

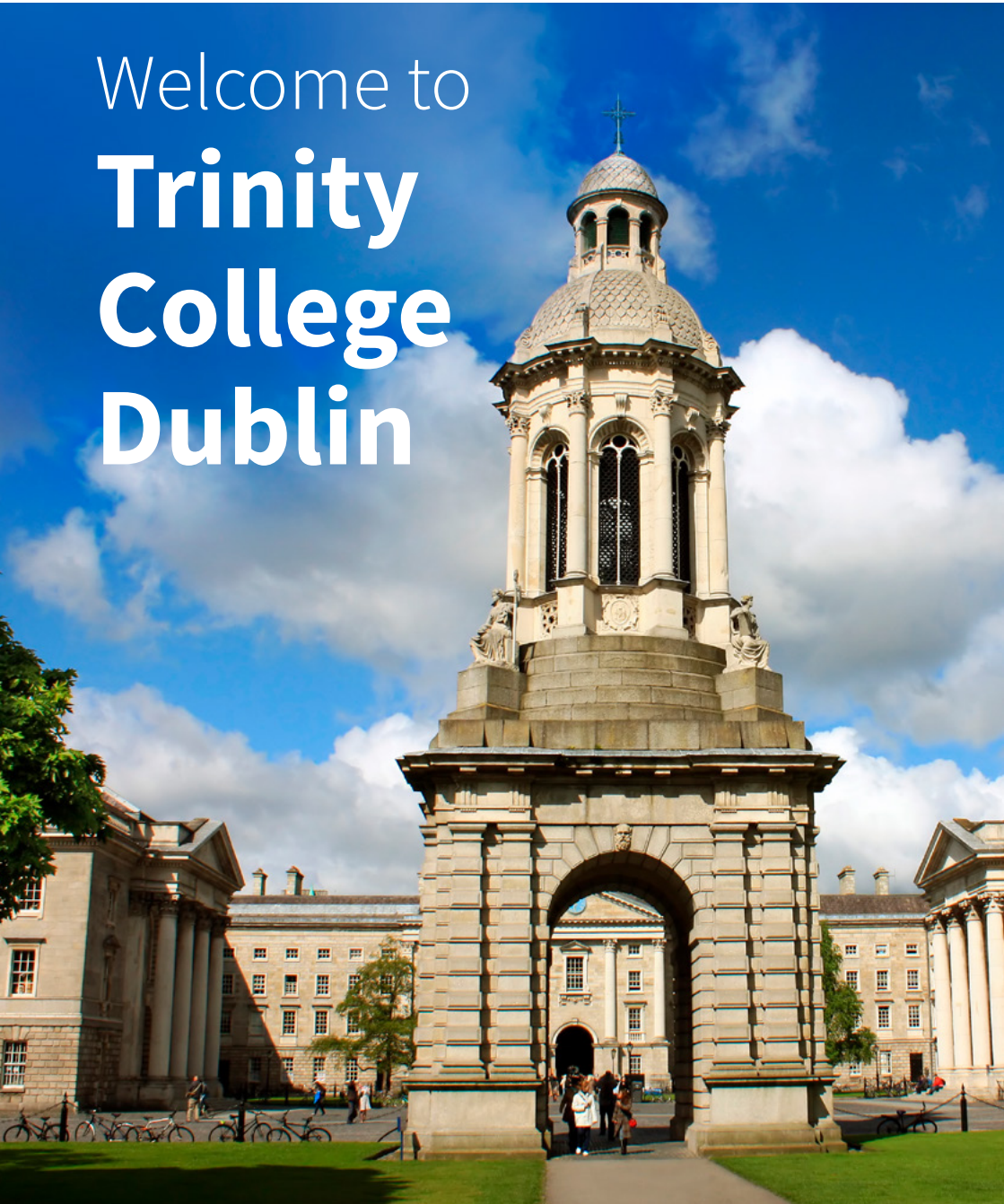

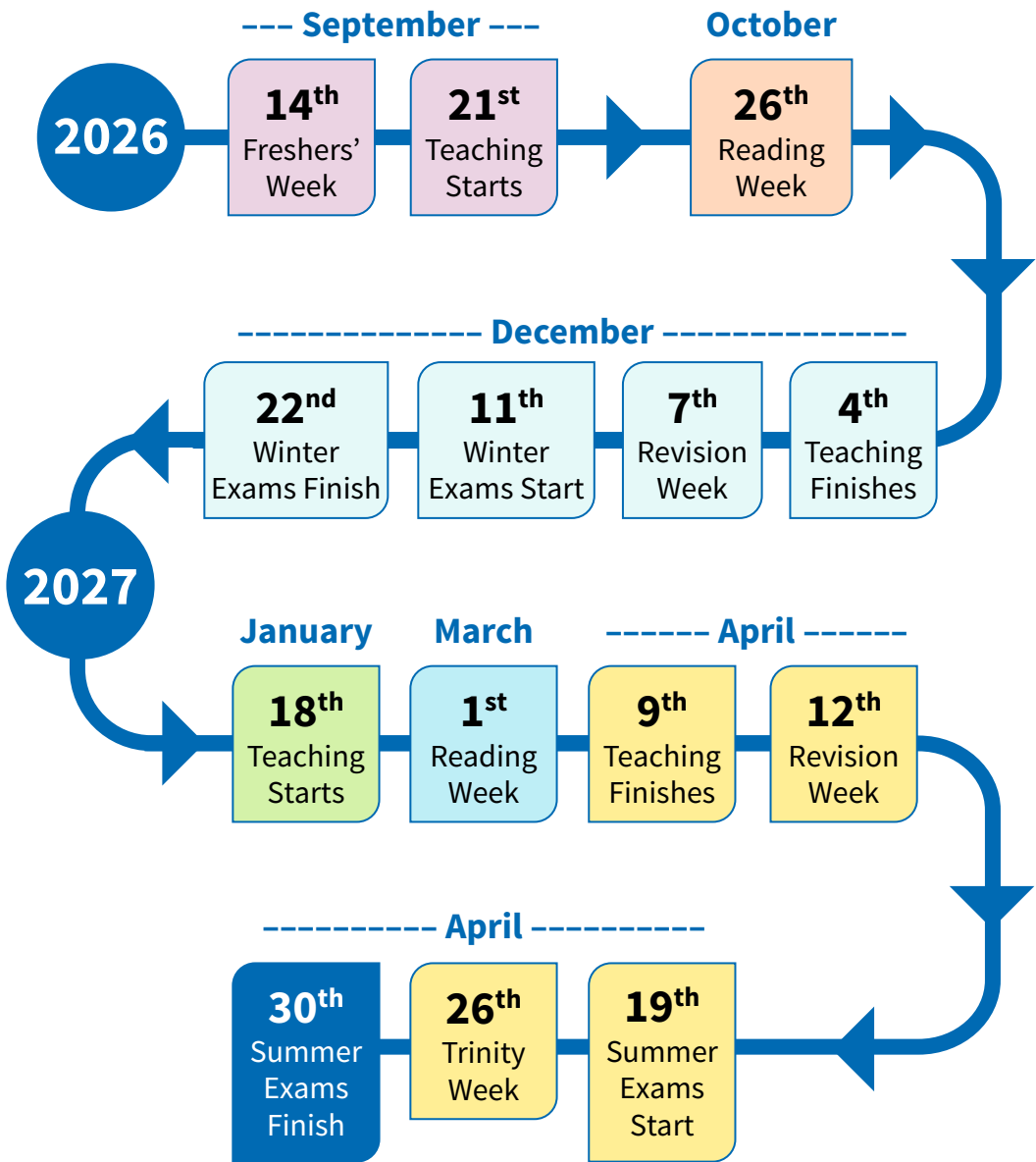

Guide to Registration

1. How do I register?

You register online via the my.tcd.ie website. Registration will open from August onwards on a course-by-course basis. An invitation to register will be sent to the email address you provided during the application process. **Please check your emails for updates regularly.** Once you have registered, emails will be sent to your new Trinity email address.

A Trinity username and password have been created for you to give you immediate access to my.tcd.ie

Username: Shown on the top right corner of both the email and letter you received. This is also your **Trinity Student ID Number**.

