

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

HE Overview of National Screening Service (NSS)

We run 4 national population screening programmes:

3 that screen for cancer, and 1 that screens for diabetic retinopathy.

Overview of National Screening Service (NSS)

Our programmes focus on looking for early signs of disease in healthy people, so that we can:

- detect health issues early
- help prevent disease
- ensure that anyone who does develop the disease being screened for has the best chance of early, more effective treatment
- reduce people's risk of developing a disease or its complications
- support people in making informed decisions about their health



Screening people with ID

In the context of population screening, we aim for people with an intellectual disability to:

- understand what screening is and who it is for
- have a clear understanding of the screening process and what it can and can't do
- make an informed decision about taking part in screening-screening is a choice
- access screening if they decide to take part
- understand what results mean and how to act on any follow-up needed.



Research: Cancer Screening among people with ID

- Irish Studies: Reduced participation in breast cancer screening among women with intellectual disabilities. Poor awareness about breast cancer warning signs, risk factors and BreastCheck among women with mild to moderate intellectual disabilities.
- Swedish study: women with a specialist diagnosis of intellectual disability had lower degrees of cervical screening participation.
- USA study: A systematic review and meta-analysis to compare bowel screening participation in individuals with and without disabilities. Individuals with intellectual disabilities had significantly lower rates of bowel screening participation especially for 'Home' Kits.

HE TILDA Findings:

- IDS-TILDA is a longitudinal study researching ageing in Ireland among people with an intellectual disability aged 40 and over.
- Breast: 71.1% (n = 165) people of eligible women (50-69) were invited for a mammogram in the previous two years. Of these, 77.9% (n = 127) attended.
- Cervical: 272 participants were eligible (40-65) to be screened, **150 (63%)** reported they were not invited. Of those invited, 26 attended (30%).
- Bowel: Out of 156 people who were eligible for screening in the previous two years (those aged 62 69), 68.1% (n = 96) had a bowel screen.

Barriers for people with ID (Chan et al, 2022)

- Fear, distress, and embarrassment
- Unpreparedness for screening
- Negative interactions with healthcare professionals
- A lack of knowledge about cancer screening
- Mobility issues
- A high severity of ID
- Lack of ability to provide consent and communicate verbally


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
Breaking Down Barriers report overview

Implementation of recommendations

- Almost 200 NSS staff have completed disability awareness training covering disability awareness, effective communication and reasonable accommodation
- 2. All 4 access officers have completed access officer training
- 3. Further training for managers on reasonable accommodation processes
- 4. Reviewing NSS reasonable accommodation processes
- 5. Collaboration with users to develop carers resource to support carers to help people they care for access screening

Implementation of recommendations

- 6. Information in different formats being developed (e.g. Videos in ISL)
- 7. Access sections on website being updated-Accessibility Statement
- 8. Campaigns include people with disabilities
- 9. Call out for people with disability to be part of NSS Public Patient Partnership (PPP)
- 10. Assisting to offer appointments close to home

- Contact us to let us know of any reasonable accommodations required
- Use our carers resource
- Always be aware of possible symptoms and direct to GP

Symptoms Bowel Cancer

Call your GP TODAY if you notice any of the following



A change in your bowel habit for more than 6 weeks, such as looser poo, pooing more often or constipation



Feeling like you need to pass a bowel motion even when you know your bowel is empty



Unexplained bleeding from your back passage



Unexplained pain in your tummy or back passage



Unexplained lump or swelling in your tummy



Unexplained weight loss



Feeling very tired all the time, more than is normal for you



Breathlessness more than is normal for you



Symptoms Cervical Cancer

Call your GP TODAY if you notice any of the following



Vaginal bleeding or spotting between your normal periods or after the menopause



Vaginal bleeding, spotting or pain during or after sex



Abnormal vaginal discharge (may be bloodstained or smell unpleasant)



Unexplained pain in your lower tummy or your lower back



A change in your bowel or bladder habit, e.g. constipation, peeing or pooing more often than usual, or blood in your pee



Unexplained pain or swelling in one or both legs

Symptoms Breast Cancer

Call your GP TODAY if you notice any of the following



A new lump that you can feel in either of your breasts.

A new lump that you can feel in either of your armpits.



A change in the appearance of your nipple, such as the nipple flattening or sinking into your breast or turning inwards.



A change in the size, shape or feel of one or both breasts or armpits, e.g. a new area of thickened tissue or lumpiness in either breast or armpit that was not there before.



Bloodstained or watery discharge from either of your nipples.



Skin changes on your breast such as puckering or dimpling (the skin may look like orange peel).

An abscess (infected boil) in your breast – this may appear as a red, tender area on your breast.



A rash or eczema on or around your nipple.



The results of our research are available in easy to read.




We are now working on ways to improve how we support people to come for screening.
