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1. GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION

1.1 Introduction

Welcome to the Junior Sophister year of your Trinity Joint Honours programme! You are the first cohort of students moving into your Junior Sophister year of the Trinity Joint Honours programmes in 2021/2022. Ahead of your Junior Sophister year, you have finalised your degree pathway and the structure of your studies for the final two years of your programme. A number of you will also spend your Junior Sophister Year, or part thereof, on a Study Abroad Exchange outside of Ireland.

This handbook aims to provide you with an overview of information that will be useful to you throughout the 2021/22 academic year. It is important to note that this handbook provides information that applies to most students in Junior Sophister year of Trinity Joint Honours programmes and that you will need to consult School or Departmental handbooks for detailed information on each of your Joint Honours subjects.

The Library

The Library will be at the centre of where you study and learn; the Library of Trinity College Dublin is the largest research library in Ireland. Library staff are available to help you throughout your time at Trinity. You will have a dedicated subject Librarian to help you find, evaluate, and cite information for your research. There is free student Wi-Fi and in excess of 400,000 e-books as well as millions of online journal articles and 6.5 million books. In your first week in Trinity you will be assigned a College tutor (a member of our academic staff). All S2S volunteers are students, just like you, so you never have to worry about asking them a question or talking to them about anything that's worrying you. 2. ACADEMIC WRITING

2.1 Plagiarism and Referencing Guide

Throughout your studies in Trinity College Dublin, you will develop and write assignments that require research. Your ideas will be expressed through words, images, diagrams and other multi-media forms. As you research you will be expected to understand and build upon the work of others. This requires acknowledging correctly and fully the contributions of others to your own scholarship. Regardless of what discipline you enter in Trinity, the cornerstone of its scholarship is academic honesty. So, no matter what form your scholarly writing takes, you are expected at all times to take responsibility for the integrity of your work as you advance knowledge in your field of study.

Students in Trinity Joint Honours programmes should be mindful that each of your subjects may have different referencing requirements and that these requirements are met as appropriate.

The word plagiarism is derived from the Latin words meaning 'kidnapper'. In its simplest sense, plagiarism can be seen as stealing someone else's words or ideas and passing them off as your own, although plagiarism comes in many forms. Whether unintentional or intentional, plagiarism is your responsibility, and you need to know exactly what it is in order to avoid it.

Ready Steady Write

All students need to complete the Ready Steady Write plagiarism tutorial, a resource developed by the Centre for Academic Practice and eLearning (CAPSL), to help you understand and avoid plagiarism and develop your academic writing skills and academic integrity. It is designed so that you can view it from beginning to end or in sections and topics.

Coversheet

Every coversheet that is attached to submitted work has a [declaration](#) that must be completed, confirming that you have completed this tutorial. Each coversheet that is attached to submitted work should contain the following completed declaration:

3. TEACHING AND LEARNING

3.1 Programme Architecture

The available degree pathways for students on Trinity Joint Honours programme combinations rising to their Junior Sophister year are:

Joint Honours

- This pathway is available to students on the Joint Honours Pathway or the Major with Minor Pathway in their Senior Freshman Year.
- There is only one pathway in the Sophister years to a Joint Honours degree.
- In this pathway you will take 30 ECTS in each of your Joint Honours subjects in Junior Sophister year.
- Then in Senior Sophister you will take 20 ECTS in each of your Joint Honours subjects and a 20 ECTS capstone project in one of your subjects.
- You should be aware that some subjects have module pre-requisites that you will be required to fulfil in order to complete a Capstone project in that subject
- Sometime during your Junior Sophister year you will be asked to confirm which of your 2 subjects you would like to complete your Capstone project in – please keep an eye on your email for further information on this throughout the academic year.

Single Honours¹

- This pathway is available to students that took the Single Honours Pathway or the Major with Minor Pathway in SF Year.
- You may only follow this pathway in the subject you completed 40 ECTS in Year 2.
- You should be aware that some subjects have module pre-requisites that you will be required to fulfil in order to complete a Capstone project in that subject.
- If you wish to proceed to a Single Honours award in any of the Languages, you may be required to spend the JS year abroad. Please contact your department for further information.
- There is only one pathway in the Sophister years to a Single Honours degree.
- In this pathway in Year 3 you will take 50 ECTS in your Single Honours subject and a further 10 ECTS in Open Modules and Trinity Electives.
- Then in Year 4 you will take 40 ECTS in modules in your Single Honours subject and complete the 20 ECTS capstone in your Single Honours subject.