Password: This is your date of birth in the format DDMONYYYY, e.g. 03FEB2008

If you have previously accessed my.tcd.ie using your current username and password you should **continue** to do so, as these details have not been changed.

Once you have been invited to register, you will see an in-tray message in your my.tcd.ie portal and you will have access to the **'Register'** tab in the main menu of the portal.

To complete registration, click on the 'Register' tab and proceed.

You must complete all listed registration tasks successfully before the process is complete. When you have completed these tasks successfully you will see a **green tick** next to the task. If tasks are incomplete, you will see a **red X**. All mandatory fields are marked with an asterisk (*).

Registration does not have to be completed in one sitting. You can complete a single task or multiple tasks, exit, and return later to proceed. The completed tasks will be saved when you log out. **You must complete all tasks before registration is complete.**

2. How do I pay my fees?

You can pay your fees through the following methods:

- **Online Payment:** You can make an online payment using a debit or credit card in step seven of the registration process on my.tcd.ie, or by clicking the 'My Finance' tab in your portal. **This is the quickest and easiest way to pay.**
- **Local Currency Payment via TransferMate (Recommended for International Students):** If you select to pay your fees in your local currency during the registration process, you will be directed to the [TransferMate website](https://www.transfermate.com). TransferMate is an easy-to-use online payment platform which offers a secure, fast, and affordable way to make your international payments to Trinity. Where TransferMate has a local bank account, you will not be subjected to any international wire fees and will be able to pay in your local currency with competitive foreign exchange rates. TransferMate receipts are also accepted by visa and immigration agencies.

3. How will I know that I'm registered?

You will receive a 'Confirmation of Registration' in-tray message on your my.tcd.ie dashboard once you have completed the registration process. At this point, you can receive a student card and avail of all of the student services that we have to offer.

You can collect your student card in the Orientation Hub in the Exam Hall during Freshers' Week. You will receive a message in your my.tcd.ie in-tray with instructions for uploading a photo and further details about collection.

You must upload a photo before your student card can be printed.

The Orientation Website

The first thing you need to do now is to go to tcd.ie/students/orientation and click on 'Undergraduate Students'

The Orientation website has a lot more information that you'll need to get registered and to start your course, so do make sure you spend some time looking around.

You'll find your Orientation Timetable there, too, with details on how to access Orientation Week information meetings.

It is essential that you follow this timetable during Orientation Week, rather than the one that appears in my.tcd.ie

Click on 'Orientation Timetables & Important Course Information' to find key course-specific information you must review before starting your studies. Some courses have additional requirements you must fulfill before you can register and you will find them here.

If you need to complete **health screenings** or **Garda vetting** before you register, it's vital that you do this as soon as possible as you may not be able to complete registration without submitting these forms.

All of the information you'll need to complete these requirements will be on the Orientation website.

For mature students, disabled students, and TAP/HEAR/DARE students, there is also important information for you about additional Orientation events (you'll find it in the left-hand navigation menu) so make sure to read it.



Orientation Timetable

You will see a number of events on your Orientation Timetable. Orientation events are mandatory for students, unless stated otherwise.

Provost's Welcome – The Provost's Welcomes will take place at 5pm on **Monday 14th** and **Wednesday 16th September** in the Ed Burke Theatre. These events will also be live-streamed. You can find further details on the Orientation website.

General Sessions – these sessions will cover student supports and services, how we do things at Trinity, and key information to help you navigate your first couple of weeks. You'll also have a chance to ask us all the questions you might have about studying, keeping yourself well, and getting involved in College life.

Course Meeting – this session is run by your School and takes you through the academic expectations of the year. You'll get a chance to meet some of your lecturers, and to find out what kind of classes you'll be taking and how you will be assessed.

S2S Mentor Meet-Up – your S2S Mentors will be really important people during your first year. S2S Mentors are students who have already completed their first year at Trinity, so they can answer all the questions you have about being a student and give you advice based on what they've learned so far. Your S2S Mentor Meet-Up is a key meeting to attend because it also gives you a chance to meet your fellow classmates in a smaller group and to further explore the campus.

