Annual TCPID Business Partners meeting

For the first time since 2019, we were delighted to welcome all our partners in person to the annual TCPID Business Partners meeting in the Long Room Hub. We were so happy to get to meet with everyone in person after such a long time of only seeing each other online.

The partners were then divided into pre-assigned groups to share experiences and knowledge with each other. Partners who have worked with the TCPID for a long time were in groups with those who are new to the TCPID placement and internship process. As always, we also had a number of representatives from companies who are considering joining the network.

At the end of the group discussions we had a fantastic, informative feedback session. The TCPID team took notes of all the main discussion points and we have taken on board all of your wonderful recommendations.

Here are the key feedback points:

Question 1

What is your process for coming up with suitable roles for students / graduates of the TCPID?

- Skills profile and discussions with TCPID important in designing roles
- Look for repetitive tasks within the team
- Essential that the role is meaningful
- Need to offer opportunity for growth and development
- Need to have a flexible approach and adjust role if needed
- Plan the internship carefully clear structure makes it easier for the mentor and the team



Question 2

How has the workplace changed over the past few years and what is the potential impact on placements / internships?

- Biggest change is that most people are working remotely for part of the week
- A lot of staff not in the office on Mondays and Fridays
- Difficult to support the intern when a lot of the team are not in the office
- Need to have more than one mentor on the team to allow for continual support
- Might be useful for interns to also get experience of working remotely
- Incidental learning by just being in the office is very important
- Optimum number of days for internship could be reduced to two or three

Question 3

What have been the greatest challenges and how have you overcome them?

- Blended working so many of the team working from home on each day
- Have small support group for the intern 3 or 4 people including main mentor
- Some interns need a lot of supervision need a lot of guidance and structure
- Supervising an intern takes a lot of time and results in an increased workload for the mentor
- Younger staff struggle with setting boundaries and dealing with challenging behaviour
- Need to have full team buy-in for the internship to ensure success
- Location of some offices can be challenging as interns depending on public transport



Question 4

What could the TCPID team do differently to provide greater support?

- More training on intellectual disability would be useful
- Many were not aware of the TCPID Online Mentor training programme – this needs to be shared with every member of the team working with the intern
- Would like to have greater links with other partners – experienced mentors to advise new mentors
- Would like to have a Mentor Badge that can be displayed on LinkedIn
- Would like more check-in points throughout internship
- Would like to receive the Skills Profile earlier to allow them more time to plan the tasks in advance
- Some suggested that the interns need more IT skills training

- Suggestion of having a module for the graduates that they attend at the same time as doing the internship for development of key employment skills. This is currently happening in May each year through the Business partner workshops, but could it be extended?
- When intern is moving to a second internship, link the new mentor with the old mentor in previous internship
- Have more regular, smaller business partner meetings / online focus groups in addition to the main annual meeting
- Some partners would like more information about the course
- Could we develop a business partners hub where partners can communicate with each other?

We are working to review all this fantastic feedback and will consider making some relevant changes to our current processes.

We hope to introduce some online group meetings during the year in addition to the main business partners meeting. Anyone can attend these for a chance to have discussions with fellow partners.



TCPID Team at the European State of the Art (ESOTA) Conference in Salzburg

In October 2022 joinIN organised their first ever European State-Of-The-Art Congress on Inclusive Post-Secondary Education Programmes for Persons with Intellectual Disabilities. The Congress took place in the University of Education in Salzburg. It was a wonderful opportunity to connect with international colleagues and experts in the field.

The TCPID were very well-represented at the conference with a panel discussion which included TCPID graduate intern Sadbh Feehan and presentations by Professor Michael Shevlin, Dr. Donatella Camedda, Des Aston, Barbara Ringwood, Dr. John Kubiak (pre-recorded), Dr. Joanne Banks (pre-recorded), Marie Devitt and Sadbh Feehan. TCPID Research Coordinator Jenny Banks was also in attendance as she has been a central figure over the past year for the Erasmus+ Project.

"I got to meet loads of new people."


"There are so many clubs and societies."


"Being on campus makes me feel like a real student."

Year 2 Student Work Placements






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Sadbh Feehan – Graduate Intern in TCPID

Here is an article written by Sadbh about herself, her experience in Trinity College, both as a student and now as a graduate intern.

My name is Sadbh Feehan, I live in Carlow with my family.

I am a graduate intern with TCPID.

I started the two-year Certificate in Arts, Science and Inclusive Applied Practice in September 2018. This particular course was such a great experience for me. I learned so much within those two years, from History of Art to Emergency and Disaster Management. There was so much variety in the subjects.

