• Why, for you, is it important that Abbott & TCPID work together?

Honestly, it's the most meaningful thing I've ever been part of. It's hard to put into words just how special this programme is. The team behind TCPID is one of rarity. They are those kind of people you meet once and you instantly feel a sense of warmth and connectivity, a friend for life. The students are incredible — they bring such a fresh perspective, so much resilience, and genuine joy to everything they do. It reminds us that inclusion isn't just something we talk about — it's something we do. These students aren't just gaining experience — WE, the mentors are gaining insight, empathy, and a much deeper understanding of what it means to work in a truly inclusive way.

• If you have worked on Sci-fest before, what is your favourite SciFest moment?