Meet Your Tutor – your Tutor will be another important person throughout your time in Trinity. Your Tutor is an academic staff member who is there to look out for you not your grades. You may be invited to a first introductory meeting with them during Freshers' Week, or else we encourage you to reach out to them by email.

You may have more events than these listed on your timetable, and if you do they are specific to your course (e.g. laboratory tours). These are also compulsory.

The Orientation Hub

Make sure to collect your student ID card from the Orientation Hub in the Exam Hall during Orientation Week. Key student services will be present in the Hub to answer your questions and to help ensure you're fully set-up and ready to go as a Trinity student. You may even find some fun freebies and prizes up for grabs, so don't miss out!

Remember – these are just the official College events happening during Freshers' Week. The Students' Union (TCDSU/AMLCT) and the clubs, societies, and publications have a very busy week of events, too! Check out [@tcdsu.amlct](#), [@trinityentsiamsa](#), and specific society/club/publication social media accounts for details!

As well as timetabled Orientation events and the Hub taking place on campus, there'll also be a lot more video and interactive content about getting started at College on the Orientation website that you can look at in your own time during Freshers' Week.

Your First Semester

After the excitement of Freshers' Week, you'll settle into lectures and labs and serious academics. However, we'll still be here to help you adjust to College, and to give you practical advice and information.



In addition to the support offered by each of our student services, your S2S Mentors will be looking out for you all year, sending you weekly emails and arranging social meet ups. The emails will contain links to an important programme for you in the first semester:

Trinity In Twelve Weeks.