I graduated from the Course in 2020, it was a such a special day and a very proud day for all of us. We had our graduation outdoors in a marquee in Front Square. What made the day even more special was that we were the only class graduating that day. The Provost Linda Doyle spoke at the ceremony which was amazing.

My interests include advocating for people with intellectual disabilities and the Special Olympics.

As part of the TCPID Graduate Internship programme, I got my first internship in A&L Goodbody law firm. It was a great experience for me to learn how to work in an office environment. It was during Covid, so it was quite challenging because I had to work remotely for a lot of the time. Thankfully I also got to work in the office for part of the time, which was nice.



After my internship in A&L Goodbody finished, I was asked if I would like to work in TCPID. I have been a graduate intern since September 2022. I am really enjoying being a part of the team.

My Experience as a staff member in Trinity College:

I really enjoy coming up every 4 days to work, and I look forward to seeing my colleagues every day.

These are just some of the projects that I have worked on so far.

- Student orientation where I helped show the students around the campus to make them feel comfortable navigating college.
- Freshers' week I went around to the different societies with some of the students to see If any of them would like to join any of them.
- The TCPID Business Partner meeting in December. I gave a presentation to the different business partners about my experience in college and my internship.
- The ESOTA conference in Salzburg. I travelled to Salzburg with my colleagues. During the conference I took part in a discussion panel, and I also gave a presentation about delivering a guest lecture to student teachers in Trinity College.

• Path 4 project – I am part of the Path 4 project, and our goal is to help the students to find their way around the campus and make Trinity a more inclusive campus.

To be perfectly honest, working in Trinity College feels pretty good and plus it gives me a new perspective on what it is like, because when you are a student you, don't see all the work that goes into everything. Now that I am working here, I understand that there is so much more going on behind the scenes. I haven't had any particular challenges just yet.

I feel that I have changed in a lot of ways since I originally came to Trinity College as a student in 2018. For instance, I feel like my confidence has increased so much more. I have gained so much more independence in myself. I also learned a lot about myself that I didn't know before.... And when it comes to presenting, I am a lot more confident speaking out to large crowds.

My insights into the Certificate in Arts, Science and Inclusive Practice

I think that it is so important to have a course like this for students with intellectual disabilities in universities because it shows them that they can still go to college but also get the proper supports that they would need.

What makes this course great is that the students are treated in the same way as all the other students. No one is treated any differently.

It's also important that the student feels that they can become more independent and build their confidence in themselves.

If I could change anything in this course, I would get more of the classes on campus so that the students feel like they are really a part of Trinity. I would also like to see if the students could go to other lectures and make friends outside the course and try other subjects.

I would love to see a continuation of dramatic arts and a continuation of the history of art.

The impact that I see for Trinity College by welcoming students of all abilities:

The biggest impact of having students of all abilities studying in Trinity College is that no one is better than anyone else. I think also we can all learn from each other and build on our skills together,

It is so important for students in the TCPID to have the freedom to be who they want to be, knowing that they are capable of going to college and putting in the work. The fact that they are being treated the same as the other students is really important.

Some ideas that I would have that would make the TCPID even better would be:

- If we had a quiet room for students if they need a break.
- We could get some fidget toys like Pop-its etc
- If there were more classes on campus
- For the students to experience more of what Trinity College has to offer
- Social events organised by the College



Trinity Student Managed Fund inclusive events

The Trinity Student Managed Fund provide generous financial support each year to the TCPID. This is so meaningful as it is donated by fellow Trinity College students to support their peers.



This year, in addition to the financial support, three of the Trinity SMF management team, Ciaran McKay, Will O'Callaghan and Aoife Mullan decided to collaborate more fully with us to organise some inclusive student events for us. They have already given up a huge amount of time by working with some of the TCD Societies to design events which link our students with their peers on campus. They are working with our TCPID graduate intern Sadbh on organising and running the events.

So far, they have organised a hugely successful Cupcake Decorating event with the TCD Food and Drink society. Other events are planned, including a session in the TCD Business School in the coming weeks. We want to formally thank Ciaran, Will and Aoife for their incredible support and initiative in setting up these events. We hope that these wonderful links will continue next year when the new Trinity SMF management team take over.





TCPID at the Design Leaders Conference January 2023

The TCPID were honoured to be invited to present at the Design Leaders conference which was held in the Lighthouse Cinema on January 26th. The conference was organised by Design Skillsnet with the overall theme of **Designing for Good, Designing for JOY and changing the World**.

The Design Leaders Conference was a full-day conference for those leading design teams and design studios to take a deep dive into the topics that matter most right now. Discussions on the day focused on the future of the design industry and the challenges and opportunities of leading design.

Can you tell us a little bit about yourself and your background?

