	This section of the module will provide a comprehensive introduction to housing and homelessness policy in Ireland.

	 What is housing policy? Why do governments intervene in the housing market? What is housing tenure and why does it matter? What theoretical approaches are there to housing policy? Why did house prices rise so quickly, only to fall again? Have the problems with ghost estates been resolved? Has the Local Property Tax been a success or a failure? What can be done about mortgage arrears? What is Nama? What is the housing experience of minority ethnic households in Ireland? Have government housing policy objectives been achieved? What theoretical explanations are there for the nature and extent of homelessness? How have homeless services changed during the last 20 years? What are the key current homelessness policy issues?
