Research on post-secondary training for individuals with intellectual disabilities has generally focused on programmes, with little consideration of the structures and mechanisms that give rise to them. This article adopts a critical realist perspective to comparatively analyse and theorise about the contextual structures contributing to the introduction of post-secondary training programmes in universities for individuals with intellectual disabilities.

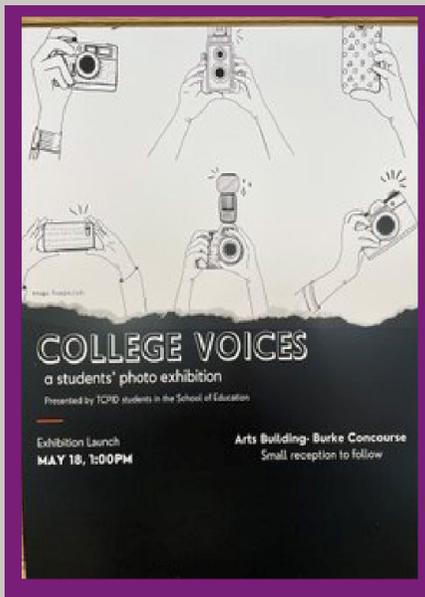
TCPID worked in collaboration with Torrens University, Melbourne and Universidad Andres Bello, Santiago, Chile on this research which investigates the preconditions that have contributed to the development and growth of postsecondary training programmes for individuals with intellectual disabilities, in three universities.

Research & Funding

During 2023 Dr. Donatella Camedda, ASIAP Course Coordinator, undertook a Photovoice Research Project within TCPID. The project aimed to document the experience of students with intellectual disabilities attending Trinity college through participatory photography (Photovoice). Working with a visiting academic from Salzburg, Dr. Sabine Harter-Reiter, the students were introduced to the model of 'inclusive research' involving people with an intellectual disability as active participants in the generation of research ideas and the conducting of that research. This work captured the student voice around their experience of inclusivity in Trinity College. In May the students Showcased the Photovoice project to the wider community within and beyond Trinity College.

College Voices - Photovoice Exhibition

Students identified three themes that they related to;
Making New Friends, Getting a Job, and Achieving Your Goals



Following on from the success of this project a new photovoice project called 'Breaking Barriers' will take place during the Hilary Term of 2024. Led by Donatella Camedda this research has received funding from the Trinity's TRISS Academic Research Fellowship.

Research & Funding

Research Activities Planned for Hilary Term 2024

Photovoice Project – Breaking Barriers

A continuation of the successful photovoice project in 2023. This funded project aims to support the empowerment and self-advocacy of students with intellectual disabilities. The students will become co-researchers to investigate and showcase their experiences as College students in Trinity through Photovoice, a visual participatory research methodology whereby participants take photographs to help document, reflect upon, and communicate issues of concern while stimulating social change.

Learner Advocates: Co-Designing Disability Awareness in Higher Education

This research adopts a Case Study design, offering an in-depth exploration of the experiences of 2nd-year ASIAP students at TCPID as they undertake the disability rights module and creative assessment method culminating in a Disability Rights event planned and organised by the students. Students will act as co-designers, contributing to the formulation of research questions and the subsequent analysis.

Physical Activity and Cognitive Function

This research has received funding from the Arts and Social Sciences Benefactions Fund in Trinity and aims to explore the impact of physical activity on cognitive function among students with intellectual disabilities. Conducted over a 10 week period it will work in tandem with their Sport / Health sciences module and take place in the Sports Centre.

Learning Management Systems

This research project aims to explore the benefits and challenges of the current Learning Management Systems for students with ID in Trinity College Dublin. Aiming to address a literature gap on the challenges in using such platforms as Blackboard and Teams, the research will be conducted with lecturing staff, students and IT staff.

Research and Funding

Programme for Access to Higher Education - Path4



TCPID, in collaboration with Disability Services at Trinity College, played a pivotal role in Phase 1 of the programme for access to higher education 'Path4' project. Funded by the Department of Further and Higher Education, Innovation, Research and Science, this initiative focused on enhancing the higher education experience for students with disabilities by researching crucial aspects and implementing changes based on findings. The project encompassed comprehensive strands such as Student Journey Mapping, a thorough evaluation of the ASIAP program, provision of seed funding to develop inclusive modules within various university schools for students with an intellectual disability, and the creation of accessible resources. Together, these efforts aim to create a more inclusive and supportive environment for students with disabilities pursuing higher education at Trinity College.

Synergies in Shaping Inclusive Educational Reform in the Global North and South: Policymakers and Academics in Ireland and South Africa

Leading academics from the School of Education and TCPID in Trinity College and the University of Capetown in South Africa will explore the extent to which academia and policymakers share knowledge in inclusive education policy development. The project will involve a three-day visit by a researcher from the University of Cape Town and government officials from the Western Cape Education Department, including a research/policy brokerage event with relevant stakeholders from the Global North-South. This research will commence early 2024 with the three day event taking place in April in Trinity College.

'Promoting Education and Employment Resources for People with Intellectual Disabilities in Ireland'

This project 'Promoting Education and Employment Resources for People with Intellectual Disabilities in Ireland' will be conducted in collaboration with civil society partner Inclusion Ireland and other partners from the National Consortium on Inclusion (TCPID, Inclusion Ireland, Walk, Coláiste Íde).



The Trinity Research Doctorate Awards

Trinity Research Doctorate Awards PI-based 2023-2024.

Programme Coordinator for the ASIAP programme Dr. Donatella Camedda was awarded the prestigious and highly competitive Trinity Research Doctorate Award during 2023. This consists of 4-year funding to recruit a PhD student who will work on her project called INSIDE - Inclusion of Students with Intellectual Disabilities in Higher Education. Donatella is one of only seven awardees for this strand of the funding (PI-based) across College and the first in to be awarded to the School of Education. Dr Camedda is currently recruiting for a candidate to start this project in March 2024.

British Journal of Learning Disabilities - Special Edition

Dr Donatella Camedda will be lead guest editor for a special edition of the British Journal of Learning Disabilities 'People with learning disabilities working or studying in higher education institutions'. This special issue will be published in 2025 and is currently accepting abstracts.