My name is Sean Byrne, I am 20 years old, I'm from Palmerstown and I am a graduate from the course in Arts, Science and Inclusive Applied Practice in Trinity College Dublin. I work in AIB in Molesworth Street as a receptionist and recently got promoted full time. My hobbies are Taekwondo, GAA (Irish Football), going to the gym, walking my dog Rosie and I enjoy meeting new people, hanging out with my friends and always trying to reach my full potential in everything I do.

Why did you decide to come to Trinity College to complete the Certificate in Arts, Science and Inclusive Applied Practice?

I decided to do the ASIAP course because not only did I know that it would be a course that I would be interested in and that it's a course in Trinity College Dublin which is a university I have dreamt of studying in but also that it sounded like the type of course that would be a challenge and I am always up for a challenge as I want to grow and develop as a person as much as I possibly can and I felt this course definitely helped me with accomplishing this goal and I love the variety of modules in this course and I would definitely recommend this course to other people as I think they will definitely enjoy the ASIAP course and benefit from it.

What is your favourite memory from your time as a Trinity College student?

My favourite memory during my time as a student in Trinity College was not only getting to know the classmates and spending time with them, but also walking through Trinity campus itself as I love looking at all the buildings and monuments and since we had to learn and work from home during COVID, it was such a relief and miracle to hear we would be back



on campus for our 2nd year of college and even to this day, I always enjoy walking through Trinity campus and it's something I make sure I do every time I am in town as there's a big feeling of pride and accomplishment walking through campus as a graduate from Trinity College.

Can you tell us about the work that you do in AIB?

What I do in AIB is that I work as a receptionist with my work colleagues Amy, Emma, Hayley, Yasmin and Bianca. I work mostly behind reception, welcoming guests and employees, making passes for guests, making sure

that the waiting area is neat and tidy, bringing guests to their meetings and logging in posts for the people from the mailroom to collect and logging in post for going out on the post log. When I am not working behind reception, I am doing room checks on the 4th floor and over in 15 Molesworth Street before and after meetings, making sure rooms are nice and clean, lights and blinds are working OK, no leftover catering, artwork is as it should be and no marks or stains on tables, printing and laminating new signs to be put up, doing a ground floor checklist, bringing guests to the carpark, replying to guests on the reception inbox about car parking, spare lockers, additional items for meetings like markers, flipcharts/whiteboards or catering and ringing and answering phone calls about meetings to be arranged or rooms being too hot or cold or online meeting not working or asking employees if they would like myself or one of my work colleagues to bring the guests up to the meeting or would they like to come down to escort the guest up to the room if they are not busy.

Can you tell us a little about your colleagues in AIB and how they support you?

My work colleagues that I work with in AIB are all women which I like as both my primary and secondary school I was in was all boys and I like that I am the only man on the team as I want to show people that men can be receptionists as well as women and I have gotten a lot of recognition for it which I appreciate. My work colleagues have always been so supportive in AIB ever since I started in the sense that they're such a lovely group of people to work with, they always give me advice, we always help each other, make sure that we are always of assistance if possible or required and we work so well together as a team and it reminds me just how enjoyable being part of a team really is.



What do you enjoy the most about working in AIB?

What I enjoy the most about working for AIB is working at reception as I am one of the faces you see when you first come into the building, therefore it is my responsibility to promote a friendly and professional service and to make sure I am being the best face of AIB Molesworth Street as I possibly can and so far, I definitely feel I have accomplished this and I want to make sure that I continue with this achievement. I also enjoy talking to staff and guests about meetings because I enjoy asking the booker if they would like myself or one of my work colleagues to host the guests to the room and if so, I bring the guests up and ask how they are keeping, how their day is going and if it is their first time in the building which I also really enjoy.

How did you feel when you found out that you were being offered a permanent role in AIB?

When I found out I was offered a permanent role in AIB, I felt like jumping for joy as it was such a huge accomplishment for me because I have always wanted to work in a place like AIB and I was enjoying my internship with them so much. There was a small part of me that was hoping that I would be made permanent because I had made such strong connections with my work colleagues and I was always so happy seeing all the employees and guests and talking to them. I remember saying to myself that even if I didn't get offered the permanent role in AIB, I would always remember the fun and happy memories I had with AIB and that it such an enjoyable and memorable experience and that I would remember for the rest of my life but when I got made permanent, It was like a dream come true and even to this day, I am so proud of myself that I got made permanent because it showed all my hard work paid off.

I also have a few other ideas as to what I could study if I can go back to college like Youth Work or Film Studies as they are both modules I know I will enjoy but as for the time being, I am going with my new permanent role in AIB and continue working there to the best of my extent.
