PPI IGNITE CASE STUDY The Alzheimer Society of Ireland

Aims of the project:

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland (ASI), as part of its commitment to developing public and patient involvement (PPI), set up the Demontia Research Advisory Team (DRAT). This is a PPI group made up of people living with dementia and corens/supporters of people with dementia. The DRAT was established to provide support, insight and encouragement to research teams in all aspects of the research cycle, to become part of the dementia research infrastructure and, ultimately, to begin to play a role in setting the agenda for dementia research.

How were people found who wanted to be involved?

The ASI called upon its Advocacy Groups – The Irish Dementia Working Group and The Dementia Carers Campaign Natwork – for volunteers. In addition to their advocacy work, members of these groups had participated in research for many years. Some, however, were tired of just being research participants and falt that they saw few tangible results from their participation. The DRAT brought an opportunity to take a step further and become meaningfully involved in the design, prioritisation and delivery of research. In addition to these members, we found members by posting on social media (e.g.Twitter). In October 2020, The ASI and DRAT hosted a PPI Webinar. The clips were posted on YouTube and across our social media platforms which led to some membership enquiries. We are now working to increase the diversity of voices on the DRAT.

How were people involved?

The ASI's vision is 'An Ireland where people on the journey of dementia are valued" and it is essential, as a research-promoting organisation, that people with dementia and those who support them are present in research too. The ASI developed the DRAT, a research-specific PPI group of people with dementia and family carers/supporters to facilitate that. The DRAT are encouraged and empowered to work with research teams on dementia-related topics, to feed into research activities and to deliberate on funding decisions within The ASI.

What training and support was offered?

We began by co-producing and co-delivering a workshop with Trinity PPI Ignite on how research works, using the HRB-funded Making a Start toolkit. The workshop focused on helping members to relate to researchers and the realities of research. It drew out their preconceptions and also, in a good-humoured way, provided a reassurance that what they were being asked to do was both achievable and worthwhile. In fact, it was the orijoyable aspects of the workshop that ignited interest from members.

The response from the research community was a little slow and it was clear we needed to do more work on promoting the DRAT and PPI in demantia research. After a few months, it was clear that some DRAT members' motivation was understandably beginning to dwindle. To tackle this, we brought in a UK PPI Expert, Bec Harley, who provided case studies (including from The Atheimer's Society UK) to inspire members to stay involved and help them to see what could be achieved. Bec also delivered a useful session on providing feedback to researchers constructively and on managing challenging.

Members also attend regular meetings every couple of months with The ASI where they can update each other on their work, troubleshoot challenges, and shape the direction of the group's future work and activities.

- By the end of the programme, the functions of the Office should be absorbed into the infrastructure of Trinity
