The Erasmus+ Project took place from 2019 - 2022. The title of the project was **Inclusive Post** Secondary Education (IPSE) Programmes for People with Intellectual Disabilities'.

The aim of the project was to develop and strengthen programmes of the Erasmus+ partners and create a network for dissemination in Europe.

Professor Joe Ryan from Clemson State University in South Carolina, visited TCPID during Michaelmus Term. He is a distinguished Professor of Special Education and the founder and Director of the ClemsonLife Program for students with cognitive disabilities. Joe worked with the team in TCPID on developing a graduate survey. He delivered a lecture at the INHEF Symposium with his colleague Erica Walters where they demonstrated the ClemsonLife Task Analysis app for use by people with an intellectual disability. We hope to further collaborate with Joe and his team and will host some ClemsonLife students at our summer school in 2023!



Dr. Odet Moliner Garcia from Jaume Universidad in Spain spent time in TCPID during Hilary Term. Odet was investigating, with the host research team, how universities develop their training, research and extension functions within the framework of an inclusive university, committing themselves to the socio-labour inclusion of young people with intellectual disabilities. Working with TCPID staff there will be a joint publication resulting from her research. Odet also took part in the Erasmus+ training week in Cork during May.
