Eligibility to Work

Non-EU nationals who have permission to undertake undergraduate and postgraduate study in Ireland are entitled to take up casual employment, up to 20 hours part-time work per week or work full-time during holiday periods.

On graduation, undergraduate students have the possibility to stay in Ireland to work for one year on the Third Level Graduate Scheme, while postgraduate students can stay for up to two years post-graduation.

This allows graduates the opportunity to work in Ireland across a wide range of industries and organisations. It may also provide graduates with a pathway to remain in Ireland for longer if they are able to secure employment that meets the criteria for a work permit.

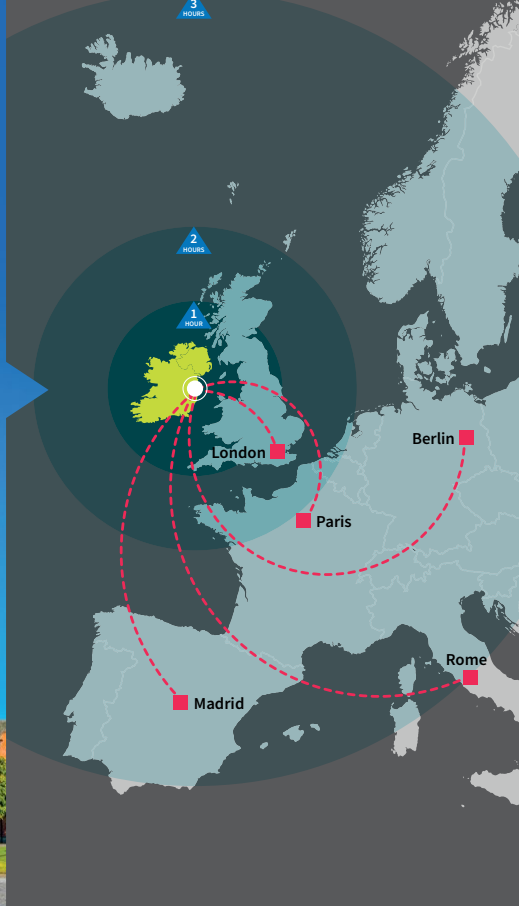

How to Apply

1. Go to www.tcd.ie/courses and find the course you're interested in.
2. Read the user guide for non-EU applicants www.tcd.ie/study/international/how-to-apply
3. Apply by selecting the 'Non-EU Application' link under the course description. You can save your application and return to it, but remember to submit it when you're finished.
4. When applying to Trinity you must also include a personal statement. This is 500 words on why you are considering Trinity and the specific course you have chosen, how you see yourself contributing to the Trinity community and what you see yourself doing with your degree. As part of the application process you will also have to provide us with references. Please provide email addresses for one counsellor and one teacher and make sure your referees know to expect a direct email request from Trinity.
5. Note: A non-refundable application fee of €55 applies per course.

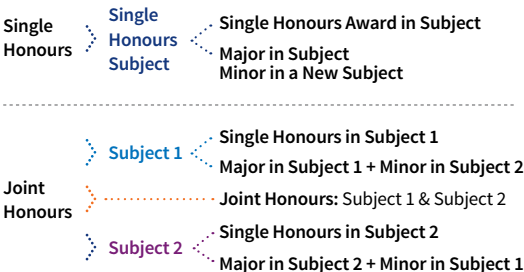

- IELTS (academic version): 6.5 (6 in each band).
- Duolingo English Test: minimum overall score of 120 (100 in each subscore).
- TOEFL: 90 with 21 in each section (before January 2026); 4.5 with 4.0 in each section (after January 2026).
- Cambridge Advanced/ Proficiency: 180 overall (no score below 170).
- Pearson Test of English (Academic): a minimum score of 69 (59 in each section).

Trinity College Dublin and Columbia University – Dual Degree Programme

The Dual Degree between Trinity and Columbia University offers students an international educational experience across two continents and at two world-class universities.

Students graduate from the Dual Degree with two degrees, one from Trinity and one from Columbia. With years one and two spent at Trinity and the final two years at Columbia.

Admissions

Applicants to the Dual Degree Programme must apply by 2 January 2027 for September 2027 entry.

The admissions process includes a review of the applicant's academic history, letters of recommendation, an essay, and an interview conducted in English. Standardised test scores (SAT/ACT) can be submitted but are not required for entry. Applications are reviewed by a joint committee with representatives from both institutions. Applicants from the EU, EEA, Switzerland or UK to the Dual Degree Programme must also apply to and receive an offer from their chosen programme at Trinity through the Central Applications Office (CAO).

International Foundation Programme

The International Foundation Programme is a year long pre-university programme aimed at students who have the drive and ambition to attend a world-class university however cannot begin an international undergraduate degree directly.

