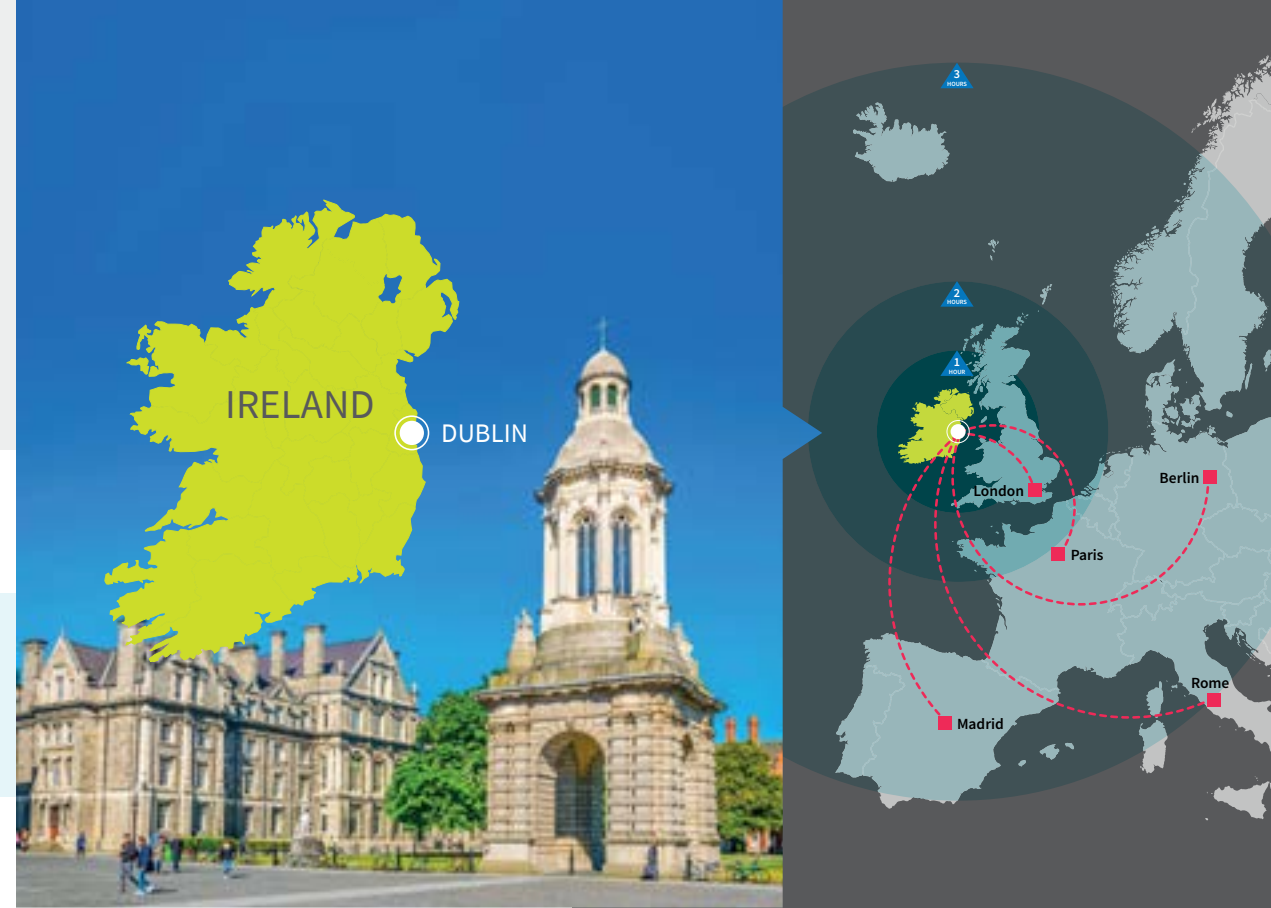

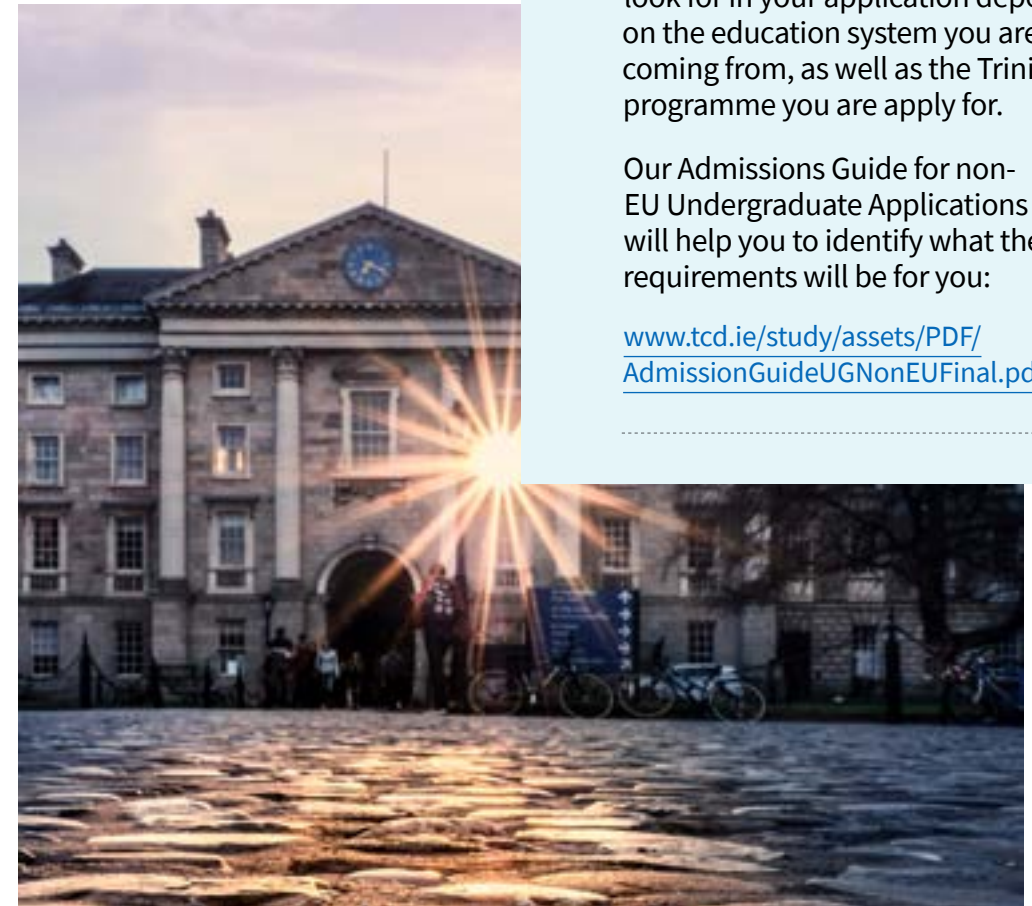

How to Apply

1. Go to www.tcd.ie/courses → and find the course you're interested in.
2. Read the user guide for non-EU applicants www.tcd.ie/study/international/how-to-apply → or watch our how to apply video bit.ly/HowToApplyTrinity →
3. Apply by selecting the 'Non-EU Application' link under the course description. You can save your application and return to it, but remember to submit it when you're finished!
4. When applying to Trinity you must also include a personal statement. This is 500 words on why you are considering Trinity and the specific course you have chosen, how you see yourself contributing to the Trinity community and what you see yourself doing with your degree. As part of the application process you will also have to provide us with references. Please provide email addresses for one counsellor and one teacher and make sure your referees know to expect a direct email request from Trinity.
5. Note: A non-refundable application fee of €55 applies per course.

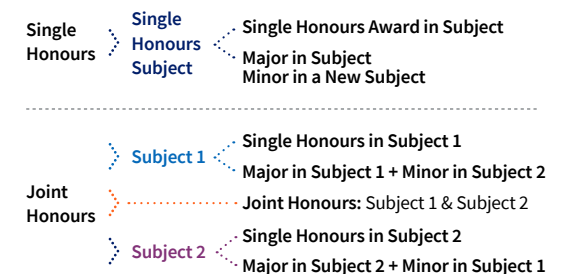

Trinity College Dublin and Columbia University – Dual BA Programme

The Dual BA between Trinity and Columbia University offers students an international educational experience across two continents and at two world-class universities.

Students graduate from the Dual BA with two degrees, one from Trinity and one from Columbia. With years one and two spent at Trinity and the final two years at Columbia

Admissions

Applicants to the Dual BA Programme must apply by 2 January for 2023 enrolment.

