assessment. Students are advised to make contact **at least two weeks prior** to the assessment date to enable adjustments to be implemented.

Professional Learning Education Needs Summary - PLENS

Students with disabilities on professional courses in receipt of reasonable accommodation provided by College the Disability Service will be issued a PLENS report and are provided with supports such as examination and academic reasonable accommodations. In the background section of the PLENS the following text is included:

Student is encouraged to discuss any disability supports required on professional course and placement with the Academic contact and/or Placement Co-ordinator of their course. Student can be referred back to Disability Service for placement planning supports - Level 2 - Placement Planning, if and when required.

Students are encouraged to speak with the placement co-ordinator if they are unsure of any needs for placement supports. Students can be referred back to Disability Service for placement planning supports, if and when required.

Please note: no reasonable accommodation can be provided outside the procedures as set.

Course/Programme Governance

The BESS programme is governed by the BESS Programme Management Committee which is a sub-committee of the School of Business and the School of Social Sciences and Philosophy Undergraduate Teaching and Learning Committees. Membership of the BESS Programme Management Committee includes the Academic Director (Chair), Course Administrator (Secretary), an academic representative from each of the four constituent Disciplines and a BESS Student Representative.

Module and Pathway Choice Registration

It is the responsibility of each student to ensure that they take sufficient modules amounting to 60 ECTS during an academic year, that their selected modules meet the programme requirements of the particular year for which they are registered, and that they have taken account of any prerequisites from previous years associated with the modules.



During Hilary Term, rising Junior Fresh and Senior Fresh students in BESS will be invited by the Academic Registry to register their Pathway of choice online. Online module enrolment will follow thereafter for all years of BESS. Junior Fresh students are required to register for the 10 credits of elective modules that they are obliged to take, the remaining 50 credits, which are mandatory, are automatically applied to their portals.

Several weeks before they are invited to register, continuing students will be advised on how to access this process. The Programme Handbook will list all available modules and a link to Departmental/School module descriptors. Timetabling may restrict the availability of some modules to individual students.



Pathway and Module Choices - Change of Mind

Following Pathway selection in the Hilary Term, a short window will be made available for change of Pathway following on from publication of results in late May. Outside of that period, and only for very specific reasons, if change is essential, a student may be required to liaise with their tutor to seek permission from the Senior Lecturer and the Programme to make change.

Following on from module selection late July, students who wish to change their module options have a short window provided in which to do so (generally during week one of

teaching in both semesters). Students should note that Pathway and module changes will be subject to availability of places and timetable constraints.

Module Timetables

Lecture Timetables are published to student portals my.tcd.ie by the Academic Registry at least two weeks before the beginning of the academic year. Once a student is registered, they can view their timetable on their student portal. The onus is on students to check their timetable at regular intervals to identify any changes to venues or lecture times. It is not envisaged that there will be any clashing of modules once the on-line enrolment process is in place.

My.tcd.ie - Checking Your Personal Student Record

My.tcd.ie allows students to view their own central student record containing all relevant information related to the course for which you are registered. To access the system you will need your College username and network password. To access my.tcd.ie go to the College local home page <https://www.tcd.ie/local/> and select my.tcd.ie.



If your personal student information is incorrect, you should contact the Academic Registry (via email – academic.registry@tcd.ie) stating your full name and student ID number. If your timetable module list is incorrect then you should notify the [Course Office](#).

All email correspondence from the Course Office will be sent to TCD email addresses only. Students should check their email on a regular basis. When emailing the Course Office students should include their TCD Student ID Number at all times.



Blackboard

Blackboard is the College online learning environment where lecturers will give access to lecture notes and discussion forum material. The use of Blackboard varies from module to module and individual lecturers will speak to you about the requirements for their module.

In order to access a module on Blackboard you must be registered to the module.

Course Transfer Procedures

Should you wish to consider a transfer out of BESS and into another course please consult <https://www.tcd.ie/academicregistry/#menu>. Students may apply, through their tutor, to the Senior Lecturer for permission to transfer to another course.

Unfortunately it is not possible to accommodate transfer into the BESS programme as the programme is oversubscribed year on year.

Erasmus/Study Abroad

To facilitate student mobility, students may be permitted to satisfy the requirements of their year, in whole or in part, by study abroad under an approved ERASMUS exchange or other exchange programme approved by the Vice-President for Global Relations with the assessment at the host university counting as part of the student's academic record in College. The maximum period for such study is one academic year and the minimum period is three months. Arrangements governing specific exchange programmes are made by the school, department or course office concerned. See <http://www.tcd.ie/ssp/undergraduate/study-abroad/> for more information. It is a students' responsibility to ensure they are able to choose modules abroad that fully satisfy their chosen Pathway of study. In the event a student has to return from study abroad, they should be able to seamlessly return without issue and so as to avoid the possibility of having to repeat their Junior Sophister year the following academic year.