The programme is delivered at the campus of Trinity's associated college, Marino Institute of Education, where excellent student facilities and on-site accommodation are available. The Marino campus is a 15-minute journey from Dublin city centre.

Students who successfully complete the Trinity International Foundation Programme and achieve the required grades are guaranteed entry into their chosen degree the following academic year.



Minimum English Language Requirements

- IELTS: 5.0 overall (5.0 in writing, 4.5 in other bands)
- Duolingo Test of English: 80 overall (80 in literacy, 65 in other subscores)
- TOEFL: 64 with 16 in each section (before January 2026); 3.5 with 3.5 in writing and 3.0 in other section (after January 2026)
- Note: Trinity also offers a Trinity IFP Pre-Sessional Programme.

Please note that some programmes have higher English language requirements and/or specific subject requirements.

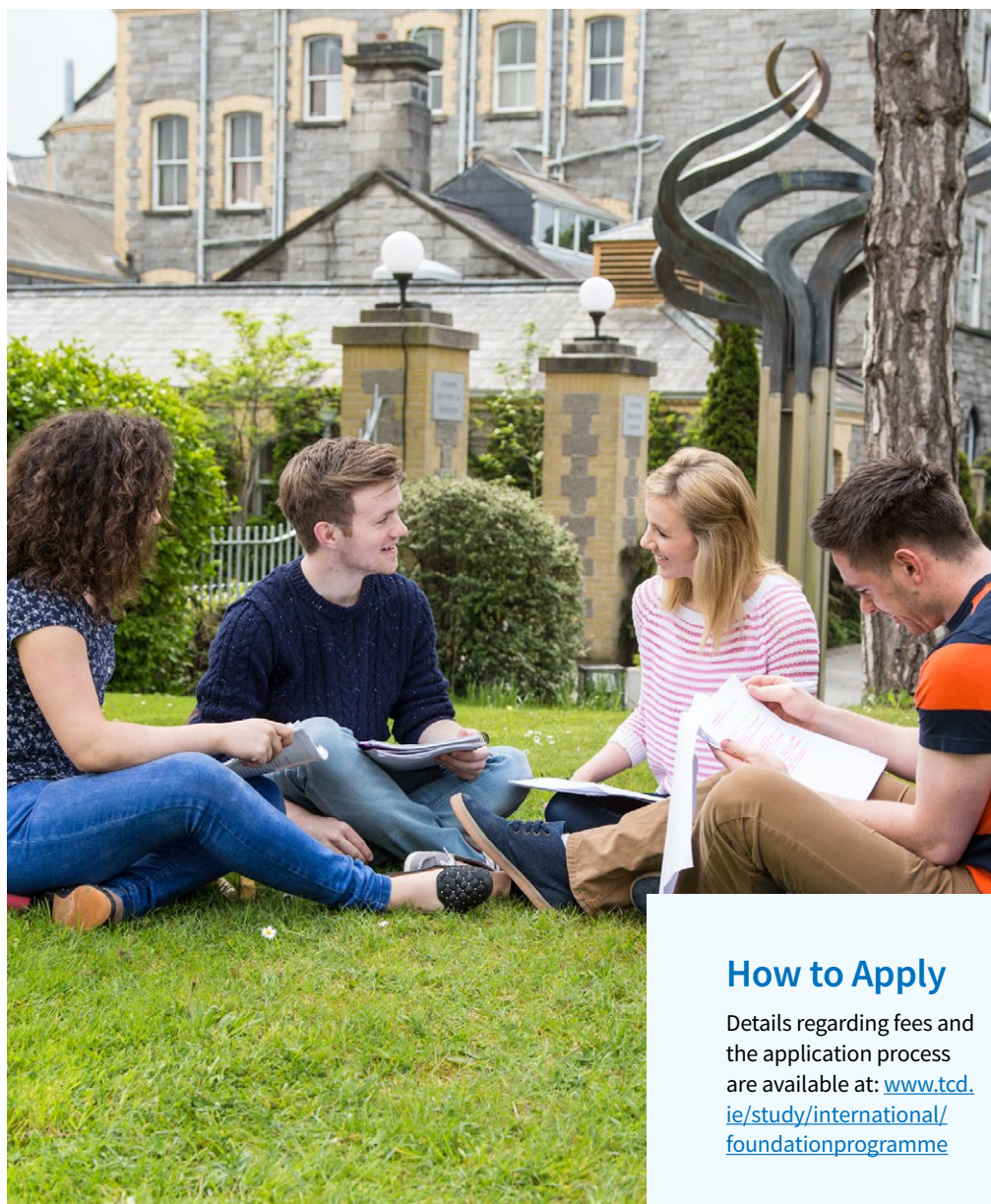

Entry Requirements

Postgraduate study at Trinity is academically challenging and as a result the University has high academic entry requirements.