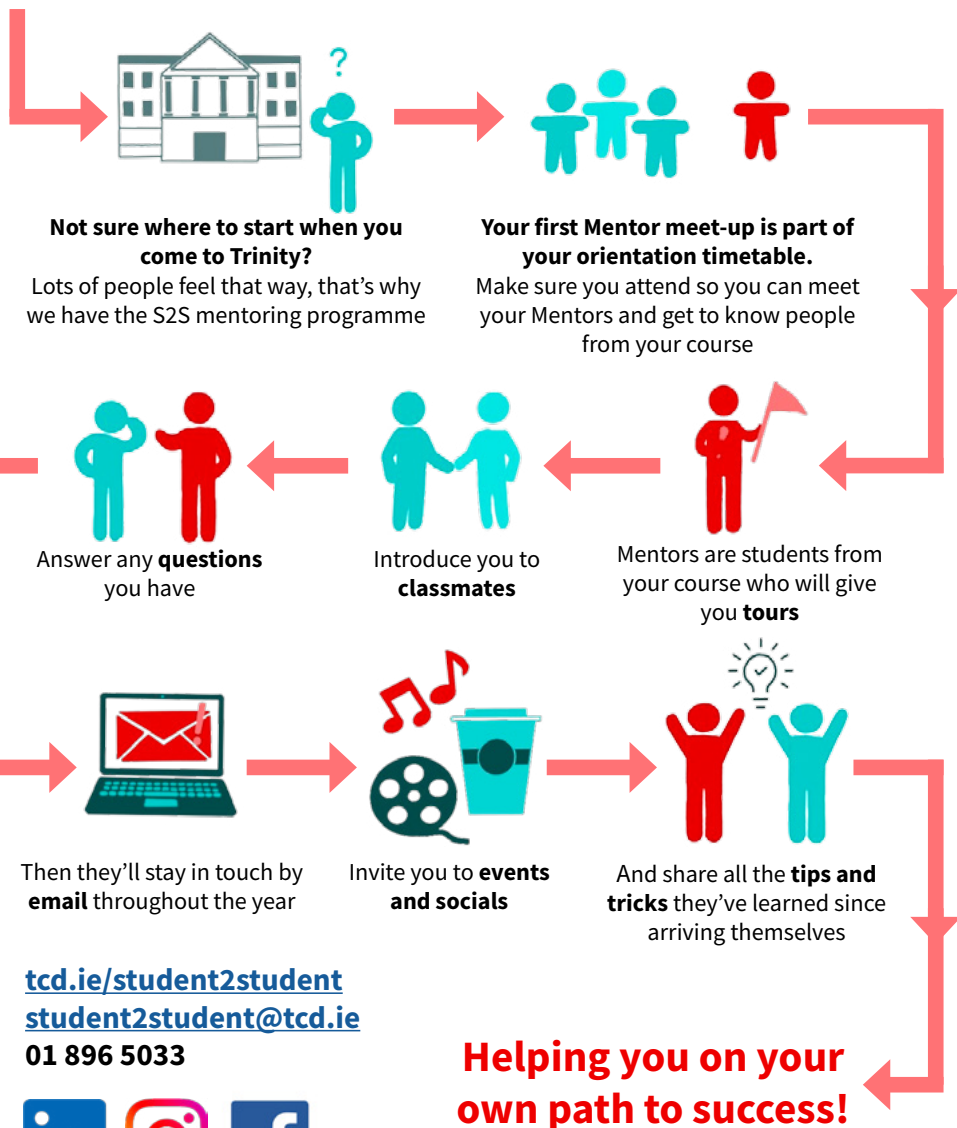

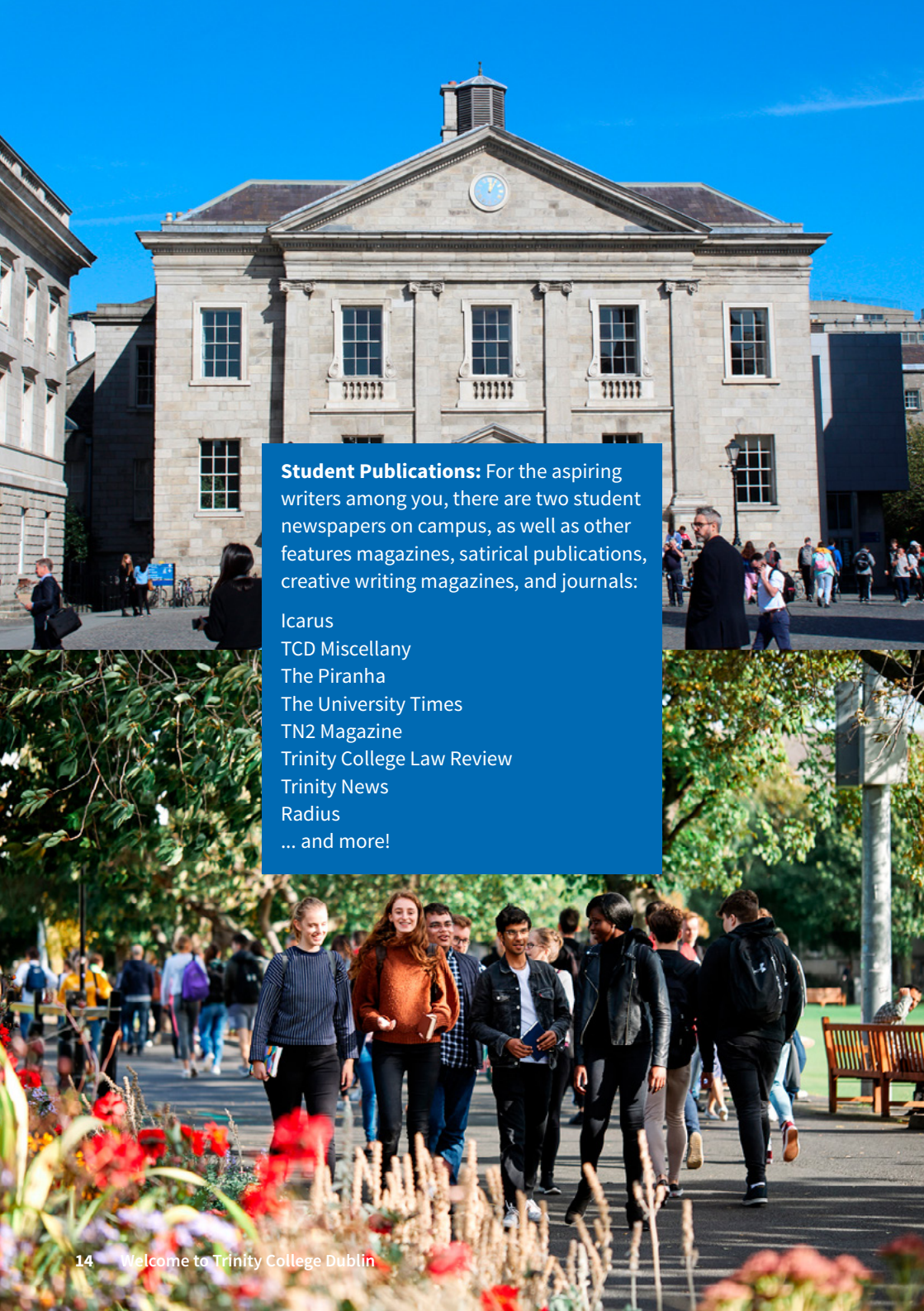
Societies

Student Services

The Student Services are here to help you on your journey through College. You probably won't need all of them, but it's important that you know they are there if you do. You'll find out more about all of the services during Orientation Week and throughout your first term. Remember that even if you are not on campus all the time, many of these services are offered remotely as well – check out their websites for details.

Administrative & Pastoral Support

Your Personal Tutor

The Tutorial System is unique to Trinity. You will be assigned a Tutor, who is an academic staff member, at the start of your time in Trinity. They are there to help you navigate your way through College. They care about you, not about your grades.

Make sure to contact your Tutor during your first few weeks in College to introduce yourself. Your Tutor may also invite you to an introductory meeting, and you should attend if they do. Find out more about the Tutorial System here: tcd.ie/seniortutor

Academic Registry

The Academic Registry will be involved in your whole College career, from application to graduation. You'll first meet them when you pick up your student card from the Orientation Hub in the Exam Hall during Freshers' Week. Make sure to locate the Academic Registry Service Desk in the Watts Building, and you can find out more about their services here: tcd.ie/academicregistry/



Academic Support

The Library

There are 3 main library hubs in College: the Library Complex made up of the Boland, Lecky, and Ussher Libraries; the Hamilton Library; and the John Stearne. The Library Complex houses mostly arts, humanities, and social science texts; the Hamilton holds mostly science and engineering materials; and the John Stearne is the medical library. However, you are welcome to use whichever reading rooms suit you best! The Library also has a huge number of electronic resources which you'll be able to access both on and off campus. tcd.ie/library/

IT Services

Activating Your Trinity Computer Account

Once you have completed registration online at my.tcd.ie, you will need to activate your Trinity computer account in your portal. A red notification box will appear on the homepage of your portal. Click on the link to **'Activate your Trinity Computer Account'**. Once you have agreed to the required terms and conditions of use, return to your portal homepage. In the 'New Intraday Messages' section, you will have received a new message containing your Trinity computer account username and an initial password. The in-tray message will also outline the steps for how to set your own password – a step which is important for good IT security, and which you must complete before you can access your Trinity email account.

Once you have set your own password and set up Multi-Factor Authentication, visit the IT Services webpages for new students at tcd.ie/itservices/students/orientation/ for information on how to get started with your Trinity email account; where to find computer rooms on campus; how to connect your device to the student Wi-Fi; and how to use other services, such as the printing, scanning, and photocopying service.

Connecting to the Student Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is available to all students when on campus or in most Trinity locations, including Trinity Hall.

MyZone: Your Student Email

As a Trinity student you will receive an @tcd.ie email address. This service is powered by Google.

You will need to check your Trinity student email regularly as this is how College will communicate with you while you are a student.