Major with minor

- These pathways are available to students that took the Joint Honours Pathway or the Major with Minor Pathway in SF Year.
- There are two pathways in the Sophister years to a Major with Minor degree.
- If you choose this pathway, you will need to indicate which subject is your Major subject and which subject is your Minor subject.
- You should be aware that some subjects have module pre-requisites that you will be required to fulfil in order to complete a Capstone project in that subject.
- Major with Minor Pathway – Continue studying your minor in Year 4 (Option A)
 - On this pathway in Year 3 you will undertake 40 ECTS in your Major Subject and 20 ECTS in your Minor subject
 - Then in Year 4 you will undertake 20 ECTS in each of your Major and Minor subject and complete your 20 ECTS Capstone in your Major subject.
- Major with Minor Pathway – Finish studying the Minor in Year 3 (Option B)
 - On this pathway in Year 3 you will study 30 ECTS in both your Major and Minor subject in Year 3.
 - Then in Year 4 you will undertake 40 ECTS in your Major subject and complete your 20 ECTS Capstone in your Major subject.

On your final degree award pathway you will follow this pathway for the third and fourth years of your study, it will not be possible to change your pathway between third and fourth year.

¹ This award is not available in the following subjects: Computer Science, Classical Languages, Linguistics and Social Policy. It is important to note that students on the Business and Computer Science combination cannot obtain a Single Honours award in Business or Computer Science.

3.2 Registration

Information on how you will complete registration for the modules in your Senior Freshman year of study will be provided towards the end of your Junior Sophister year.

3.3 Marking Scale

Most modules will have a pass mark of 40. Below is the key to grades and results:

- ☒ I = first class, 70% and above
- ☒ II.1 = second class first division, 60-69%
- ☒ II.2 = second class second division, 50-59%
- ☒ III = third class, 40-49%
- ☒ F1 = fail, 30-39%
- ☒ F2 = fail, 0-29%

3.4 Attendance Requirements

3.5 Absence from Examinations

Students who may be prevented from sitting an examination or examinations (or any part thereof) due to illness should seek, through their College tutor, permission from the Senior Lecturer in advance of the assessment session to defer the examination(s) to the reassessment session. Students who have commenced the assessment session, and are prevented from completing the session due to illness should seek, through their College tutor, permission to defer the outstanding examination(s)/assessment(s) to the reassessment session. In cases where the assessment session has commenced, requests to defer the outstanding examination(s) on medical grounds, should be submitted by the College tutor to the relevant school/departmental/course office. If non-medical grounds are stated, such deferral requests should be made to the Senior Lecturer.

3.6 Progression

To pass the year, students will need to meet all assessment requirements for their modules AND either Pass the Year Outright or Pass the Year by Compensation.

In order to pass the year outright a student will need to achieve an overall credit-weighted pass mark of 40% or higher for the year, based on the full 60 credits (ECTS) undertaken AND they will also need to achieve a pass mark of 40% or higher in each of their modules.

In order to pass the year by compensation a student will need to achieve an overall credit-weighted pass mark of 40% or higher for the year; they will also need to pass a minimum of 50 credits (ECTS) with a minimum module mark of 40% in each module; AND they will need to achieve a fail mark between 35% and 39% in modules not exceeding 10 credits (ECTS) in total.

3.7 Awards

Depending on student choices made within their programme of study and available pathways, it may be possible to be conferred with a Bachelor in Arts (Moderatorship) award² in one of the following categories:

Joint Honours

Single Honours³

Major with minor

The calculation of the Trinity Joint Honours Degree award is based on the combined Junior and Senior Sophister years' results, weighted at 30 per cent (Junior Sophister) and 70 per cent (Senior Sophister).

3.8 Prizes

3.9 Graduate Attributes

Students come to Trinity not only to acquire a certain set of facts or competencies but because they have an understanding of the sort of person they want to become. Building on the strong value placed on a solid disciplinary formation, College distilled this sense of transformation into four Trinity graduate attributes: To think independently, to communicate effectively, to develop continuously and to act responsibly.

Defining the Trinity Education, these attributes encompass the qualities, skills and abilities that our students have the opportunity to develop throughout their entire university experience, both in and outside the classroom in activities such as internships or volunteering. They will benefit our students not just in their careers, but in their future lives as individuals and members of society.

3.10 Evaluation

Students at Trinity will be asked to evaluate their experiences of their teaching and learning in each module they complete. It is also likely that various offices, including the Undergraduate Common Architecture Office, will send surveys or invite you to focus groups to provide feedback on your experiences in College. We encourage students to participate in feedback and evaluation wherever possible.