Hautes études commerciales (H.E.C.) Paris Double Degree Programme

Single honour Business or joint Honours Economics/Business, Major Economics & Minor Business students may apply for entry to the programme. At the end of their Junior Sophister year students transfer to the H.E.C. in Paris for a further two years of study. On successful completion of this programme, students are eligible for the award of either the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor in Business Studies from Trinity College, together with the Msc in Management/Diplôme de Grand Ecole from the H.E.C. Off-Books Regulations

The Senior Lecturer may permit students who are in good standing to go 'off-books'. This may be for personal reasons or on medical grounds where to do so would be in the best interests of the student. 'Off-Books' students can be re-admitted to the College in a subsequent year only at the discretion of the Senior Lecturer. 'Off-Books' students suffering from ill-health who have allowed their names to go off the books can only be readmitted at the discretion of the Senior Lecturer who may require a satisfactory certificate from a nominated medical referee. 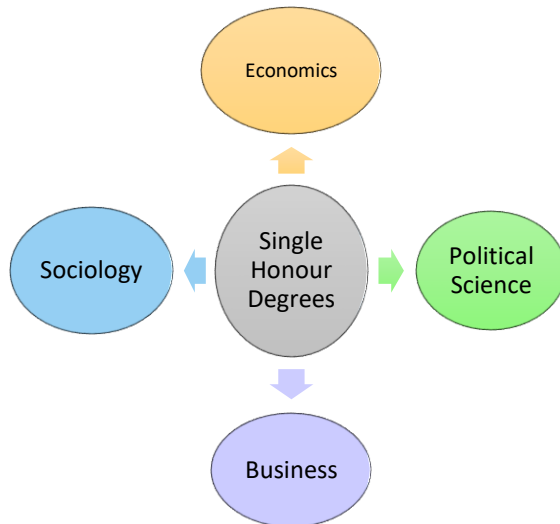
Repeat Years

Students are not permitted to repeat a year more than once or repeat more than two separate years.

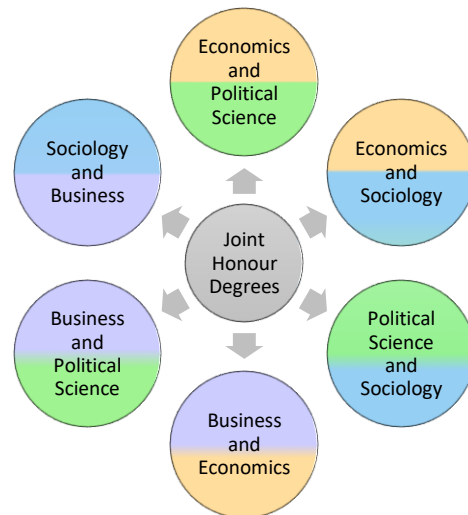

Joint Honour



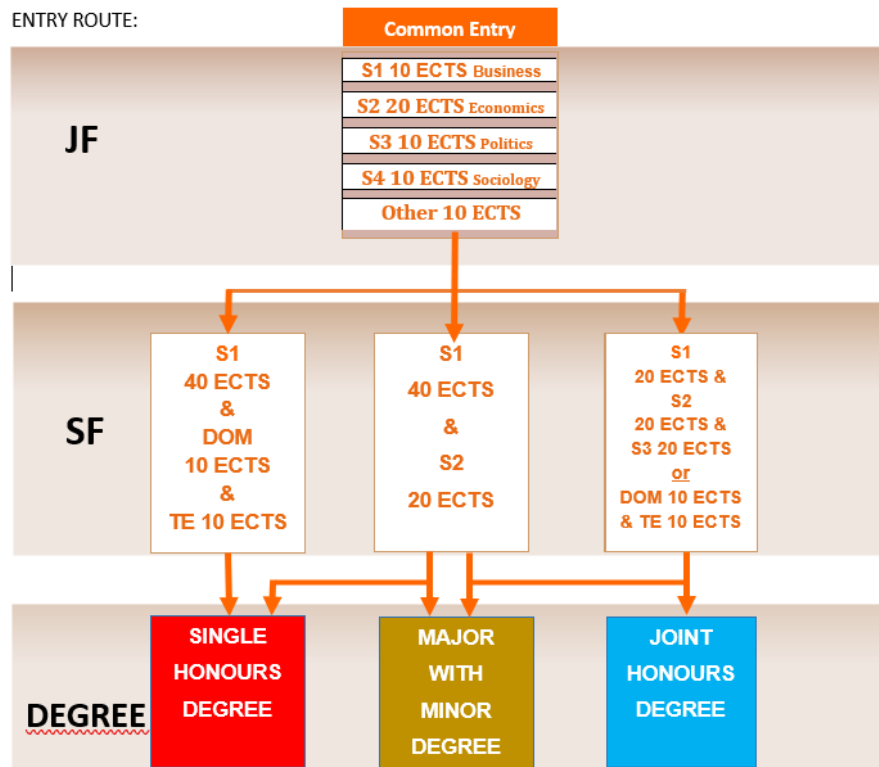
Major with Minor

FRESHMAN YEARS: 120 ECTS

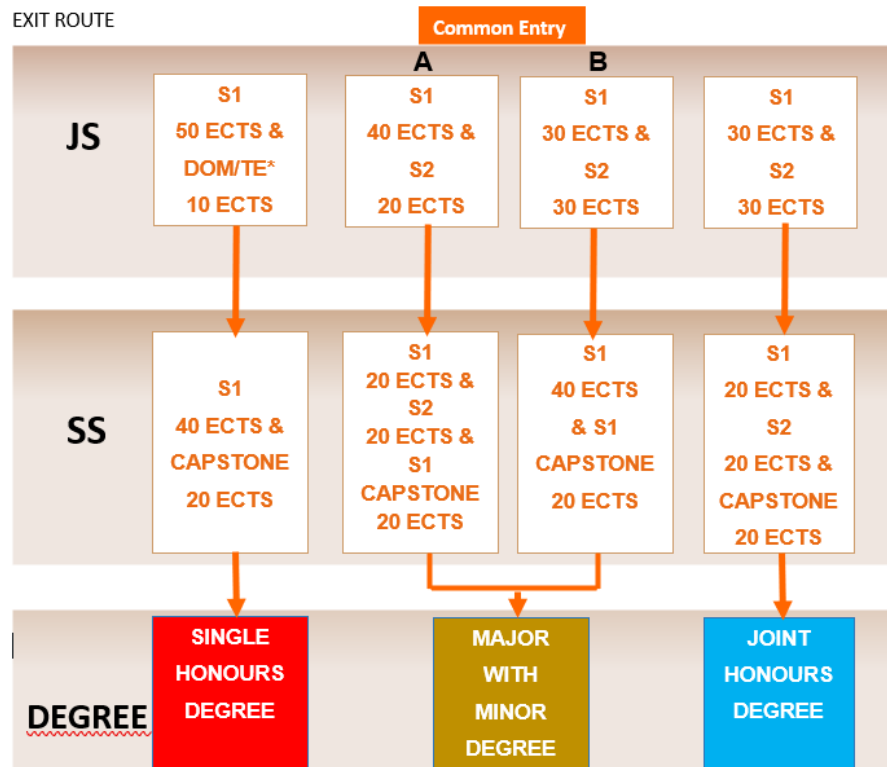
ENTRY ROUTE:

Business Economic and Social Studies (BESS) Learning Outcomes

Having successfully completed this programme students should be able to:

- Identify, critically evaluate and synthesise the substantive theories, frameworks and models, both qualitative and quantitative, that are used in fields of enquiry related to business, management and the social sciences;
- Analyse and solve a variety of problems in the private and public sector from a multi-disciplinary knowledge basis of theories in business and the social sciences;
- Communicate effectively in oral and written modes in professional and academic settings;
- Use appropriate ICT tools in analysing, solving, and communicating a variety of problems in business and the social sciences;
- Apply knowledge and understanding of the ethical dimensions of management and research in both the public and private sectors of society and to apply this knowledge effectively in management and research contexts;
- Work effectively as an individual and in teams in multi-disciplinary settings;
- Demonstrate flexibility, adaptability and independence in order to engage productively with a changing social, cultural and technological environment;
- Engage in the pursuit of knowledge in greater depth and over time in support of life-long learning, either as a practitioner or an academic.

Trinity Capstone Project

The Capstone Project – though defined differently by different subjects – is the common element across all degree Exit Routes and is weighted at 20 ECTS. It requires a significant level of independent research by the student. It should be an integrative exercise that allows students to showcase skills and knowledge which they have developed across a range of subject areas and across their four years of study. It should result in the production of a significant piece of original work by the student. It should provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate their attainment of the four graduate attributes: to think independently, to communicate effectively, to develop continuously and to act responsibly. Students should note that there may be pre-requisite modules in earlier years for the undertaking of the Capstone in the Senior Sophister year so students must be cognisant of this when making module choices in their Senior Fresh and Junior Sophister years. Currently, the pre-requisites are as follows:

SOCIOLOGY: In the Senior Fresh year you must take SOU22011 & SOU22012 and SOU22061 & SOU22062. In the Junior Sophister year you must take SOU33011 & SOU33012.

POLITICAL SCIENCE: In the Senior Fresh year you must take POU22040. In the Junior Sophister year you must take POU33011 & POU33012.

ECONOMICS: In the Junior Sophister year you must take ECU33011 & ECU33012 & ECU33091 & ECU33092 (if pursuing **Single** or **Major**). ECU33091 & ECU33092 are mandatory (if pursuing **Joint** and intent on taking Economic Capstone).

BUSINESS: There are no pre-requisites.

You should also look at the matrix that explains the different levels of plagiarism and how they are dealt with.

Trinity Business School / School of Social Sciences and Philosophy Plagiarism Policy

If plagiarism, as referred to in the Calendar (www.tcd.ie/calendar/undergraduate-studies/general-regulations-and-information.pdf) is suspected, the lecturer informs their Head of Department and Director of Teaching and Learning (Undergraduate) (DUTL). The DUTL, or their designate, will write to the student, and the student's tutor, advising them of the concerns raised. The student and tutor (or representative from the Student's Union) will be invited to attend an informal meeting with the DUTL, or their designate, and the lecturer concerned, in order to put their suspicions to the student and given the student the opportunity to respond. The student will be requested to respond in writing stating his/her agreement to attend such a meeting and confirming on which of the suggested dates and times it will be possible for them to attend. If the student does not agree to attend such a meeting, the DUTL, or their designate, may refer the case directly to the Junior Dean who will interview the student and may implement the procedure as referred to under conduct and college regulations.

If the DUTL, or designate, forms the view that plagiarism has taken place, he/she must decide if the offence can be dealt with under the summary procedure set out below. In order for this summary procedure to be followed, all parties attending the information meeting above must state their agreement in writing to the DUTL or designate.

If the offence can be dealt with under the summary procedure, the DUTL, or designate, will recommend one of the following penalties:

Level 1: The student receives an informal verbal warning. The piece of work in question is inadmissible. The student is required to rephrase and correctly reference all plagiarized elements. Other content should not be altered. The resubmitted work will be assessed and

marked without penalty. The DUTL should inform the course director and, where appropriate, the course office. The offence is recorded.

Level 2: The student receives a formal written warning. The piece of work in question is inadmissible. The student is required to rephrase and correctly reference all plagiarized elements. Other content should not be altered. The resubmitted work will receive a reduced or capped mark depending on the seriousness/extent of plagiarism. In the case of a Level 2 offence, the Senior Lecturer must be notified and requested to approve the recommended penalty. The DUTL should inform the course director and, where appropriate, the course office. The offence is recorded.

