



Applications open on 1 November 2025

- Trinity College Dublin has a rolling admission
- Accept offer by 1 May 2026. More competitive programs will have a shorter acceptance period.
- Late acceptance until 30 June 2026

How to Apply

- 1. Go to www.tcd.ie/courses and find the course vou're interested in.
- 2. Read the user guide for non-EU applicants www.tcd.ie/study/international/how-to-apply
- 3. Apply by selecting the 'Non-EU Application' link under the course description. You can save your application and return to it, but remember to submit it when you're finished!
- 4. Upload your Transcript and your Test Scores if you have taken either the SAT/ACT.
- 5. When applying to Trinity you must also include a personal statement. This is 500 words on why you are considering Trinity and the specific course you have chosen, how you see yourself contributing to the Trinity community and what you see yourself doing with your degree.
- 6. As part of the application process you will also have to provide us with references. Please provide email addresses for one counsellor and one teacher and make sure your referees know to expect a direct email request from Trinity.
- A non-refundable application fee of €55 applies
- You may apply for up to 3 programmes at Trinity. The first application you submit will be taken as your first preference - if you wish to change your order of preference, please contact academic.registry@tcd.ie



Application Requirements

The admission criteria for students presenting SAT. ACT or International Baccalaureate are set out below. The Trinity Admissions team will consider alternative evidence from students applying for 2025 admission. This will include GPA, academic transcripts, two references, and a personal statement. We will also consider other academic criteria such as Advanced Placement courses (APs), college and honours level classes with strong grades where relevant to the programme major for which you are applying.

Standardised Test Scores

(Trinity is **Test Optional** for Fall 2026 entry) Range minimum will depend on major.

SAT Range: 1250 – 1400 ACT Range: 27 - 32

Specific Class Requirements:

AP scores are not mandatory, however results in relevant subjects will be reviewed.

High School Transcript

Minimum GPA: 3.2 on 4.0 unweighted scale (B+ average)

Upload a transcript with your application

Trinity reviews your high school's grading model and looks for a positive trajectory in

your grades. Because you are applying to a specific course, the Admissions team also looks to see if you have taken all of the courses available at your school in your chosen subject area. Your final transcript must be sent by your school at the end of your 4th year.

IB Diploma Requirements

Minimum of 3 subjects at grade 5 Higher Level and 3 subjects at grade 4 Standard Level, including English, mathematics and a language. Some courses require specific subjects such as HL Mathematics or a science subject. Overall IB point requirements vary by course and range from 30 to 40, including bonus points. Full examination results are reviewed for a final decision.

Personal Statement

500 words on why you are considering Trinity and the specific course you have chosen, how you see yourself contributing to the Trinity community and what you see yourself doing with your degree.

Keep in mind:

- Students can submit up to three applications, with the first application being their preference.
- Trinity accepts documents through Naviance and Scoir
- Trinity does not use the Common App or UCAS
- Trinity does not offer early decision
- NOTE: Self-report test scores and have scores sent to Trinity (SAT: 2494/ACT: 5230)





Trinity College Dublin and Columbia University – Dual BA Programme

The Dual BA between Trinity and Columbia University offers students an international educational experience across two continents and at two world-class universities.

Students graduate from the Dual BA with two degrees, one from Trinity and one from Columbia. With years one and two spent at Trinity and the final two years at Columbia

Admissions

Applicants to the Dual B.A. Programme must apply by 2nd January 2026 for September 2026 entry.

The admissions process includes a review of the applicant's academic history, letters of recommendation, an essay, and an interview conducted in English. Standardised test scores (SAT/ACT) can be submitted but are not required for entry. Applications are reviewed by a joint committee with representatives from both Institutions. Applicants from the EU, EEA, Switzerland or UK to the Dual B.A. Programme must also apply to and receive an offer from their chosen programme at Trinity through the Central Applications Office (CAO).



Applicants will receive an update on their application status by early March. Those invited for an interview will be prompted to schedule a time to meet with the admissions committee either in person in New York, Dublin or via teleconference.

In the absence of standardised tests such as SAT or ACT, the Admissions Office will base admissions decisions on high school GPA and transcripts, academic references and personal statements. We will also consider additional evidence of academic merit, including Advanced Placement courses (APs), and college or honours-level classes with strong grades, where relevant to the course for which you are applying. Any standardised test scores that are submitted will be taken into consideration.

For US applicants

Applying

What's the top tip for applying from the US?

Firstly, reach out to your local Trinity representative. We have a number of incountry representatives that provide a host of supports, from individual meetings, video calls and group webinars, to help with all aspects of Trinity life. All our representatives can be found on the back cover of this guide or at: www.tcd.ie/study/country/usa

What percentage of students does Trinity accept?