Applicants will need to:

- Hold at least a 2.1 honours degree (3.2 GPA on 4.0 scale) from an Irish university or equivalent result from a university in another country
 - Meet the English language requirements
- Some courses may require higher standards or require you to take further tests or attend an interview.



English Language Requirements

All applicants whose first language is not English and who have not been educated through the medium of English must present one of the following qualifications in the English language: IELTS, TOEFL, University of Cambridge Proficiency Certificate, Advanced Certificate, Duolingo English Test, Pearson Test of English (Academic) PTE Academic or Trinity Pre-sessional. Please note that the required level of English proficiency may vary from programme to programme. Please consult each programme page at: www.tcd.ie/courses/postgraduate for details.

For further details on these English Language Proficiency Tests, please contact the appropriate organisation directly. An applicant whose first language is not English but who has taken a degree through the medium of English may be eligible provided they did not complete their studies more than two years prior to admission. However, some courses may request applicants to present an English language qualification under certain circumstances. Visa-required applicants who meet Trinity's English language requirements may be required to present an additional English language proficiency qualification such as IELTS, TOEFL or PTE for visa application purposes. The Pre-Sessional English Programme is an academic English course for international students with conditional offers for undergraduate and postgraduate study at Trinity. Applying for a Masters by Research or PhD at Trinity

As a truly international university, we welcome applications from prospective postgraduate students globally and we hope you will consider choosing Trinity for your postgraduate research.

1. Find a Potential Academic Supervisor

Once you have identified your research area, the next step is to make contact with academic staff in relevant fields and identify a potential supervisor: www.tcd.ie/research

2. Make Contact with Potential Academic Supervisor

Contact potential academic supervisors with a brief research proposal or idea, demonstrating your interest and relevant experience in the research area. If an academic staff member is willing to support your application for a PhD position, they will direct you to the school's online application page. Please note that some schools at Trinity have specific guidelines for applying for a PhD position. It is important to check the Schools' webpage for any additional information at: www.tcd.ie/courses/postgraduate/postgraduate-research

3. Submit your Application

You will need to submit your application by following the guidelines given to you by your potential supervisor. Your application will need to include a detailed research proposal, as well as transcripts, proof of English proficiency, CV and any other relevant document. Your application is then reviewed by the relevant School. The Dean of Graduate Studies conducts the final review and issues approval subsequent to meeting all criteria.

4. Explore Funding Opportunities

Once you find an academic willing to supervise your research, they will be best placed to advise you of relevant funding opportunities through Irish and European funding agencies. Additionally, you may also:

- Contact scholarship awarding bodies in your home country for possible PhD funding options.

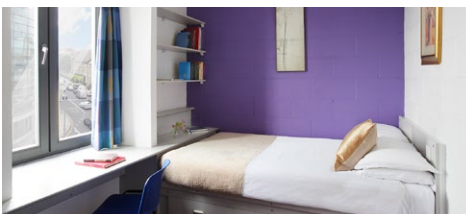

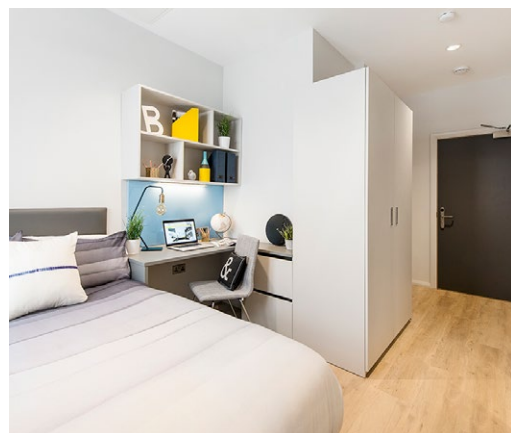

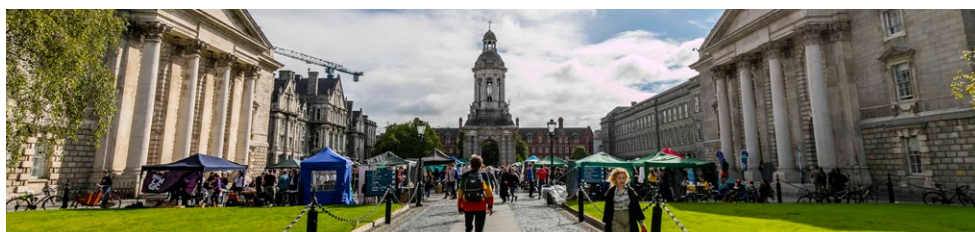