Level 3: The student receives a formal written warning. The piece of work in question is inadmissible. There is no opportunity for resubmission with corrections. Instead, the student is required to submit a new piece of work as a reassessment during the next available session. Provided the work is of a passing standard, both the assessment mark and the overall module mark will be capped at the pass mark. Discretion lies with the Senior Lecturer in cases where there is no standard opportunity for reassessment in that year. In the case of a Level 3 offence, the Senior Lecturer must be notified and requested to approve the recommended penalty. The Senior Lecturer will inform the Junior Dean accordingly. The Junior Dean may, nevertheless, implement the procedures as referred to under conduct and college regulations. The DUTL should inform the course director and, where appropriate, the course office. The offence is recorded.

Level 4: If the case cannot normally be dealt with under the summary procedures, it is deemed to be a Level 4 offence and will be referred directly to the Junior Dean. Nothing provided for under the summary procedure diminishes or prejudices the disciplinary powers of the Junior Dean under the 2010 Consolidated Statutes.

European Credit Transfer System (ECTS)

The European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) is an academic credit system based on the estimated student workload required to achieve the objectives of a module or programme of study. It is designed to enable academic recognition for periods of study, to facilitate student mobility and credit accumulation and transfer. The ECTS is the recommended credit system for higher education in Ireland and across the European Higher Education Area. The ECTS weighting for a module is a measure of the student input or workload required for that module, based on factors such as the number of contact hours, the number and length of written or verbally presented assessment exercises, class preparation and private study time, laboratory classes, examinations, clinical attendance, professional training placements, and so on as appropriate. There is no intrinsic relationship between the credit volume of a module and its level of difficulty. The European norm for fulltime study over one academic year is 60 credits. 1 credit represents 20-25 hours estimated student input, so a 10-credit module will be designed to require 200-250 hours of student input including class contact time, assessments and examinations. ECTS credits are awarded to a student only upon successful completion of the programme year. Progression from one year to the next is

determined by the programme regulations. Students who fail a year of their programme will not obtain credit for that year even if they have passed certain components. Exceptions to this rule are one-year and part-year visiting students, who are awarded credit for individual modules successfully completed.

Examination Regulations – General

This section supplements examination information available in the University calendar <http://www.tcd.ie/calendar/undergraduate-studies/general-regulations-and-information.pdf>.

In the event of conflict or inconsistency between the General Regulations and information provided in this handbook, the College General Regulations prevail. In addition, specific discipline guidance on individual modules is provided in relevant departmental handbooks.

Sitting the Examinations

Students are required to take the annual assessment component of all modules (this may constitute a formal examination, an essay, a project or some other mode of assessment) for which they are registered unless specially exempted by permission from the Senior Lecturer.

Coursework and Attendance at Classes

Students are required to attend classes and submit assessment work in all modules. A student is deemed *non-satisfactory* in a term when more than a third of required work/attendance in that term is missed. Any student who is deemed *non-satisfactory* in each of the two terms may, in accordance with the regulations laid down by the University Council, be refused permission to take examinations in that year.

To be allowed to sit the ordinary examinations a student must have paid the relevant College annual fees and must be in good standing. There is no examination fee payable. There is no notice required of intention to take an examination (the Scholarship examination is an exception to this).

Any assignment or coursework due to be submitted at the reassessment session (regardless of the reason e.g. permission to defer etc.) must be submitted by the deadline set by the lecturer and by the start of the reassessment session, at the latest. Coursework or assignment submitted after this date will not be accepted or marked.

Term Tests

Students who are granted an excused absence for mid-year tests on the basis of a medical certificate will not be penalised in terms of their annual examination result. However, as no marks can be carried forward to the annual examination, students will have the weighting of the remaining components adjusted.

Medical Certificates

Students who consider that illness may prevent them from attending an examination (or any part thereof) should consult their medical adviser and request a medical certificate for an appropriate period. If a certificate is granted, it must be presented to the student's tutor and the relevant departmental office within three days of the beginning of the period of absence from the examination. The tutor must immediately forward the certificate to the Senior Lecturer's Office. Medical certificates must state that the student is unfit to sit examinations. Medical certificates will not be accepted in explanation for poor performance.

If you fall ill whilst taking an examination, seek assistance from the invigilator. If it is deemed necessary for you to attend the Medical Centre, and you receive medical certification as a result, your attempt at the examination will not be counted. In this way your tutor will be able to apply for a deferral of the examination in question to another examination session. Your examination will not be incremented and when next you take the examination it will be considered your first attempt at the examination.

Examination Timetables



Annual, Supplemental and Foundation Examination timetables are generated by the Examinations Office, situated within the Academic Registry, and made available to students approximately three weeks before the commencement of examinations. Once available, a personalised examination timetable will be available to students via their student portal my.tcd.ie under the 'My Exams' option menu. If you do not have access to the my.tcd.ie student portal, module timetables are available on the [Examinations Office website](#). Students

must ensure that they are available for examinations for the duration of the examination session (see dates to remember). The onus lies with each student to establish the dates, times and venues of examinations. No timetable or reminder will be sent to individual students by any office.

Examination Venues

[Maps](#) are available advising examination venues and their location within the College.

Academic Progress

The BESS Court of Examiners meets twice a year for the purpose of confirming marks and awarding examination grades in the BESS programme. It comprises all those teaching on the BESS programme, including staff from outside the immediate Schools/Departments. In addition the external examiners attend in the case of degree examinations in the Junior and Senior sophister years.

All final papers, whether examination or essay-based, are marked anonymously. All work contributing to Moderatorship is subject to review by an external examiner.

To rise with their class students must pass the relevant assessments. Each successful candidate is, according to merit, awarded one of three grades: first class honours, second class honours (with two divisions, first and second) and pass. Students who are unsuccessful at the annual examinations are permitted to present themselves at the supplemental examinations. Supplemental examinations will normally be granted only to students who are considered to have made a serious attempt at the annual examinations.