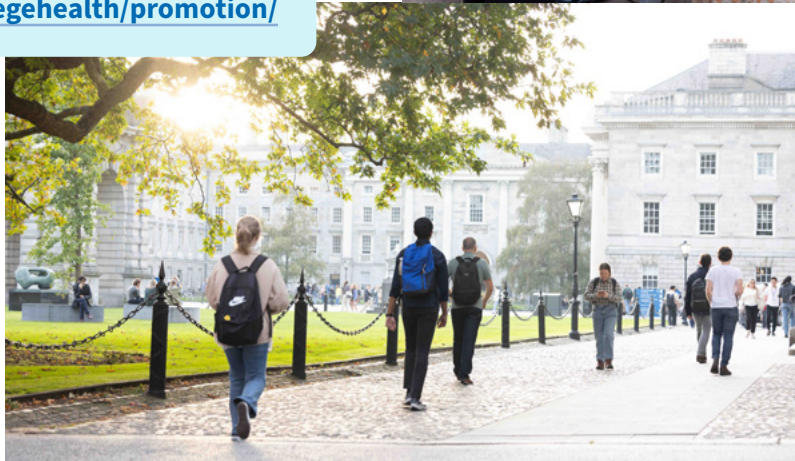

Data Protection

1. What data do we hold?

In the course of performing university functions and associated student services, Trinity processes lots of data about students. Common examples include: names, addresses, student numbers, photographs, mobile telephone numbers, dates of birth, etc. In some cases, Trinity may also receive sensitive personal data about students, such as health or welfare data. For example, our College Health Service, Counselling Services, or disAbility Service may receive health or conviction data in the course of performing their functions.

2. What do we use it for?

Trinity processes and discloses your data to various departments/units within Trinity for the purpose of performing university functions and providing associated facilities and services. For example, we compile and retain the student registration data you give us and we maintain an ongoing record of course selection data, examinations data, attendance data, awards and credits, etc. Student data is shared with Trinity Development and Alumni who manage alumni relations on behalf of Trinity.

We will not normally use your data for any unrelated purpose without your consent. However, in exceptional cases permitted by data protection laws, we may process and disclose data without consent or notice to you, for example if it is required to investigate offences, to prevent injury or damage, or to comply with a legal obligation.

3. Accessing your data

You have a legal right to access your personal data subject to payment of any relevant

statutory fees and certain exceptions which are set out at law. To ensure a coordinated and appropriate response to data access requests, all such requests should be made via the [Data Access Request Form](#) and emailed to Trinity's Data Protection Officer. In order to protect the security of personal data it may be necessary for you to provide proof of identification.

4. Parents/Guardians

As Trinity considers students, even if they are not yet 18, to have the maturity to give consent for the use of their data, in normal circumstances, Trinity will not disclose personal data to the parents, guardians, or other representatives of a student without the student's consent. Trinity's preference is to receive written consent by way of email from the student where possible. Without such consent, Trinity will not release any details regarding students – including details of their registration, attendance, fee payments, etc. However, there may be exceptional circumstances, for example, in the case of potential danger to the health or well-being of a student, or if a representative, such as a solicitor or politician, has written to Trinity making it clear that they are acting on behalf of the student.

If you are joining us as a **non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK** student, you will need to register with the Irish Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) soon after arrival. Details on how to do this can be found at: tcd.ie/students/orientation/add-int/

Health Care Provision in Ireland

All **EU/EEA/Swiss/UK** students can find out more about healthcare provision in Ireland through the Irish Health Service Executive (HSE) at hse.ie. All EU/EEA/Swiss students should bring a European Health Insurance Card issued in their country of origin with them to Ireland. UK students should bring a GHIC. Find out more at: hse.ie/services/schemes-allowances

Non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK students are not entitled to free national health services in Ireland and are obliged to take out insurance cover (including cover for hospitalisation) before leaving their home country.

In order to register with the Irish Immigration Service Delivery, as all **non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK** students are required to do, you **must show proof of health insurance** covering any medical care which may be necessary during your stay. Did You Know?

Upon successful completion of an undergraduate programme at Trinity, **non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK** students can apply for a Third Level Graduate Programme visa. This visa allows graduates to stay in Ireland for up to one year, pursuing unrivalled work experience opportunities in a wide range of industries and organisations.

While completing their degree, full-time **non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK** students are allowed to work for up to 20 hours per week during term time and 40 hours per week outside of term.