We receive hundreds of US applications and can accept a much higher percent of qualified applicants than top US schools. Our rankings do not depend on percent of students accepted.

Is a Trinity degree recognised in the US?

Our 4-year degree programmes are recognised globally. US employers have strong awareness of Trinity's history of academic excellence. There are strong alumni networks in most major US cities and around the world, creating opportunities for mentoring and networking for all graduates.

Studying at Trinity

Can I change my major?

Students apply and are admitted to a specific course. There are no "General Education" requirements; students begin their specific course of study immediately. Changes are made by students each year however changing to another course is challenging and uncommon. Changes are considered on a case-by-case basis.

Do you have Study Abroad programmes?

Trinity offers the opportunity to study in 300 universities around the world. Some courses, particularly those with language components, require that some time be spent outside of Ireland. Other courses may have direct links with corresponding departments in international partner universities.

How many students attend Trinity?

Trinity has approximately 15,700 undergraduate and 7,000 postgraduate students. Approximately 36% of students come from 125 countries outside of Ireland. Students coming from the US make up approximately 8% of the total student body.

What is the average class size?

Class size varies from course to course. Some large courses, like BESS (Business, Economic and Social Studies), will have 1st and 2nd year lectures of over 150 people, along with smallgroup tutorials of 15-20. Smaller courses like Art History or Classics will have fewer students in each class. Third and fourth-year modules will be significantly smaller.

What will my timetable look like? Can I choose my classes?

Timetable details for lectures, seminars and other scheduled teaching events for your selected modules will be available via the my.tcd.ie portal after your Registration and from your programme office. Electives are available to students from all disciplines across the university. Optional language modules are among these and include Irish, French, Spanish, German, Croatian, Korean, Japanese and Mandarin. Discover more at: www.tcd.ie/trinity-electives. Typical degree workload: 60 credits per year (240 to graduate) and 300 for 5-year integrated masters degrees. All modules are 5 or 10 credits, so you take between 3 and 6 modules per semester (balanced at 30 credits per semester). Final year Capstone projects are 20 credits.

Life at Trinity

Do I need a visa from the United States?

Students who are United States nationals do not require a visa to enter Ireland. However, once you are here you will still be required to register with the Immigration Service Delivery after arrival. 



Entry Requirements

Postgraduate study at Trinity is academically challenging and as a result the University has high academic entry requirements.

Applicants will need to:

- Hold at least a 2.1 honours degree
 (3.2 GPA on 4.0 scale) from an Irish university or equivalent result from a university in another country
- Meet the English language requirements
 Some courses may require higher standards or require you to take further tests or attend an interview.

All applicants whose first language is not English and who have not been educated through the medium of English must present one of the following qualifications in the English language: IELTS, TOEFL, University of Cambridge Proficiency Certificate, Advanced Certificate, Duolingo English Test, Pearson Test of English (Academic) PTE Academic or Trinity Presessional. 

Applying for a Masters by Research or PhD at Trinity

As a truly international university, we welcome applications from prospective postgraduate students globally and we hope you will consider choosing Trinity for your postgraduate research.

1. Find a Potential Academic Supervisor

Once you have identified your research area, the next step is to make contact with academic staff in relevant fields and identify a potential supervisor: www.tcd.ie/research

2. Make Contact with Potential Academic Supervisor

Contact potential academic supervisors with a brief research proposal or idea, demonstrating your interest and relevant experience in the research area. If an academic staff member is willing to support your application for a PhD position, they will direct you to the school's online application page. Please note that some schools at Trinity have specific guidelines for applying for a PhD position. 3. Submit your Application

You will need to submit your application by following the guidelines given to you by your potential supervisor. Your application will need to include a detailed research proposal, as well as transcripts, proof of English proficiency, CV and any other relevant document. Your application is then reviewed by the relevant School. The Dean of Graduate Studies conducts the final review and issues approval subsequent to meeting all criteria.

4. Explore Funding Opportunities

Once you find an academic willing to supervise your research, they will be best placed to advise you of relevant funding opportunities through Irish and European funding agencies. Additionally, you may also:

- Contact scholarship awarding bodies in your home country for possible PhD funding options.



Eligibility to Work

Non-EU nationals who have permission to undertake undergraduate and postgraduate study in Ireland are entitled to take up casual employment, up to 20 hours part-time work per week or work full-time during holiday periods when their coursework for the year is complete.

- On graduation, undergraduate students have the possibility to stay in Ireland to work for one year on the Third Level Graduate Scheme.
- Eligible postgraduate students can stay for up to two years.

This allows students to gain valuable work experience in Ireland across a wide range of industries and organisations. Students may also have the option of remaining in Ireland for a longer period if they are able to secure employment that meets the criteria for a work permit.