Candidates who have passed the Junior Sophister examination may have the ordinary degree of BA (pass) conferred if they do not choose, or have not qualified, to proceed to the Senior Sophister year.

Junior Sophister Year - Erasmus/Exchange

Work examined abroad will not be examined in Trinity College and students studying abroad will not be expected to be examined in work taught in Trinity College during their absence.

Students studying abroad for a full academic year must obtain not less than 45 ECTS credits, or equivalent, from the host university in order to rise with their year. Students studying abroad for half an academic year must obtain not less than 20 ECTS credits, or equivalent, from the host university and 30 credits from Trinity College in order to rise with their year.

Students on Erasmus and other exchange programmes may take supplemental examinations in accordance with the practice of the host university.

Examination results are sent through from the host universities to the relevant Erasmus/Exchange Coordinators in Trinity College who, in turn, weight results according to Trinity College norms. These results are presented to the Supplemental Court of Examiners as Annual results and published thereafter, as Annual results, along with all other results published at this time.

Subject to the discretion of the Court of Examiners, arrangements will normally be made for students who fail the year abroad to repeat the year in Trinity College.

Inclusion/Exclusion of Course Work

Where a student presents for supplemental assessment(s) or to repeat a year off-books (i.e. *fail* followed subsequently by *off-books-assessments only*, course work in general is not incorporated in the determination of the student's subsequent result(s). Students must be notified of any exceptions to this general principle

Where inclusion of course work in a student's result for the year is the normal procedure for a given module, this will apply to all students who have been given permission to withdraw from all, or part, of the annual examinations to sit, as a first attempt, a supplemental examination in that year.

Grading Conventions

The BESS Court of Examiners determines the overall grade awarded to a particular student taking into account whatever other evidence of an academic nature is deemed appropriate. The detailed marking scale is available on page 134 of this document.

Individual papers

Individual examination papers are graded using the following classifications.

I	70 - 100	F1	30 - 39
II.1	60 - 69	F2	< 30
II.2	50 - 59		
III	40 - 49		

A mark of 30+ means a mark in the range 30–39 inclusive, 35+ means a mark in the range 35–39 inclusive, 40+ means 40–49 inclusive, 50+ means 50–59 inclusive, 60+ means 60–69 inclusive, and 70+ means 70–100 inclusive.

Overall grade: General

The following conventions apply to all years.

- i. The overall mark (and associated grade) for a year is the weighted average of all module results, using the ECTS credit rating for the weighting of each module.
- ii. Where a student sits an extra examination paper (i.e. an examination in a module for which the student is not registered), the Court of Examiners will determine the student's grade on the basis of the marks in the modules for which the student was registered.
- iii. In order to rise with their year, a student must pass all modules worth in total 60 credits or pass by **compensation**. **In order to pass by compensation a student must have an overall arithmetic mean of 40+ and pass modules totaling 50 credits and get a mark of 35+ (Qualified Pass) in any failed module(s).**
- iv. If a student has achieved both Fail (mark under 35) and Qualified Pass marks (35 to 39) in the Semester 1 and 2 examinations, they must present in the supplemental session for reassessment in all failed components in all modules for which they obtained a Qualified Pass or Fail. N.B. "*all failed components*" mostly translates into one 100% component for the purposes of supplemental reassessment.
- v. The marks of the papers passed in the Semester 1 and 2 examinations are considered together with those obtained in the Supplemental examinations. The standard compensation rules apply to this combined set of results.
- vi. In the case of students who have been given permission to withdraw from, or defer all, or part of, the annual examinations, and to sit a supplemental examination in that year, the overall result in the Autumn will be graded, with an overall classification.
- vii. In the case of students who are reassessing in Semester 1 or Semester 2, the overall result in the autumn will be graded with Pass at Supplementals rather than classification. Two attempts at the examination will be recorded on Transcripts of Results.

Overall Mark, Grade, Classification, Award

A student pursuing the Single Honour in Business will be conferred with a Bachelor in Business Studies degree BBS (PRO). A student pursuing all other degree pathways within BESS will be conferred with a B.A. Moderatorship in Economic and Social Studies (MOD). PRO or MOD are calculated where the overall **aggregate** mark attained in the Junior Sophister year (weighted 30%) and the overall **aggregate** Senior Sophister year (weighted 70%) are added together.

What you may see on your **SITS** portal may differ slightly as each year, Junior Sophister and Senior Sophister, will show an overall **rounded** mark/grade attained for **that particular year**.

Example: In this case (see screenshot below), the student would see on their portal a calculated rounded mark of 68 (aggregate 67.58) for their Junior Sophister year and a calculated rounded mark of 70 (aggregate 70.17) for their Senior Sophister year (the aggregated overall marks are determined by calculating across module credit values without rounding up the final overall mark per each year). When accessing their SS results the student, in this example, would see that they attained, and rightly so, a **First Class result for the SS year** but, in terms of overall MOD or PRO 30 : 70, must then bear in mind that this mark of 70 does not take into account its weighting of 70%, rather than 100%.

The final Award and Classification here is based on the following aggregate calculations:

JS year $67.58 \times .3 = 20.274$; plus **SS** year $70.17 \times .7 = 49.119$ and when you add the two together you arrive at **69.393** which, because it has not reached the overall threshold of 69.50 is deemed II.1 overall Classification and subsequent Award and will be published as such.