The admissions process includes a review of the applicant's academic history, letters of recommendation, a personal essay, and an interview conducted in English. Interested applicants are encouraged to preview a PDF version of the application (for reference use only) before starting an electronic application. Applications will be reviewed by a joint committee featuring admissions representatives from both Columbia and Trinity.

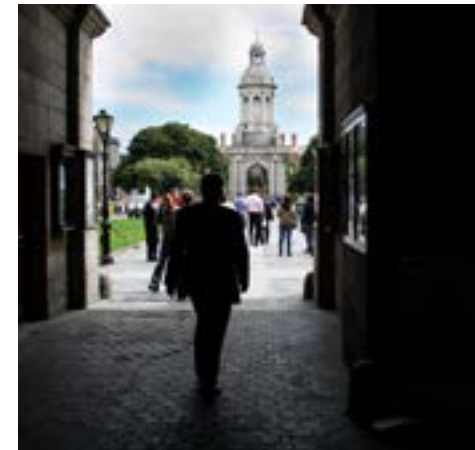
The Dual BA Programme is adopting a test-optional policy (SAT/ ACT) for the fall of 2022.

International Foundation Programme

The International Foundation Programme is a year long pre-university programme aimed at students who have the drive and ambition to attend a world-class university however cannot begin an international undergraduate degree directly.

The programme is delivered at the campus of Trinity's associated college, Marino Institute of Education, where excellent student facilities and on-site accommodation are available. The Marino campus is a 15-minute journey from Dublin city centre.

Students who successfully complete the Trinity International Foundation Programme and achieve the required grades are guaranteed entry into their chosen degree the following academic year.



Minimum English Language Requirements

- IELTS: 5.0 overall (5.0 in writing with no element below 4.5).
- TOEFL: 64 with 16 in writing.
- Duolingo Test of English: minimum overall score of 80/160, dated since January 2020.

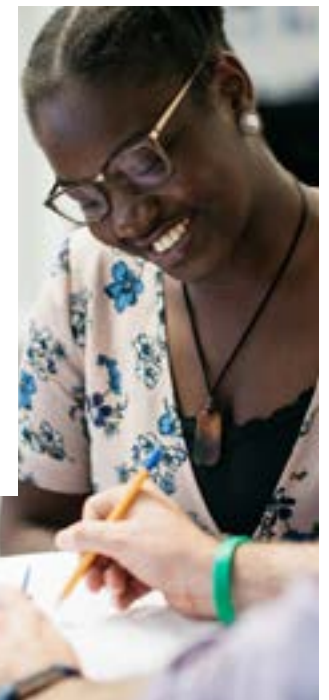

Entry Requirements

Postgraduate study at Trinity is academically challenging and as a result the University has high academic entry requirements.

Applicants will need to:

- Hold at least a 2.1 honours degree (3.2 GPA on 4.0 scale) from an Irish university or equivalent result from a university in another country
- Meet the English language requirements

Some courses may require higher standards or require you to take further tests or attend an interview.



English Language Requirements

All applicants whose first language is not English and who have not been educated through the medium of English must present one of the following qualifications in the English language: IELTS, TOEFL, University of Cambridge Proficiency Certificate, Advanced Certificate, Duolingo English Test, Pearson Test of English (Academic) PTE Academic or Trinity Pre-sessional.

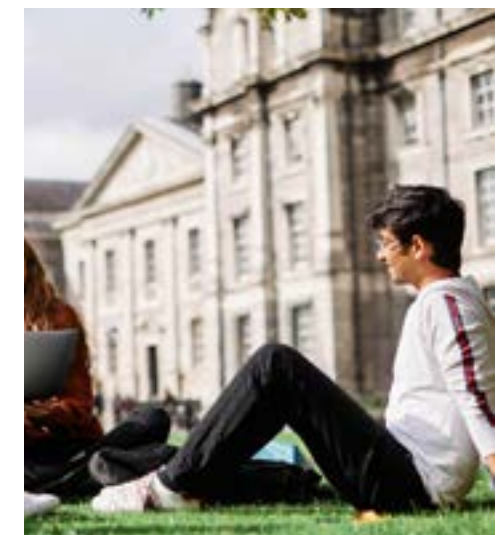
Please note that test scores are only valid for two years. For further details on these English Language Proficiency Tests, please contact the appropriate organisation directly. An applicant whose first language is not English but who has taken a degree through the medium of English may be eligible provided they did not complete their studies more than two years prior to admission. However, some courses may request applicants to present an English language qualification under certain circumstances.