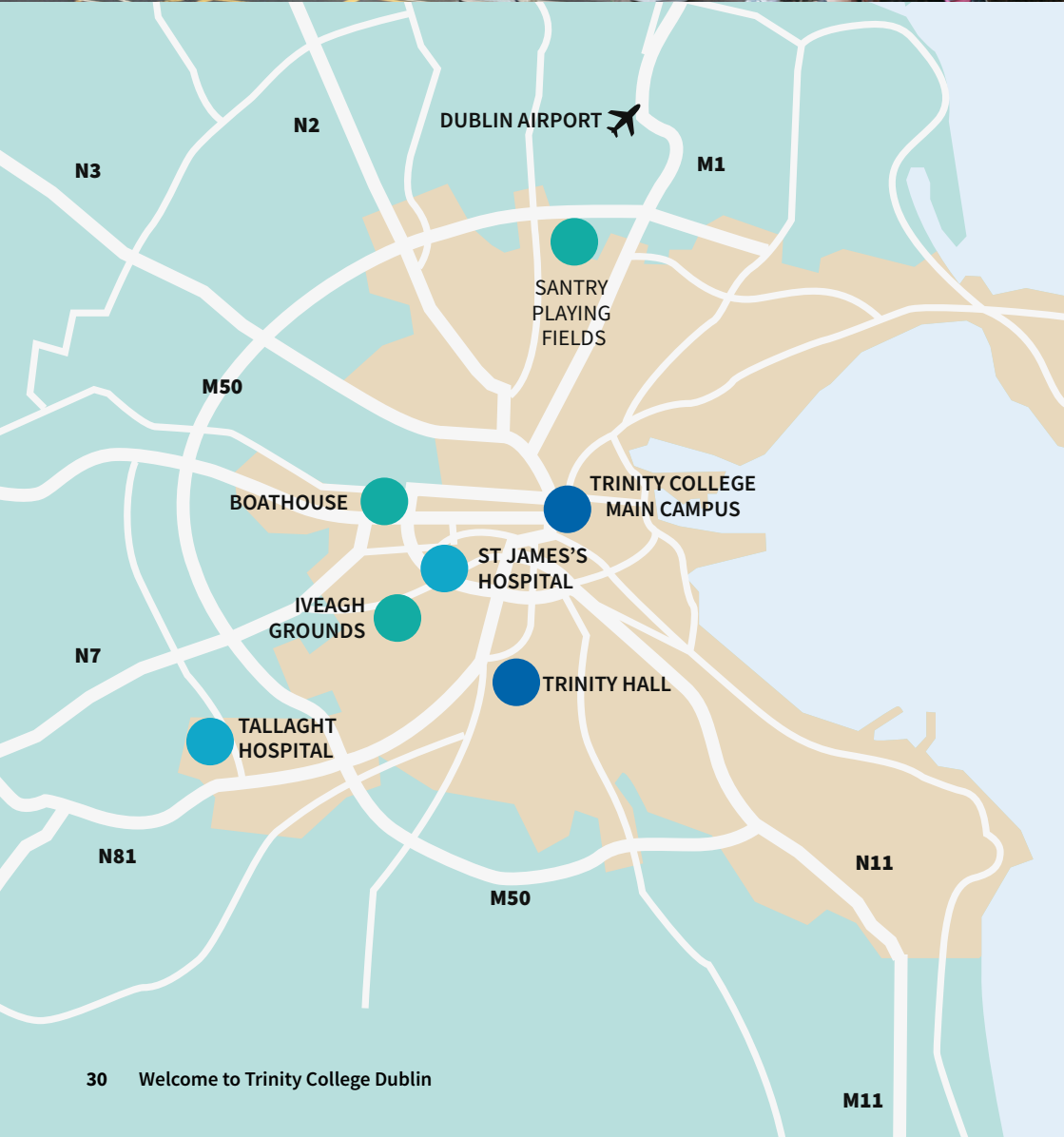

Wifi?

Wi-Fi is available on campus and in most Trinity locations, including Trinity Hall. All the instructions on how to get connected, and how to get help, can be found at tcd.ie/itservices/students/orientation

Transport?

We recommend that all students acquire a Child, Young Adult, or Student Leap Card in order to take advantage of discounted fares on public transport across Dublin and Ireland. Visit leapcard.ie to figure out which card is right for you and order it online.

Bank Account?

Bring some photo ID, your student card, and proof of address to any bank to set up a student account. Once you have registered, you can generate a 'Confirmation of Registration' letter from the Academic Registry in your my.tcd.ie portal to serve as both proof of address and of your student status.