Publication, Recheck, Appeal and Transcript of Results

Publication of Examination results

Publication of results take place on dates as specified and agreed by the BESS Programme Committee and are advised under 'Important Dates' of the Handbook and on the BESS website. Results are published to the Student Portal my.tcd.ie.

Re-checks

Students are entitled to discuss their performance with examiners after examination results have been published. Having discussed their performance with the examiner(s) and ascertained that the mark in question was correctly calculated, students may ask that their results be re-considered if they have reason to believe

- a. that the examination paper contained questions on modules which were not part of the module prescribed for the examination, or
- b. that bias was shown by an examiner in marking the script.

Through their tutor, students may appeal to the Senior Lecturer. In submitting their case, students should state under which of (a) or (b) above the request is being made. If a mark is revised, the Director of BESS should be notified of the mark change by the relevant Director of Undergraduate Teaching and Learning of the School. The Director will, by reference to the BESS Programme conventions, with the permission of the Senior Lecturer, amend the relevant module result(s) and overall grade as appropriate.

Appeals

Students may appeal a decision of the Court of Examiners. The grounds for appeal must fall under *one or more* of the following categories: (i) the case of the appellant is not adequately covered by the ordinary regulations of the College, (ii) the regulations of the College were not properly applied in the appellant's case, or (iii) the appeal is *ad misericordiam*.

Appeals in the first instance must be made to the Dean of the Faculty of Arts, Humanity & Social Sciences.

As the Appeal Committee meets to hear these appeals within one week of the publication of results, it is imperative that students, or authorised and adequately briefed deputies, are present to obtain and consider results as soon as they become available.

Appeals should be made via electronic form by a student's tutor or, if the tutor is unavailable to act, by the Senior Tutor.

Transcripts

Transcript requests may be made by applying on-line via the BESS [website](#). Due to the large volume of requests, transcripts can take up to five working days for completion, longer in pressure periods such as examination processing and start of academic semesters.

Your transcript is a comprehensive document that will include the ECTs values of each module and a set of grades that permit students to rise with their year and the set of grades that forms the basis of the award of the degree. The transcript will make explicit whether or not one or two sittings were required (however supplemental in a paper for which there was a deferral permitted from the annual session is not considered a separate sitting) and whether or not a year is repeated. The grades achieved on the second sitting will be clearly indicated. Where more than one sitting was required an overall grade will always be recorded as a Pass/Fail.

Transcripts are never issued to a third party, such as a parent or prospective employer without the written consent of the person named on the transcript.

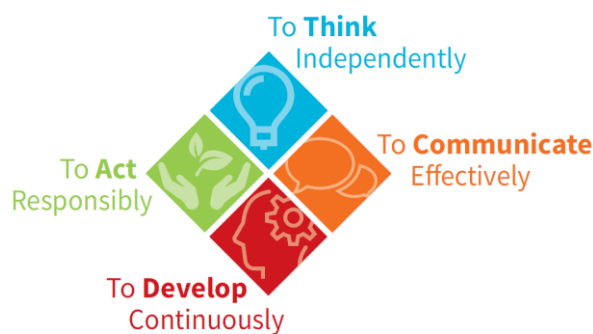
During the year the Departments arrange information sessions and speaker events that are of interest to BESS students. These will be advised and advertised by the pertinent departments.

The Graduate Attributes will enhance your employability. Whilst your degree remains fundamental, also being able to demonstrate these Graduate Attributes will help you to differentiate yourself as they encapsulate the kinds of transversal skills and abilities, which employers are looking for.

How will I develop these Graduate Attributes?

Many of the Graduate Attributes are 'slow learned', in other words, you will develop them over the four or five years of your programme of study.

They are embedded in the curriculum and in assessments, for example, giving presentations and engaging in group work.

You will also develop them through the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. If you help to run a club or society you will be improving your leadership skills, or if you play a sport you are building your communication and team-work skills.

Feedback and Evaluation

School of Social Sciences and Philosophy & School of Business

The BESS programme makes available a dedicated and course-specific online survey which students from each year of the programme are invited to respond to. This survey is anonymous and the information collated and made available to the Head of School, the Course Director, the Schools' Directors of Undergraduate Teaching and Learning, the School Manager and the Programme Administrator. The results are used in reviewing and improving aspects of the programme.

Evaluation of courses, and their constituent modules, is an important component of College's commitment towards improving the quality of teaching and the support of learning. To this end, all undergraduate modules that are taught by the School of Social Sciences and Philosophy and the Trinity Business School are evaluated on a yearly basis using an online survey. The survey is anonymous and the results are used in reviewing and improving aspects of each module and its delivery. We particularly want to hear what students think was good about a module and what needs to be improved. The results of module evaluation surveys are made available to the Heads of Departments, Heads of Schools, the Schools' Directors of Undergraduate Teaching and Learning, the School Manager. Teaching Assistants receive their feedback through communication with the course lecturer. Student feedback forms an important part of the evaluation and review process.

In addition, the results may also be referred to by lecturers in the nomination of Teaching Assistants for the Dermot McAleese Teaching Award. This is an annual award which is presented to one outstanding Teaching Assistant in each of the School's four disciplines. The nominations are reviewed by a committee in each department as well as the six members of the School Undergraduate Committee. The award has been made possible thanks to the generosity of School alumni.

Studies have shown that there is some gender bias in student evaluations of teaching – namely that female lecturers tend to receive more negative evaluations than their male counter-parts. We ask you to bear this in mind when making your evaluations.