Visa-required applicants who meet Trinity's English language requirements may be required to present an additional English language proficiency qualification such as IELTS, TOEFL or PTE for visa application purposes. Applying for a Masters by Research or PhD at Trinity

As a truly international university, we welcome applications from prospective postgraduate students globally and we hope you will consider choosing Trinity for your postgraduate research.

1. Find a Potential Academic Supervisor

Once you have identified your research area, the next step is to make contact with academic staff in relevant fields and identify a potential supervisor: www.tcd.ie/research →

2. Make Contact with Potential Academic Supervisor

Contact potential academic supervisors with a brief research proposal or idea, demonstrating your interest and relevant experience in the research area. If an academic staff member is willing to support your application for a PhD position, they will direct you to the school's online application page. 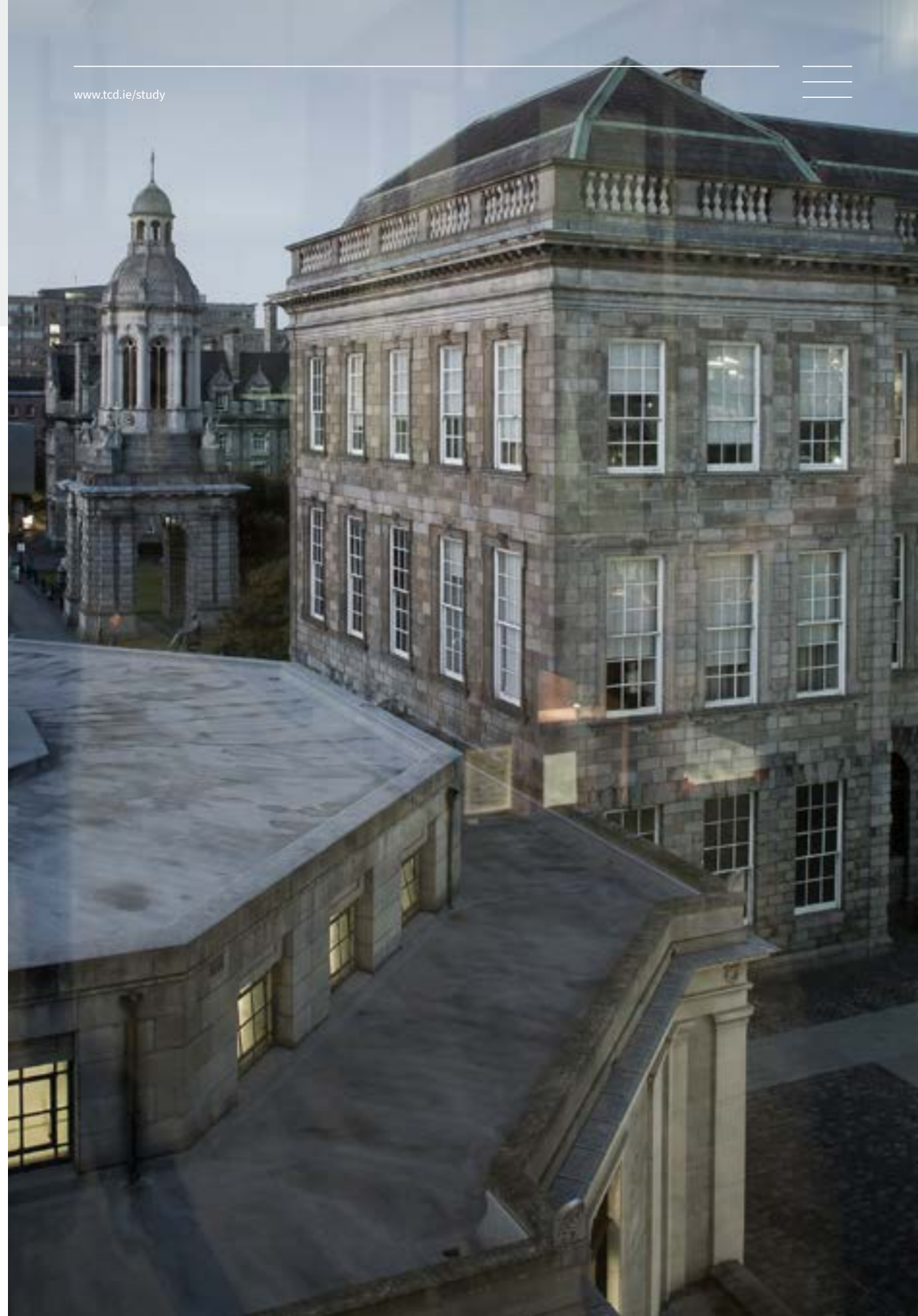
3. Submit your Application