SECTION FOUR – SCHOLARSHIP AND PRIZES

Scholarship Examination

Details on the College regulations for the achievement of Scholarship can be found here:

Candidates are examined in four papers drawn from the modules of their Pathway up to the end of Michaelmas term of the Senior Fresh year. The scope of each paper is described in the examination section of the BESS Course website. Recommendations for scholarship will be based on the arithmetic average achieved across all four papers, subject to all four papers being passed. In order to be recommended for Foundation Scholarship, candidates must achieve an overall mark of 70 per cent or higher. In addition, candidates are required to achieve a minimum of two first class marks out of the four papers and no paper may have a mark below 65 per cent.

The structure of the Scholarship examination for Business, Economic and Social Studies is as follows:

Harry Hartford Prize

This prize was founded in 2020, a gift from Harry Hartford, a graduate of the Faculty of Economic and Social Studies (Economics). The prize is awarded annually to the best Capstone Project within each of the disciplines of economics, political science, sociology and philosophy which focuses on research applicable to issues of public policy. The value of each prize is €1,000.

Gold Medal

The criteria for being awarded a **Gold Medal** for students is as follows - Gold Medals will be awarded to students who attain an overall mark of 75%, where the overall aggregated JS year result (weighted at 30%), along with the overall aggregated SS year result (weighted at 70%), will be considered together, and if an overall mark of 75% in either PRO (Professional) or MOD (Moderatorship) is attained, the student will be recommended for Gold Medal.

Gold Medals are awarded on the basis of a single annual attempt (to include Semesters 1 and 2 assessments). A deferral counts towards the single annual attempt. Gold Medals are not awarded to students who have to reassess in the Autumn.

First class honours in the School of Social Sciences and Philosophy is divided into grade bands which represent excellent, outstanding and extraordinary performances.

A first-class answer demonstrates a comprehensive and accurate answer to the question, which exhibits a detailed knowledge of the relevant material as well as a broad base of knowledge. Theory and evidence will be well integrated and the selection of sources, ideas, methods or techniques will be well judged and appropriately organised to address the relevant issue or problem. It will demonstrate a high level of ability to evaluate and integrate information and ideas, to deal with knowledge in a critical way, and to reason and argue in a logical way.

70-78 EXCELLENT

First class answers (excellent) demonstrate a number of the following criteria:

- comprehensiveness and accuracy;
- clarity of argument and quality of expression;
- excellent structure and organization;
- integration of a range of relevant materials;
- evidence of wide reading;
- critical evaluation;
- lacks errors of any significant kind;
- shows some original connections of concepts and theories;
- contains reasoned argument and comes to a logical conclusion.

This answer does not demonstrate outstanding performance in terms of independence and originality.

79-84 OUTSTANDING

In addition to the above criteria, an outstanding answer will show frequent original treatment of material. Work at this level shows independence of judgement, exhibits sound critical thinking. It will frequently demonstrate characteristics such as imagination, originality and creativity.

This answer does not demonstrate exceptional performance in terms of insight and contribution to new knowledge.

85-100 EXTRAORDINARY

This answer is of a standard far in excess of what is expected of an undergraduate student. It will show frequent originality of thought, a sophisticated insight into the subject and make new connections between pieces of evidence beyond those presented in lectures. It demonstrates an ability to apply learning to new situations and to solve problems.

What differentiates a first class piece of work from one awarded an upper second is a greater lucidity, a greater independence of judgement, a greater depth of insight and degree of originality, more evidence of an ability to integrate material, and evidence of a greater breadth of reading and research.

----- o -----

Second Class, First Division II.1 60-69

An upper second class answer generally shows a sound understanding of both the basic principles and relevant details, supported by examples, which are demonstrably well understood, and which are presented in a coherent and logical fashion. The answer should be well presented, display some analytical ability and contain no major errors of omissions. Not necessarily excellent in any area.

Upper second class answers cover a wider band of students. Such answers are clearly highly competent and typically possess the following qualities:

- accurate and well-informed;
- comprehensive;
- well-organised and structured;
- evidence of reading;
- a sound grasp of basic principles;
- understanding of the relevant details;
- succinct and cogent presentation; and
- evaluation of material although these evaluations may be derivative.

One essential aspect of an upper second-class answer is that it must have completely dealt with the question asked by the examiner. In questions:

- all the major issues and most of the minor issues must have been identified;
- the application of basic principles must be accurate and comprehensive; and
- there should be a conclusion that weighs up the pros and cons of the arguments.

Second Class. Second Division II.2 50-59

A substantially correct answer which shows an understanding of the basic principles.

Lower second class answers display an acceptable level of competence, as indicated by the following qualities:

generally accurate;

- an adequate answer to the question based largely on textbooks and lecture notes;
- clearly presentation; and
- no real development of arguments.

----- o -----

Third Class Honours III 40-49

A basic understanding of the main issues if not necessarily coherently or correctly presented.

Third class answers demonstrate some knowledge of understanding of the general area but a third-class answer tends to be weak in the following ways:

- descriptive only;
- does not answer the question directly;
- misses key points of information and interpretation
- contains serious inaccuracies;
- sparse coverage of material; and
- assertions not supported by argument or evidence.

----- O -----

Fail F1 30-39

Answers in the range usually contain some appropriate material (poorly organised) and some evidence that the student has attended lectures and done a bare minimum of reading. The characteristics of a fail grade include:

- misunderstanding of basic material;
- failure to answer the question set;
- totally inadequate information; and
- incoherent presentation.

Bad Fail F2 0-29

Answers in this range contain virtually no appropriate material and an inadequate understanding of basic concepts.

FRU1152Y – French Language and Civilisation (Year Long 10 ECTS)

(2 Contact Hours per week plus 3 hours Guided Self-Access work)

Entry Requirements: French Honours Leaving Certificate H4 minimum or Cat A-Level. Students must take FRU11511 in MT in order to take FRU11512 in HT.