You will need to submit your application by following the guidelines given to you by your potential supervisor. Your application will need to include a detailed research proposal, as well as transcripts, proof of English proficiency, CV and any other relevant document. Your application is then reviewed by the relevant School. The Dean of Graduate Studies conducts the final review and issues approval subsequent to meeting all criteria.

4. Explore Funding Opportunities

Once you find an academic willing to supervise your research, they will be best placed to advise you of relevant funding opportunities through Irish and European funding agencies. Additionally, you may also:

- Contact scholarship awarding bodies in your home country for possible PhD funding options.

All 1st year non-EU full-degree undergraduate students will be prioritised for accommodation in Trinity-owned or Trinity-recommended accommodation provided students apply by the housing application deadline. Housing preference is considered on a first come-first serve basis, so submitting an application earlier is preferable.

There are a range of accommodation options available. Accommodation may include but is not limited to Trinity-owned accommodation such as Trinity Hall or Trinity-recommended accommodation at private student complexes.

Postgraduate and continuing undergraduate students may apply for accommodation in other Trinity recommended accommodation sites. 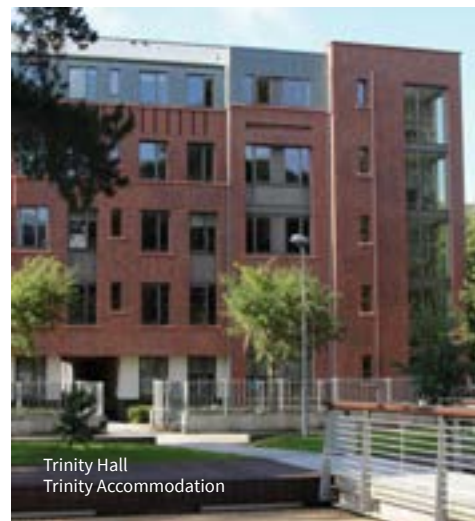


Trinity Hall

Eligibility to Work

Non-EU nationals who have permission to undertake undergraduate and postgraduate study in Ireland are entitled to take up casual employment, up to 20 hours part-time work per week or work full-time during holiday periods when their coursework for the year is complete. On graduation, undergraduate students have the possibility to stay in Ireland to work for one year on the Third Level Graduate Scheme, while eligible postgraduate students can stay for up to two years. This allows students to gain valuable work experience in Ireland across a wide range of industries and organisations. Students may also have the option of remaining in Ireland for a longer period if they are able to secure employment that meets the criteria for a Work Permit.

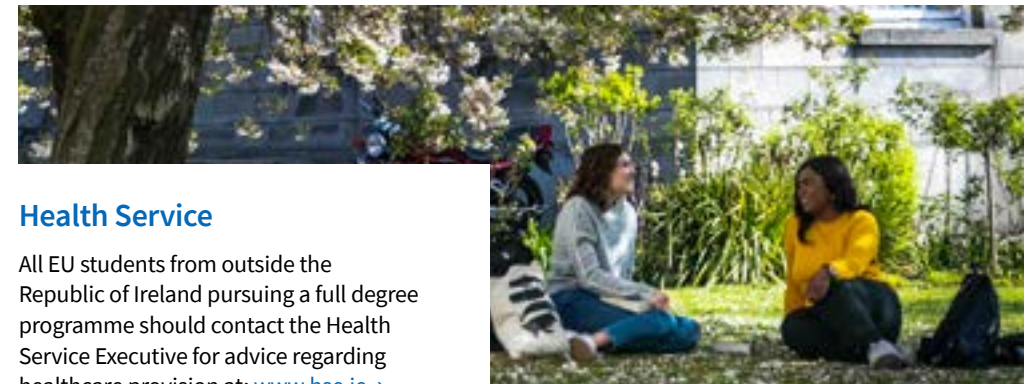