Course Content:

French Civilisation 1 (Society) focuses on French Society and will introduce students to Sociology in the French context and make them aware of the distinctiveness of France in these areas. The programme has been designed to help students identify and develop language learning strategies which they will be able to use independently.

French Civilisation (Economy) focuses on French Economy and introduces students to Economics in the French context and make them aware of the distinctiveness of France in these areas. The programme has been designed to help student identify and develop language learning strategies which they will be able to use independently. In second year the programme will focus on Politics and Business in France.

Learning Outcomes: On successful completion of both modules, students will be able to:

- Make links between events and facts from French current affairs and the wider French Societal and economic framework outlined during the course;
- Follow lectures on these topics in French and take notes using an outline of the lecture;
- Read, identify and understand the structure and main points of French textbooks and articles from specialized periodicals and newspapers on the above topics;
- Read the same materials to locate and retrieve specific information;
- Understand a French native speaker presenting factual information on these topics;
- Discuss these topics with a French native speaker; make short and structured oral Presentations on aspects of French society and the French economy;
- Use authentic sources and course materials to develop their vocabulary and other language competencies;
- Describe, compare and contrast the situation in France and Ireland in the context of a discussion with French native speakers

Assessment: Continuous assessment and end-of-year examination (written paper, aural and oral)

Students who take BESS French as an option in first **and** second year can apply to participate in a Socrates exchange in order to spend their third year studying business, economics and social studies at a partner university or Business School in France.

GRU1100Y – German Language 1 (3 Contact Hours per Week)

Entry Requirements: German Honours Leaving Certificate H4 minimum or C at A-Level. This module is not suitable for native/near native speakers of German.

Course Aims and Content:

This module aims to consolidate existing written, oral and aural German language skills and to encourage the further development of communicative and cultural competence. The course also aims to develop study skills as well as the following transferable skills:

- Planning;

- Time-management.

The modules develop text comprehension and production of a range of both written and oral/aural text types including descriptive and narrative texts and written expression of opinion. You will improve your speaking skills by talking about different aspects of German life and people.

Teaching and Learning Methods

- Contact teaching: Seminars and lectures
- Directed learning: Homework
- Blended learning: Self-access on-line tasks and exercises
- Group work

Students who successfully complete this course should be capable of demonstrating an ability

- to understand radio and news broadcasts, lectures and discussions;
- to participate in conversations about their lives and interests, university and general topics such as mentioned in newspapers as well as conversations specific to their degree course, such as business, law or literature;
- to write short but accurate narrative and descriptive texts or expressing opinion on contemporary topics and topics covered in class;
- to build up and expand a solid basic active and passive vocabulary;
- to understand and apply the basics of German grammar to both spoken and written German.

Assessment: Continuous Assessment in MT and HT (100%) including 10% for attendance.

Students who take German as an option in first **and** second year can apply for an Erasmus exchange in order to spend their third year studying at a partner university in Germany or Austria.

GRU2208Y – SECOND YEAR SPANISH

Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this module, students should be able to:

- Understand and apply more complex features of German grammar, including participial phrases and passive voice, in spoken and written contexts;
- Understand and use appropriately the specialist vocabulary (Universität) and the lexical and syntactic features of a particular field of study (Fachsprache);
- Read and understand articles from academic publications and translate extracts into correct and idiomatic English;
- Identify the syntactic and structural differences between oral and written language and Fachsprache;
- Clearly summarize texts and express opinion on general topics;
- Write essays in German on a topic from their field of study;
- Give oral presentations in German on a topic from their field of study.

Module Content

Students will be introduced to the prevailing terminology of the German university system and to the Fachsprache (specialist register) of their study field/cohort. This will be accomplished through the guided discussion of appropriate text examples, along with vocabulary, grammar, comprehension and translation exercises.

Course Content: These modules give students a basic knowledge of the Russian language, culture and contemporary Russian society.

Learning aims:

The modules aim to a) enable students to use spoken and written Russian inside and outside the classroom; b) develop students' understanding of how the Russian language works; c)

foster in students the language skills necessary to pursue their interests through the medium of Russian; d) foster an interest in and awareness of Russian society and culture.

On completing these modules you will be able to keep the conversation going about simple topics such as family and friends, food and traditional cuisine, travelling and transport, cities and directions. Students with LC, A level results in Polish, or those have native or near-native level of proficiency in Polish, are **not permitted** to take these modules. **PLU11051 and PLU11052 must be taken together in the same year.**

Course Content: These modules give students a basic knowledge of Polish language, culture and contemporary Polish society.

Learning Objectives:

The modules aim to:

- enable students to use spoken and written Polish inside and outside the classroom;
- develop students' understanding of how the Polish language works;
- foster in students the language skills necessary to pursue their interests through the medium of Polish;
- foster an interest in and awareness of Polish society and culture.

On completion of the modules students will arrive at the mid A1 level of language competence (the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

Learning Outcomes:

On successful completion of these modules students will be able to:

- use Polish to express information about themselves and others, tell a story, express an opinion;
- use Polish in the classroom;
- use the case system and the verbal system at the basic level;
- express the following meanings: quantity (how many?), time (when?), frequency (how often?), direction (where?)

comprehend and extract main points from Polish-language texts, correctly identify the general idea of a text;

comprehend contextual information (people, places and events) in Polish-language texts;

use reference tools (dictionaries and grammars) to obtain grammatical and lexical information;

formulate questions about structures they do not understand.

Module aims: The modules aim to further develop student's knowledge of Russian language and culture, as well as reading and communication skills.
